ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION - PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The month of April was a busy month for Progress. We had the final preparations for ANZAC Day and held the ANZAC Day Dawn Service. Photos and run-down will be in next months report.

We have received communication from Rhiannon Pearce MP for King that the Black Top/Yorktown Road intersection will have flashing amber lights added to the sign as a further improvement. Talks are still happening with no proposed time line issued at this stage. We will keep you informed.

The City of Playford Business Plan has been released in draft form with public consultation requested for further input until the end on May. Also, coming soon is the annual rates review for public consultation. The proposed rates look to be going up about 9% for the next year. I *strongly* encourage everyone to go to the City of Playford website and state your case: https://www.playford.sa.gov.au/ Click on the word Council and the heading "Council Documents".

City of Playford has also informed us that the McGilp Road Sport Precinct is having a last public consultation and request for tender from May 22. Proposed start time for the redevelopment is June 2024. Please have your say and show your support for a great development opportunity for One Tree Hill. The sum of money involved, \$3 Million, was hard to come by and is very rarely spent in our township.

Finally, I will be standing down as President at the May AGM as family and work commitments are my priority. I have served two years in the role and have made many new friends and contacts for One Tree Hill which will serve the new Executive Committee and the town for many years to come. I will continue to remain with Progress but in a lesser capacity.

I would like to thank in no particular order the following people for their past and/or ongoing support of One Tree Hill and invaluable support to myself: Cr David Kerrison, Cr Clint Marsh, Cr Peter Rentoulis, Rhiannon Pearce MP, Nick Champion MP, Ashton Hurn MP, Matt Burnell MP, Bindi Hawkey, Meredith & David Parker and Paula Leuthen.

PLAYFORD COUNCIL - LOCAL COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

It is time for you to have your say, please provide your constructive feedback.

At the Ordinary Council Meeting on Tuesday the 18^{th of} April, Council passed the following resolution:

- Council endorses the draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan and Budget, draft Long Term Financial Plan and draft Strategic Asset Management Plan for public consultation from Wednesday the 26^{th of} April to Tuesday the 23rd
 of May 2023.
- 2. Council approves the CEO to make amendments to the Draft Plans, that are minor in nature and do not adjust the overall intent of the Draft Plans.

In summary the draft Annual Business Plan will deliver a proposed rate increase of 7.91% and is estimated at \$2.56 per week for the average rates bill in Playford. However, the average rates bill is not reflective for our community as we generally have significantly higher Capital Values upon which the rates are calculated.

For the last four years as an Elected Member with the City of Playford, I've heard the community feedback for new projects and services which is often a priority over the rates for many. The proposed increase ensures we can deliver the existing services and programs our community values and provide a range of new projects and improved services that our community has told us they want. It also covers rising costs due to inflation and meets budget goals that support long term financial sustainability. The recent inflationary increases not only effects the delivery of new services, they also impact our depreciation schedules and replacement costs of existing assets.

In the last four-year term, we delivered debt management strategies significantly reducing debt and some of the lowest rate increases for the City of Playford which averaged below 2%.

To me it's important that we deliver a budget that is financially responsible and that we do not borrow to keep rates artificially low. Please provide your feedback for Elected Members to consider.

CFS REPORT - MAY 2023

Only 6 callouts since the last report, which is not unusual for this time of year. Early rain has significantly reduced the fire risk in the area and prevented some of those last season fires we can occasionally get. Having said that, the first callout this month was to a late night grass fire on Smith Road on the 19th of March, where 2 units from One Tree Hill assisted Dalkieth CFS and Elizabeth MFS in extinguishing the blaze.



Two Trees down for the month, one which blocked the One tree Hill Road at Gould Creek on the 20th of March and one which fell across McGilp Road in the township on Easter Monday. Only one vehicle accident this month, with an early morning callout to a motorbike accident near the corner of Gulf View Drive and Blacktop Roads. In this case the rider had left the scene. We also had another call to the Little Para Water Treatment Plant.

The other callout was on Easter Sunday and in this case, the Bulk Water Carrier (BWC) was called to assist at the fire in the John Hartley School at Smithfield. This fire was attended by 13 MFS appliances from all over Adelaide as well as 3 CFS units including our BWC and cause around 1 million dollars in damage.

Winter is coming

Now that Easter is past us and the rain has started we can start thinking about what needs to be done to prepare for winter. One of the first things you should be doing if you have a combustion heater or wood fire is thinking about fire safety before you light them up. Chimney fires are quite common during the early months of winter and cause significant property damage every year. Burning wood results in a build-up of residue on the inside of your flue or chimney and it is recommended that you have them cleaned every year and no longer than every 3 years. Chimney brush kits are available at hardware stores but if you are not confident yourself, there are professional chimney sweep services available around Adelaide.

Other things you should be looking at with your wood fire are:

- The proximity of combustible materials to your fire, things like clothes, furnishings and fire-starting materials can all ignite from the radiant heat created by a fire or if there is a stray spark
- Ensure you can safely dispose of ashes in a metal container, you should never place ashes straight into a plastic bucket or council bin, and
- Effectively screening your fire from pets and children

Another thing that we commonly overlook at the start of winter are electric blankets. These are another common source of winter fires caused by overheating and short circuiting. Please inspect your blankets for any obvious signs of wear before turning them on, particularly after they have been in storage, and if necessary, they should be disposed of and replaced.

Finally, thanks to everyone who attended the CFS Firey Women Workshops held at the Station on Saturday April 1st and 15th. I understand there was a good turnout, and the participants all gained a greater appreciation for bushfire safety and preparedness.

Another reminder the Fire Danger Season does not end until the 30^{th} of April for the Adelaide Metropolitan and Mount Lofty Ranges Districts. That means you can't burn until the 1^{st} of May, and before burning you should check with your local council regarding restrictions applying in your area. Burning in the open is not permitted within the One Tree Hill township.

WHAT'S FLOWERING IN MY GARDEN

Heather Fischer, Humbug Scrub

What a wonderful drop of rain that we have just received! Ex Tropical Cyclone Isla generously dropped 34 mils into my rain gauge. The trees and shrubs have all had a good wash and the topsoil is very moist. This rain event might be the start of a great season for our grain growers. The paddocks are all green and the weeds are thriving.

Hakea laurina Stockdale Sensation has burst into it's glorious flower phase with masses of creamy pink balls clothing many branches. These gorgeous puff balls of colour will change to a dark crimson red over the next month or two thus providing a colourful display for many months. The Autumn flowering Banksias have produced many golden yellow spikes that will continue to mature to reveal shades of red and black amongst the golden spikes.

Many Correas are in flower with many more buds to open in the coming months. Correa pulchella Fire Bells, a compact low growing groundcover, has a covering of bright orange red flowers and Correa turnbullii has red and green bell shaped flowers that hide behind the mid green foliage along it's stems. Correa Jingle Bells is about Just Beautiful. 70cms high and 1.2m wide and is an open bush that is

growing underneath a seedling of Hakea laurina Stockdale Sensation with it's strong stems are reaching into the foliage of the Hakea . Many dark but bright pink flowers with yellow lime green tips are spread across the delightfull Correa hybrid. Golden yellow stamens protrude from inside the tubular shaped flowers. All this splash of strong colour is displayed against the shiny dark green leaves with a pale green underside of this Correa. The New Holland Honeyeaters and Eastern Spinebills have been visiting this plant, both enjoying the nectar that is produced. Correa Jingle Bells is reported to be still flowering at Christmas time but as it is flowering well at the moment, it will be interesting to see if it will provide a splash of Christmas colours later this year. Perhaps I should prune this Correa to stimulate new growth and have a go at striking the prunings. It is a great Correa to have in any garden. Generally, not available in good nurseries but could be available from the Native Plant Sales on May 13th at Urrbrae High School.

Correa Jingle Bells is such a hardy worthwhile addition to the garden. Source it, plant it, watch it grow and enjoy.





BIRDS IN MY BACKYARD Julie Buttery, Humbug Scrub

MY JOURNEY:

When we bought our property (1977) in Humbug Scrub it had few trees or bushes. The main varieties were river red gums & blue gums. A major fire had gone through two years prior & it had been used as a grazing property until the day we took possession.

For the next 3 decades we grazed a variety of stock: sheep, steers, goats & horses in turn. With the exception of fruit trees, there was little change in the growth of trees & shrubs.

Birds we saw included magpies, kookaburras, ravens, mistletoe birds & occasional sulphur-crested cockatoos & galahs.

By 2010 we had removed all livestock (too labour intense for us older people ha ha) except the old pony.

Shrubs had begun to appear & I went about planting more, mostly natives.

The other big change was when we no longer had cats. We had always had cats in the hay shed to combat mice & therefore snake populations. But with less feed in storage, & the death of our last cat, we made the decision not to replace her. The year was 2015, after Sampson Flat Fire. And the bird population has exploded.

In coming months I will show you what I have found within my boundaries.



BIRD OF THE MONTH: AUSTRALIAN MAGPIE

The Australian Magpie (Gymnorhina tibicen) is not related to European magpies.

This black & white bird may vary in colour pattern depending on where it lives. In the eastern states it has a white back. In Tasmania the white is more extensive again. The eye is red. Females & juveniles may be more grey & less vividly black-&white.

It is about 36 to 44 cm long. Their lifespan is about 25 to 30 years & they live in family groups of up to 20 individuals.

A single magpie may warble, a flute like sound that does not carry far. A group, usually a family, may increase the volume of this warbling into a full throated carolling. This is them announcing their territory. Juveniles usually sound a high pitched call when begging for food. They may continue this for some months after they are capable of feeding them-

selves, & the adult magpies continue to feed their young for quite some time. The whole family will support the youngsters.

Magpies have been known to mimic quite a number of different birds & even copied human speech.

Although we have all heard of swooping magpies, it is actually a quite rare event. In most cases, the magpies have felt threatened by those they swoop. Make friends with your family of 'pies & they will see you as a safe haven instead of a threat. If you are swooped regularly by a particular magpie (or in the same area) wear a hat, put sunglasses on top (or on backwards so they think you are watching behind) & try to ignore them. It will only last a couple of months. Don't swat at them or run, it makes you look like you are aggressive.


Many years ago during a severe storm we rescued a wet magpie chick from our cats. Taken inside to be warmed & dried, we returned it to a protected box about 5 feet off the ground & left some chopped meat with it. We have never been swooped at home since.

"Chopped meat?" I hear you say.

Yes. Bread is BAD. Bad for all birds. Mince is not suitable for meat eating birds. Raw mince gets caught in the mandible & goes rotten. Imagine meat between your teeth going off.

Magpies are grub eaters. Sliced meat is acceptable in small amounts (think worm shaped & sized). It is a good way to gain their trust. But they need a balanced diet & meat will not give it to them. If you would really like to feed a magpie, buy some meal-worms & throw a spoonful for them once a day. Once they are comfortable with you, they may join you in your endeavours in the garden, helping themselves to whatever you unearth.

And Please: when the young magpies are learning about the dangers of the road, Slow Down. Give them time to get off the road. They soon learn that the gravel edge is safe but if one is killed the whole family will stand around & mourn it.




TENNIS CLUB NEWS


IN MEMORIAM - KEN YOUNG

Canary in the Coal Mine What our woodland birds are telling us and how we can help

Since European settlement, 1 in 4 of our woodland bird species are currently listed as threatened with one third of woodland vegetation cleared. Birds can be an early indicator as to what is happening in our backyards. If you live in the City of Playford you are required to obtain a burning permit between the dates of 1 May 2023 and 31 October 2023.

Some areas are exempted from having to obtain an individual burning permit and are instead covered by a General Notice Burning Permit – per information below.

Burning Permits are issued to enforce the Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016 in accordance with clause 6.

This general notice burning permit is issued by the City of Playford and authorises any person within the following areas of the City of Playford (as defined in the City of Playford Development Plan pursuant to the Development Act 1993) that are within Metropolitan Adelaide (as defined in the Development Act 1993):

- The Watershed Zone (Mount Lofty Ranges);
- b. The Hills Face Zone:
- c. Primary Production Zone (Mount Lofty Ranges); to carry out any of the following burning activities in those areas, outside of the 2022/2023 fire danger season (fixed under the Fire and Emergency Services Act 2005) subject to the conditions set out below:

Conditions:

- Burning off vegetation for fire prevention or control;
- This burning permit cannot authorise a person to carry out a burning activity under (1) on land if the person is not the owner occupier of the land or does not have the consent or authority of the owner or occupier.
- 3. A person carrying out a burning activity under (1) and (2) must:
 - Only burn between the hours of 10am and 5pm, Monday to Saturday. NOTE: Burning on Sundays and Public Holidays is prohibited.
 - Create Piles 3m x 3m x 2m Maximum
 - · Notify your neighbours prior to the day of burn.
 - Place materials to be burnt in a position that allows for a four-metre clearance around and over the fire.
 - Ensure all piles to be burnt are not in close proximity to other flammable materials including grass and logs.
 - Burn one pile at a time, to ensure that you retain control of each burn.
 - · Have appropriate working fire control equipment on standby.
 - Extinguish the fire immediately if smoke or odour is causing a nuisance on another person's property.
 - · Stay within the direct vicinity of the immediate burn site if smoke or smoulder is coming off of the burn.
 - On the completion of the burn, ensure the fire is completely extinguished.

You must not:

Burn materials mixed into soil or permapine treated with copper arsenate, household rubbish, plastic or rubber.

- This notice remains in force until 31 October 2023.
- 5. Individual permits will be considered on a case by case basis in November 2023.

Notes:

This burning permit does not authorise the burning of a prohibited substance (Clauses (6)(3)(d) and (7) (1) of the Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016. The fact that a person has complied with the conditions of the burning permit does not:

- relieve the person from liability for any loss, damage or harm caused by a fire lit under the authority of the burning permit; or
- b. prevent proceedings for enforcement of the general environmental duty under section 25 of the Environment Protection Act 1993, or for any offence under the Act, in relation to the burning activity (clause 6(5) of the Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016). This permit is subject to any ban, prohibition, restriction, or other requirement under the Fire and Emergency services Act 2005, the Native Vegetation Act 1991 or a prescribed act (clause 5(4) Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016).

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
