One Tree Hill CFS ~ May Report

Crews have been busy over the last four weeks with eleven callouts, with 7 of these being vehicle related. We started the month with one of the largest structure fires we have had in the area for several years with 9 vehicles attending a shed fire on Kestel Road at Humbug Scrub around 8:30PM on the 28th of April. On arrival we found a very large shed fully involved and with no chance of gaining entry to fight the fire internally crews set



about fighting the fire from outside and preventing the fire from spreading. Several small explosions were heard from within the structure and with unknown substances burning crews were equipped with Breathing Apparatus (BA) during the fire fight. Appliances were called from surrounding CFS Brigades as well as the MFS with the first trucks leaving just after midnight and the last leaving around 2 AM. We were called back the following morning for a small reignition, and the fire was declared complete later that day.

The most serious vehicle accident was a car rollover on Cross Hill Road on the 29th of April. One of the occupants was trapped by the leg within the car and had to be cut out by a rescue crew from Golden Grove MFS. People who regularly travel the One Tree Hill Road would have noticed that the guard rails have taken a real battering in recent weeks particularly in the area known as "Snake Gully". In the first of these incidents early on the 1st of May, the car bounced off the railing and was left precariously blocking one lane near the intersection with Hannaford Hump Road with no occupant in attendance. In the second incident on the 12th of May just a few metres further up the road, the car penetrated the railings which had to be removed before the vehicle could be extracted.

The Kersbrook Road roundabout also claimed another car with a driver losing control and crossing the middle of the roundabout before hitting the guard rail and ending up on the wrong side of the road, ripping open the sump in the process and depositing a large amount of oil on the road. Other car accidents included a car vs tree on Kersbrook Road on the 20th of April and a car vs stobie pole later that same night in Hillbank. We also attended a vehicle fire around 5:30 AM on the 7th of May on Attyford Road.

Finally, crews were called to a reported grass fire on the 30th of April, just hours before the Fire Danger Season ended, which turned out to be an occupant burning off a pile of vegetation early. Although the call came in for Tyeka Drive and the fire was certainly visible from there, the property concerned was on Uley Road and took some time to locate. The fire was extinguished but several things about this call, (1) the Fire Danger Season always ends at midnight on the designated day, (2) there are regulations and guidelines for burning vegetation piles available from the CFS website, and (3) most importantly, someone needs to be in attendance until the burn-off is extinguished.

A big thank you to all the people who have put their names down to assist with our operational support crew over the years. Although, there were no large incidents over the last fire danger season requiring the mobilisation of the team, it is good to know that there are people available to help when required. There is no obligation on members of this team, we just ask that you help if you can. If you are interested in adding your name to the list, please contact the station on a Monday night during training (7:30 to 9:00 PM) on 8280 7055.

Thanks also to the people and companies who have helped the Brigade with donations, most recently those who helped with donations for our Election Day barbeques. The "democracy sausage" has become an Australian tradition over the years and it is great to be able to be part of it.

^{** #1 **} CCTV obtained from local residents showing the above 2 incidents were committed by group of youths walking through the streets around 2a.m. It appears they were dropped off by a driver of a Holden Commodore station wagon who was driving with lights out. Youths have gained entry to some vehicles and then were collected by driver of station wagon before leaving the area with lights off. CCTV not of quality to identify youths or registration number of vehicle.

With the onset of winter and a change in weather conditions a reminder to all residents that accidents continue to be over represented in stats for the One Tree Hill area. These accidents consist of single vehicles leaving the road and colliding with trees and/or fences, multiple vehicles involved in some accidents and a number involving colliding with Kangaroos.

SAPOL continue to urge all drivers to take care on the roads at all times of the day and night. Ensure mobile phones are not used whilst driving and attention is paid to the road particularly at dawn/dusk for animals/kangaroos.

Playford Council ~ Local Councillor's Report

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

It is now five years ago that my / our journey began with the stand against the massive rate rises proposed by the City of Playford in 2017. It was great to see residents from across Playford coming together standing against the horrid proposal.

Today, with your support as an elected member, I've been able to continue the process advocating for downwards pressure on rates. While it takes majority support in the chamber to deliver change, I'm proud to say we have delivered with downwards pressure on rates.

2019/2020 +3.3%

2020/2021 +0.45%

2021/2022 +1.25%

2022/2023 +2.85% proposed

If the proposed 2.85% is supported by the chamber the four year average will be 1.96%. Delivering downwards pressure on rates and an economically responsible Annual Business Plan that delivers for the whole city often has it challenges. Some Councillors would like to see higher rate increases.

At the Ordinary Council Meeting on Tuesday the 26th April 2022 the Council passed a resolution to endorse the draft 2022/2023 Annual Business Plan and Budget and draft 2022/2023 Long Term Financial Plan for public consultation from 2nd May to the 29th May 2022.

Did you provide your feedback whether supportive or not to the City of Playford? All feedback is collated and presented to the elected members for the final endorsement and adoption in June.

In summary,

- A rate increase of 2.85% is proposed being below the rate of inflation.
- The Annual Business Plan and Budget has been developed in line with the decision making filters and community themes outlined in Council's Strategic Plan 2020-2024 - Community and City Foundations
- Includes maximising opportunities for external funding, finishing what we have started and meeting our legislative requirements and legal obligations.
- The proposed budget maintains an operating surplus.
- The positive impact of the finance strategy over the last few years has helped manage and decrease Council's overall debt.
- The Annual Business Plan supports the McGilp Recreation park upgrade.

At the Ordinary Council Meeting 26th April I moved Council Resolution 4963, That the Mayor and CEO write to the appropriate authorities to manage and control Bathurst Burr within the City of Playford.

Thank you to the residents that have contacted me in response to my article on Bathurst Burr last month. This declared weed is more prevalent than I realised with reports of it being spread by Kangaroos. I am hoping that Green Adelaide will lift the priority of this declared weed within our hills landscape.





Sense Of Purpose

A Mental Health & Wellbeing Article by One Tree Hill Local Natasha Steen

Do you have a good sense of purpose? Are you living life with some awareness of purpose and how you feel you fit with life?

In my counselling practice, I am sometimes met with some really challenging things that people bring to the table. This month I have been pleased to have the opportunity to work with a couple of people who were feeling very down and close to considering not continuing with life.

I am particularly noticing the challenge that many men face with key life changes. I have a client who tells me that he is close to retirement, his grandkids are grown up, he can't race cars anymore and no one wants to "ride" like they used to...he is not "needed" and he is struggling to find "purpose".

My challenge is to help him find purpose and the key will be redefining his view on this - encouraging him to be open to different things etc etc! Now I am not entirely sure if I really like the word "purpose" and what this conjures up... there




seems something about it being a little rigid or prescriptive. Maybe instead we can use the word "satisfying". What do you find satisfying? and Do you know what "fills your bucket"?

So if we take the concept of satisfying...is it a good time to ask yourself what you put in this category? Depending on your age, it may be wise to check in on these things to ensure they are sustainable as you get older. Some hobbies or activities become too expensive, too physical or are just no longer a good match. Also, if work is the only thing you really notice as filling "that gap" and retirement is nearing... it is time to invest some headspace into noticing what else might be good for you.

Here's a few tips to consider what you find satisfying and therefore gives you a feeling of place and purpose to build upon.

- Start by considering what "fills your bucket", what you do for joy/satisfaction write down at least three things– eg walking, sitting with family, participating in a club, gardening, taking a bath, sleep, hobbies etc!
- Take a look at the things on your list and consider whether they are sustainable as you age if not is there a variation on them that you can consider that may be a little different but still keep you connected to this.
- Consider what you "value" do you know your values you can find short online surveys if you google for this.
- Consider trying to write down a few goals for yourself yes there is a lot of value in writing things down.
- You can try establishing more purpose/satisfaction for yourself by looking at ways to "give back" to others. Can you consider joining a cause, volunteering, donating money or skills or a few random acts of kindness.
- Practice gratitude try writing three things each day you are grateful for. There is a lot of evidence that this focus really helps our sense of purpose.
- Explore your passions what are you good at what could you do more of you don't have to be good at everything but nurture and grow your strengths.
- Notice who you spend time with try to spend more time with people that inspire you.
- Read more especially "fiction" as this has been found to improve your empathy and critical/creative thinking.
- Do some work around your self acceptance and self awareness this can lead to a greater sense of connection to others and everything you do, giving more meaning to your life.
- Finally take time for self care this is different for everyone but it is important to know your own recipe!



Did you know?

- Over 200 past Grapevine editions covering more than 20 years of One Tree Hill history are now available to read online; unfortunately, we are missing another 273 editions
- The Grapevine was first published 44 years ago in May 1978; you can find some extracts in the November 1995 edition.
- Home delivery of the Grapevine to over 500 residents commenced in April 1994, and we now print 950 copies

The Progress Association sends a very big thank you to David and Meredith Parker for their very kind donation of around 8 years (covering most of the 1990s) of past editions of the Grapevine. These have all been scanned and are now available to read on our website (http://onetreehill.org.au/index.php/grapevine). It would be great to have the full Grapevine history on our website. A February 1999 article by Jill McLatchie indicated the intention to send a set to the Munno Para Library; however, a recent check of their collection only revealed another 5 missing editions that we didn't already have.

We are hoping that the missing Grapevine history is not permanently lost. Do you have any old editions of the

Helpful Info About Backup Generators

The following article was sent in by a local resident, and may be of interest to those living in One Tree Hill and outlying areas.

Recently my wife and I decided that we would purchase a generator, with the capacity to run all but the air-conditioning units on the house electrical supply. We purchased a new 10,500 watt generator and engaged the services of a local electrician, he updated the safety aspects of our ageing main house electrical board and installed a 'changeover' switch to facilitate the new generator.

With the generator running and connected, via an heavy duty extension cord, to the house generator inlet, the electrician tested the system. No problem with the changeover switch, but the generator supply safety switch cut power immediately. The electrician rechecked all his work and satisfied, he returned to the generator and quickly realised the house 'multiple earthed neutral' system (MEN) on the home was incompatible with the generator's own MEN.

Now the electrician had finished the work he was engaged to do, but instead of abandoning me, he decided to phone the generator manufacturer and speak to the technical help team. Their team member, while explaining that he himself was not an electrician told him that it was the usual practice for a qualified electrician to isolate the generator's safety switch and tag the unit with a safety warning. Our electrician correctly told the team member that he was not prepared to modify the generator.

Having ended the call, the electrician immediately phoned the Office of the Technical Regulator of South Australia to seek their advice on the matter. I was privy to this conversation (on speaker phone). It was made very clear to us, that any modification that disabled a safety device was not recommended. The technical regulator has now decided to investigate the matter further.

It seems that the new generators are all fitted with safety circuit breakers as work place safety regulations decree. The local electrician returned the next morning with his own generator, an older unit without electric start or safety breaker.

Not a worry, his generator - after we followed the steps detailed above in paragraph 3 - ran the whole house, including two fridges and an electric kettle, without a single problem.

In closing, while being used 'ONLY' as a home backup unit and tagged with that information, a modified generator may seem fine. However, tags can wear or be broken off etc. as time goes by.

Remember, they are 'portable generators' and a modified generator could be inadvertently removed to another area before the safety switch is reconnected. This may result in injury to the user. I'm not an electrician, but I've certainly learnt a bit throughout this whole incident.

What's Flowering In My Garden?



The Autumn weather has well and truly arrived offering a chilly touch recently and a reminder of the much cooler weather that will be upon us soon. The very welcomed showers have washed the dust and dirt off of all the plants. The paddocks now have a bright green cover.

Many Correas have burst into flower offering a bright display and much appreciated nectar for many Eastern Spinebills and New Holland Honeyeaters. The colours of the Correa flowers is amazing; ranging from white to cream, soft and bright orange, pinkish crimson and many other shades. Hakea Stockdale Sensation, with it's stunningly beautiful cream, pink and cherry red large ball shaped flowers is an absolute delight to view and admire. Banksia ericifolia is showing off it's magnificent golden orange flowering spikes, tinged with reddish brown.

The late Summer/Autumn flowering Croweas have been flowering for a while now but Crowea exalata compact is in full flower after receiving some consistent Autumn showers. It bears pinkish red buds that open to reveal brilliant bright pink/purple large star shaped flowers are held along narrow stems of this low growing plant which grows approximately 0.5 m high by 0.6m wide. This small dense plant, which grows naturally in Victoria, prefers to grow in well drained soils in full sun or part shade and is drought hardy and frost tolerant. It is one of those small native plants that can be grown



between larger plants. Crowea exalata compact is a beautiful addition to any garden as it offers stunningly beautiful bright flowers on narrow stems with aromatic small narrow leaves to enjoy over many months during Autumn and Winter. There are other Croweas available for our gardens, all being available from most good nurseries. Purchase several varieties to plant between taller plants or even in a large pot or rockery and enjoy the display that these Croweas will produce. Crowea exalata compact is such a lovely plant in my garden.

Just beautiful.

Koalas vs Climate Change

Plants produce tannins to deter herbivores, and Koalas may choose their preferred eucalypt species based on a trade-off between nutrient and tannin concentrations within the leaves. Their choice of specific eucalypt species may also allow it to minimise competition with other marsupials, such as the Greater Glider and Common Ringtail Possum for specific eucalyptus leaves.

Increasing atmospheric CO2 levels reduce the nutritional quality of eucalypts leaves and Koalas therefore may no longer be able to meet their nutritional demands, resulting in malnutrition and starvation.

Increasing droughts and therefore less water, nitrogen and protein in the leaves, are forcing the Koala to descend from trees in search of water or new habitats, making them particularly vulnerable to wild and domestic predators, eg; dogs, as well as road traffic, often resulting in their death.

The extra nutritional demands required for the production of milk in a lactating mother are much higher than a non-lactating female. This means spending more time browsing and thus eating more, however there is a limit to how much Koalas can increase the size of their gut and also eating more leaves causes them to pass the digested leaves

more quickly through the Koala's digestive system, resulting in less thorough digestion and decreased nutrient uptake. Even though younger leaves are more nutritious they also however, tend to possess more tannins. Unfortunately, if the quality of their food declines, so does the decline of females who are able to produce joeys to replace Koalas that die of old age, and therefore, populations will dwindle and eventually disappear.

Koala's warm fur and thick skin enables them to endure cold conditions in southern Australia, but the increase of extreme heat will make it impossible for the Koala to survive.

Can Koalas adapt to the rapid, human-induced climate change? Climate changes are occurring faster than Koalas can adapt to, plus the low levels of genetic variation within their populations are seeing Koalas dying of genetic diseases. We need to fight for their existence.
