Happy New Year and welcome to 2023 everyone.

It is with sadness to start with that just prior to Christmas, Joyce Baggs, a 50 plus year resident of One Tree Hill passed away. Joyce and her husband, Albert, were long standing members of the Progress Association and also with the Senior Citizens. Her smile and willingness to help around the township will be profoundly missed. Amongst a lot of volunteering, Joyce was part of the initial Progress team that started the backup generator project to water supply to our town during power outages. On behalf of Progress, we wish to pass on our condolences to the family and friends of Joyce and to say THANK YOU.

Again prior to Christmas we had the Audio/Visual system upgraded due to electrical/mechanical failures. One of the original amplifiers had died, another had a faulty fan and was on the way out and the third was showing signs of being "very" warm. We wish to thank Colin Campbell of Artisan Technical Services, Kersbrook, on the initial rectification to keep the system running and then the fast turnaround with the installation of the new amplifiers. This has now allowed us to save power due to the automatic standby mode and most importantly remove 60 Kg's of weight from the rack.

On the 5th of January, Steve and Andrew Huckstepp, Pat Jones and I took delivery of 25 new tables for the hall. We now have two styles of tables rather than the five styles that were being utilised. This was a necessity as the old tables were showing severe degradation over many years of use and repairing them was becoming problematic. I wish to thank Steve, Andrew and Pat for their time in getting this done so quickly.

The week of the 16th of January we had Michael Fisher and Alex Thomson lay new turf in the playground area for the township and the Playgroup kids to enjoy. It looks amazing! Issues with the irrigation system were found that affected both inside and the Clucas Green on the outside of the fence. This has been resolved by City of Playford staff so we will have green grass moving forward. A massive big thank you to Michael and Alex for their time and efforts in getting this from concept to completion in a matter of days, and in the heat! Thanks lads.

Progress meetings are held on the second Thursday of the month from 7:30pm at the One Tree Hill Institute. If you would like to make One Tree Hill a better place to live and visit then please come and lend a hand.





ONE TREE HILL RURAL WATCH ~ CRIME REPORT Offences Reported between 13th November 2022 — 6th December 2022

7th November Arson of Motor Vehicle Yorktown Road ONE TREE HILL

Vehicle stolen from Albert Park and located burnt out at above location

Overnight of 23rd November Non Residential Serious Criminal Trespass Craigmore Road ULEYBURY

Shed door pried open and 4 x motorbikes (dirt bikes) stolen.

**On 24 November SAPOL Air wing conducting flights over Northern District located persons riding dirt bikes on Main North Road Smithfield. Bikes followed to vicinity of Bentley and Smith Roads Blakeview. Aircrew detected several more dirt bikes at this location which resulted in patrols attending area and locating and subsequently arresting 5 male persons nearby. At this location Police recovered 6 motorbikes. All males arrested were from the northern suburbs and subsequent enquiries at a Davoren Park address located an additional 9 motorbikes all suspected to have been stolen. All males charged with Illegal Use of motor vehicles and traffic offences and court proceedings commenced.

(In total 15 stolen motor bikes located - including those stolen from the Uleybury address)

3rd December Fatal Motor Vehicle accident Kersbrook Road HUMBUG SCRUB

33 year old male from Elizabeth East involved in fatal motor vehicle accident at above location when vehicle left road and rolled several times.

13th December (overnight) Illegal Use of Motor Vehicle Blencowe Road ONE TREE HILL

Vehicle stolen from driveway – located in One Tree Hill after being involved in a vehicle collision.

Police along with CFS have attended several non-suspicious fires during the reporting period. Several fires have been caused by residents undertaken slashing of paddocks which at this time of year is an important fire reduction strategy. A reminder that during Fire Danger season when undertaking slashing, tractors are to have firefighting equipment on board and at hand.

CFS REPORT - JANUARY 2023





First up the members of the One Tree hill Brigade would like to wish everyone a Happy New Year. The Brigade has been particularly busy over the last 8 weeks with 28 callouts since our last article. Eight of these were for trees down within the area,

probably the biggest of these occurred on the 5th of January on the Gawler-One Tree Hill Road with a large tree falling and blocking the entire road. The two crews attending were able to open one lane quickly, but the entire job took over an hour and a half to complete.

Crews have attended 6 vehicle accidents and one vehicle fire during this period with the areas around Hannaford Hump Road, Kersbrook Road near Kelly Hill Road and the bend on Uley Road near the big water tank continuing to feature in the callouts. If you use these roads regularly you will know that they can present dangers, so please take extra care.

We have had 5 callouts to structure fires or fire alarms during the period, although a faulty alarm in the Little Para Water Treatment Plant has been responsible for three of these. One resident was lucky however, when their spa pump ignited on the 5th of December sending plumes of black smoke into the air. Damage was fortunately kept to the area surrounding the spa and could have been much worse had it spread to the nearby residence. The other structure fire was for a large shed in Waterloo Corner which required attendance by our Bulk Water Carrier.

Finally for this summary, we have attended 5 grass fires. Most recently the large fire at Gorge Road Montacute which was widely reported in the press, where crews attended as part of a cascading Strike Team. The other four fires have been within the area with a fire around the Snake Gully area on Boxing Day presenting the largest threat. With temperatures approaching 40 degrees, the fire involved 8 vehicles from OTH and surrounding Brigades and took an hour and a half before it declared contained. It was brought under control with the assistance of two fire bombers and the high-volume helicopter.

Of the other fires, one was the result of an accidental ignition caused by a slasher, one was a campfire left smouldering and the most disturbing was a small grass fire found by the side of the road in Gould Creek from an undetermined source on the 20th of December.

No time for complacency

While the lack of large grass fires locally over the last couple of months may be considered lucky, we are in the midst of a very dangerous fire season. Fuel loads are still very high in several places within our district and as we have seen, it can only take one spark to cause a major incident. An unextinguished campfire, no matter how innocent, or a small fire burning by the side of the road from whatever source can quickly become a major life-threatening blaze. With the current loads, the area will continue to remain under threat until we receive major rains, probably not until March or April, so we must remain vigilant

We have just passed the 7th anniversary of the Sampson Flat bushfire, the last major bushfire event in our area. For some, this traumatic event will seem like just yesterday but there have been many new residents and landowners entering the area since then who have not had first-hand experience of a major bushfire. The best thing anyone can do is be prepared, which is why the CFS continues to hammer the message of having a Bushfire Plan ready. You need to make sure it is realistic; can you really stay and defend if that is your plan? Other important points you should consider are that if you decide to leave, then leave early and please make sure everyone living on your property knows what to do if the plan needs to be put into action.

WHAT'S FLOWERING IN MY GARDEN

What a difference a wet Spring and a cool start to Summer has made to the garden compared to some past seasons when it was dry and warm to hot from the start of October. All the trees and shrubs have put on lush new growth and some Summer flowering Callistemons are looking absolutely stunning. Some Eucalypts have put on a massed display of flowers and the perfume of the Summer flowering Wattles is a delight to enjoy. There's plenty of food for many bees and birds that visit regularly.

Eucalyptus erythronema is flowering for the first time. This mallee or single stemmed tree grows naturally in a large area of south west Western Australia and requires free draining soils and full sun and can reach a height of 6m to 7m. It has produced many magnificent flowers of a pink red shade. The pale green grey leaves are held along white branches and many clusters of flower buds are held by a single branchlet and can be pendulous in habit. The young lime green flower buds mature to an orange red shade. The bright red flower cap is circular in shape but has a small spike and pops off to reveal stunningly beautiful gold tipped pink red flowers approximately 2cm wide. With 6 to 7 buds in a cluster all flowering at the same time, this small tree can produce a massed display of brilliant colour. Eucalyptus erythromena does not have deep roots and can



be planted as a shrub with ground cover plants such as Banksias close by. There is a well maintained stand of Eucalyptus erythronema on the northern edge of car park no1 Yorktown Road at Fremont Park. A sub species known as Eucalyptus inorata is taller, has darker bark and bears creamy white flowers and can be seen in a park adjacent to the southern edge of the school complex at Blakeview. This spectacular Eucalypt is available from specialist native nurseries. It is worthwhile growing as a small garden plant it does not grow too tall, does not have a thick crown and does produce some stunningly beautiful blossoms. It's one of my favourite Eucalypts.



Reptile Mania





When we think of our backyard habitat, we think of beautiful birds, butterflies, frogs, possums and a host of other cute critters. Unfortunately, we tend to forget about one of the most important and most vulnerable of our native vertebrates – the reptiles!



Things that slither and rustle in the garden are not always welcome and can actually be a little unsettling but before you recoil in horror, take a moment to consider that our urban reptile and frog populations have declined enormously since European

settlement, to the point that one in four of our 850 reptile species are now in serious strife. Of the 850 reptiles found in Australia, 90% of these are found nowhere else in the world,

meaning we really have to do something about this rapid decline, and fast.

Provide a well-designed lizard habitat, protected from predators and they will reward you by happily setting up home in your garden and eating your slugs and harmful insects.



HOW TO SPOT A WILD KOALA...

Koalas:



Firstly, remember that a tree does not have to be a food tree to have a Koala in it. Even non-eucalypts are sometimes used by Koalas for rest or shelter.

Have you ever seen a Koala in the wild? There is nothing quite like the feeling of spotting your first wild Koala sleeping peacefully in the treetops. If you are ever lucky enough to find yourself in a Koala forest in Australia then here are some useful tips for spotting

Secondly, you can start by looking for a 'runway' up the side of a tree trunk. On a heavily used tree you might see a series of small scratch marks on the bark where Koalas climb up, and sometimes it might be on a slightly angled part of the trunk for easier access.

Thirdly, look for Koala pellets around the base of a tree. Small bullet-shaped droppings that smell strongly of eucalypt will be scattered around trees that Koalas frequent.

Finally, look up into the tree canopy and scan the forks and branches for small fluffy grey shapes. You will be amazed at how once your eyes get used to seeing them, Koalas become easier and easier to spot.


