PLAYFORD COUNCIL - LOCAL COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

In recent years as a community, we have lost many of our seniors along with a lot of our local history and the memories that they hold.

This month we have lost another local identity in the passing of Neil McKenzie and I offer my sincerest condolences to his immediate family. I'd like to acknowledge and pay tribute to the man that I knew as Uncle Neil. He was a friendly and community minded man that loved and was involved in everything local. He was a test cricket fan and spent many late nights watching his favourite sport. Over his lifetime he contributed to the local community as a member of the OTH Cricket Club, OTH Tennis Club, OTH Pony Club along with the Salisbury Hunt Club and as a member of the OTH Progress Association. Neil also took a keen interest in the local history and it was a pleasure to sit and listen to him as he was an excellent story teller.

The Annual Business Plan (ABP) engagement for 2023/24 has come to a close. Did you submit your feedback and have you had your say? Thank you to the residents that submitted their responses to the City of Playford. They will be presented to the elected members for consideration before deciding on the final endorsement.

The ABP proposes a 7.91% increase in rate revenue for 2023/24. The proposed increase funds new projects and services that the community has asked for while covering rising costs due to inflation and meeting budget goals that support long-term financial sustainability.

Over the last four years we have been successful in keeping the average rate increase for the City of Playford extremely low for a developing (growth) Council at 1.96%. The current inflationary environment is similarly affecting residents and business alike. If the 7.91% increase is endorsed it will take the 5 year's average increase to 3.125%.

This year we are also introducing two new service increases. A green bin rollout will commence and provide a free opt-in Food Organics Green Organics (FOGO) bin to residents who currently do not have one. This supports community and Council efforts to increase our environmental sustainability by reducing the amount of material going to landfill.

The Greening Playford Urban Tree Planting service will deliver additional trees in our pocket parks, local reserves and large biodiversity reserves as well as supporting resident plantings. This project will help uplift and create attractive streetscapes and contribute to Council's commitment to increase tree canopy coverage across the city in the longer term.

I will continue to be at the One Tree Hill Market on the first Saturday of every month (excluding January) and at Craigmore Market the last Sunday of every month. Please come along and discuss local matters.

CFS REPORT - JUNE 2023

Incident Report

A bit busier this month with 9 callouts to report. Unfortunately, two of these were structure fires one for a caravan on Humbug Scrub Road, which was spreading into the bush and the other for a house fire on Kestel Road.



Some fortunate timing in the case of the house fire with an occupant of the property arriving home to find one of the rooms on fire. Quick action by him

and other residents and friends managed to control the blaze using extinguishers and a garden hose before our crews arrived to help with the overhaul and salvage and ensure that the fire had not spread through the roof space. This was one of 5 chimney fires in Para Group in the first week of May.

The intersection of Blacktop and Yorketown Roads claimed more victims with a 2-car collision on the 1st of May, as did Hannaford Hump Road with a car into the ditch on the side of the road on the 6th of May. These are two of our most common "black spots" and although as reported in another article last month the Blacktop/Yorketown intersection is to be fitted with amber flashing lights, extra care needs to be taken when using these stretches of road.

Crews also attended another accident on the 7th of May, this one was a 2-car collision at the corner of Medlow and Gawler One Tree Hill Road at Yattalunga where crews were required to clean up debris and spilled fluid.

Only one tree down this month, this time on Medlow Road blocking one lane, and two grass fires. Reminder if you are burning off vegetation, you must always have someone in attendance with sufficient water and the ability to extinguish the fire if necessary. Finally, we were called to a fire in a tunnel in the park lands in Elizabeth Park on the 16th of May, this was believed to have been lit by local children.

Winter Vehicle Safety

Continuing the theme of road safety started above, are your vehicles ready for winter? Now is a good time to check things like tyres and windscreen wipers to ensure they will get you through the wet months ahead.

Remember when driving in heavy rain there are several locations in the local area where water either gathers on the road or is flowing across roads and although these may appear quite shallow the loss of traction can be a contributing factor in accidents. There have already been a few days where heavy fog has blanketed the town and surrounding areas and it is pleasing to see people driving to conditions and using their headlights in the rainy and foggy conditions.

Condolences

Members of the Brigade were saddened to learn of the death of Howard McBeth recently. Howard was a resident in Humbug Scrub for many years and played a role as the Fire Protection Manager in the NPWSA (National Parks) and as the Chief Operating Officer in the CFS from 1984 until 1996. Although Howard was not a member of the One Tree Hill Brigade, he took an interest in both the Brigade and Para Group. Condolences to the family and friends.

WHAT'S FLOWERING IN MY GARDEN

Heather Fischer, Humbug Scrub

We have enjoyed a few days of sunshine and warm weather with cool nights. It has been a while since any precipitation has landed in the rain gauge which has meant watering any plants that have been planted recently. Hakea laurina Stockdale Sensation has been flowering prolifically and still is just magnificent to observe and thoroughly enjoy . It's mass of cherry red puff balls are truly sensational in colour and form.

Other Hakeas are flowering and some Correas are providing colour and sustenance for the many New Holland Honeyeaters that visit the garden.

A locally growing tree is flowering and is fascinating to stand back and enjoy. Allocasuarina verticillata, with the common name of Drooping Sheoak , has a male tree and a female tree. Both have trunks of dark brown rough bark and can grow up to 30m high with a canopy that spreads up to 5m or more across. The male tree has pendulous yellow brown spikes or catkins which, at the moment are attracting the pollinating insects. Many honey bees are buzzing around collecting pollen. The female trees have small 1cm cherry red cones which must be visited by the pollinating insects that have buzzed around the male catkins in order to mature to produce a cylindrical cone that has small sharp points. If this pollinating process is successful, the fruits on the female plant will grow and these become a source of food for the

Yellow Tailed Black Cockatoos. The Kangaroos also enjoy eating the narrow round leaves that Allocasuarina verticillata has and have been seen to pull at a high branch and to break it off. New growth will emerge from the top of the break and should be protected in order to grow. If not protected 'Skippy' will very much enjoy the succulent new shoots. It is thought that leaf litter may assist the mycorrhiza fungi that is in our soils.

Allocasuarina verticillata is a large tree and not really suitable for small gardens. It occurs naturally on well drained open scrubland throughout South Eastern Australia and can be observed along some of our local roadside vegetation as well in local paddocks. Once established it is very hardy. Whether it is a tall upright stately specimen or a straggly twisted one it is so interesting to enjoy and marvel what nature has created for us.

Allocasurarina verticillata is such a fascinating plant to observe and appreciate.

Just beautiful.







BIRDS IN MY BACKYARD Julie Buttery, Humbug Scrub

Yeah I know. You are saying "We all know magpies". So let's put a few bushes in our bare paddock and watch the little ones arrive.

First on the scene were Superb Fairy-wrens. We probably know them as blue wrens.

Fairy-wrens are neither fairies nor wrens. With their flicking tails they are quite active little birds. They use the flick of their tail to help scare prey out of cover. But the birds are vulnerable to bigger birds as well as cats and foxes.

Fairy-wrens live in community groups. There is usually one dominant male, who will show off his bright colours. Bright blue tail and wing coverts are distinctive. Females and juveniles are much less brightly endowed. Other mature males will have more colour, but not be as bright as the dominant one. When he grows old, disappears or otherwise loses his status another male will colour up almost overnight and become the dominant one. The colour also becomes brighter in breeding season and less brilliant in the off season.

The female has a beak, eye ring and lores of the same orange-red tone while the male has darker, almost black eyering.

The fairy-wren is an insect eater and can often be seen searching in leaf litter below bushes. They like to roost in low -hanging bushes and wait for their prey to arrive below them. From here they are also hidden from predators, especially hawks. The whole family may embark on a scavenger hunt, moving in quick bursts that may help confuse a predator. The superb fairy-wren scavenges across open ground much more than other fairy-wrens but always needs the safety of scrubby bushes nearby.

There are other fairy-wrens in Australia with colours ranging from the even more blue Splendid Fairy-Wren to red-backed.





KOALA RESCUE NEWS **Bronwyn Wilton**



LEAVING HOME

Human children get to a stage in their lives when it is time to leave home and so it also occurs in Koala world.

Koalas are solitary animals and therefore, they live a solitary life.

During the months in between August and February, it is very common to practice mating within male and female koalas.

By nature, mother koalas are very kind hearted rather than aggressive towards their young koala Joeys and Joeys live with their mothers for 1-2 years, and after that their solitary life starts.

The kind hearted mother may turn to being aggressive towards their Juvenile Koala who now is at a stage to live alone on trees and eat on their own.

Male Koalas are given the boot around 1-2 years of age, but it has been observed that the female juvenile stays close to her mother even when she is to become a mother herself, which can be 2-3 years of age.

Usually by 12 months of age, the youngster is weaned and takes up a home range, which overlaps with its mother, for much of the next year. Between the age of two and three years, these young especially male Koalas, disperse beyond their original home range to establish their

own range, usually during the breeding season.



REMEMBER: Do not pick up a sick koala, it can still inflict serious injuries with its teeth and claws. If you see an injured, sick or orphaned koala please ring our free 24/7 hotline on 0474 737 283

THE MABO CASE

Legal proceedings for the case began on 20 May 1982, when a group of four Meriam men, Eddie Koiki Mabo, Reverend David Passi, Sam Passi, James Rice and one Meriam women, Celuia Mapo Sale, brought an action against the State of Queensland and the Commonwealth of Australia, in the High Court, claiming 'native title' to the Murray Islands.

The Mabo Case challenged the existing Australian legal system from two perspectives:

- On the assumption that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples had no concept of land ownership before the arrival of British colonisers in 1788 (terra nullius).
- That sovereignty delivered complete ownership of all land in the new Colony to the Crown, abolishing any existing rights that may have existed previously.

On 27 February 1986, the Chief Justice, Sir Harry Gibbs, sent the case to the Supreme Court of Queensland to hear and determine the facts of the claim. The Supreme Court judge hearing the case was Justice Moynihan. The hearing was adjourned when Eddie Mabo and the people of Mer brought a second case to the High Court challenging the constitutional validity of the *Queensland Coast Islands Declaratory Act 1985*.

The Queensland Parliament passed the *Queensland Coast Islands Declaratory Act 1985* in an attempt to pre-empt the Meriam peoples' case. The aim of the legislation was to retrospectively extinguish the claimed rights of the Meriam people to the Murray Islands.

As a result, the High Court had to consider whether the Queensland legislation was valid and effective. The High Court found the Queensland Coast Islands Declaratory Act to be invalid because it was in conflict with the <u>Racial Discrimination Act 1975</u>. This case became known as <u>Mabo v. Queensland (No. 1)</u> and the decision meant the original case could continue.

Justice Moynihan resumed the hearing of the facts in the case presented by Eddie Mabo and the people of Meriam with sittings taking place on Murray Island as well as on the mainland.

'After some argument Moynihan J accepted the plaintiffs' request that the court should adjourn and reconvene on Murray Island for three days, to take evidence, particularly from 16 witnesses, mainly elderly and frail, and also to take a view of the claimed areas of garden plots and adjacent seas... When opening proceedings on the Island on 23 May 1989, Moynihan J 'doubted [whether] the Court has ever sat further north or perhaps further east', and certainly never before on Murray Island. On 26–27 May 1989 the Court also sat in the Magistrates' Court of Thursday Island and heard five Islander witnesses. The visit, as Moynihan J noted in his opening statement, provided a better understanding of the evidence, and of island life. It also revealed the first opposition from some Islanders to the claims being made: two Islanders were called by Queensland during these sittings to oppose Eddie Mabo's claims.' – Brian Keon-Cohen, Barrister[i]

Justice Moynihan handed down his determination of facts on 16 November 1990, which meant the High Court could begin it's hearing of the legal issues in the case.

The case presented by Eddie Mabo and the people of Mer successfully proved that Meriam custom and laws are fundamental to their traditional system of ownership and underpin their traditional rights and obligations in relation to land.



Eddie Koiki Mabo was born on 29 June 1936 in his village of Las on the island of Mer in the Torres Strait.



MABO DAY IS CELEBRATED ON JUNE 3

THE DECISION

On 3 June 1992, six of the seven High Court judges upheld the claim and ruled that the lands of this continent were not terra nullius or 'land belonging to no-one' when European settlement occurred, and that the Meriam people were 'entitled as against the whole world to possession, occupation, use and enjoyment of (most of) the lands of the Murray Islands'.

In <u>Mabo v. Queensland (No. 2)</u>, judgments of the High Court inserted the legal doctrine of native title into Australian law. The High Court recognised the fact that Indigenous peoples had lived in Australia for thousands of years and enjoyed rights to their land according to their own laws and customs. They had been dispossessed of their lands piece by piece as the colony grew and that very dispossession underwrote the development of Australia as a nation.

The new doctrine of native title replaced a seventeenth century doctrine of terra nullius on which British claims to possession of Australia were justified on a wrongful legal presumption that Indigenous peoples had no settled law governing occupation and use of lands. In recognising that Indigenous peoples in Australia had prior rights to land, the Court held that these rights, where they exist today, will have the protection of the Australian law until those rights are legally extinguished.

Brian Keon Cohen recalls:

'I rang Murray Island — that is to say, I rang the phone box located, as readers will recall, outside the general store. The conversation went something like this:

"Hello, Bryan Keon-Cohen here, who's that?" [Inaudible.]

"Do you remember Eddie Mabo's case, that court case about land?"

"Yes."

"Well, I'm ringing you from that Court in Canberra where those top judges are, you know, that High Court." "Oh ves."

"Well, those judges, they told us their decision just now: Eddie won. You Murray Islanders have won that court case. You own the island under your laws and custom."

[Screams of what I took to be joy, laughter, yelling, much discussion in the background.]

"Hello! Hello! Is anyone there?" says I.

"Oh thank you, thank you, we are very happy, I have to go and tell my Mum. Goodbye."



The High Court decision in the *Mabo v. Queensland (No.2)* altered the foundation of land law in Australia and the following year the *Native Title Act 1993* (*Cth*), was passed through the Australian Parliament. This opened the way for claims by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples to their traditional rights to land and compensation.
