PLAYFORD COUNCIL - LOCAL COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

I hope that this edition of the Grapevine finds everyone well.

The adoption of the Annual Business Plan (ABP) and Budget is due to be before Council in April 2024 and released for a 28-day Public Consultation shortly thereafter. Unfortunately, the Grapevine dates and the release of the ABP for Public Consultation do not coincide. I will be posting information on my Councillor Facebook page and will be at the One Tree Hill Markets in May to engage and discuss.

I have been advocating for the planning to be done for the upgrade of the One Tree Hill Main Street for many years. The One Tree Hill Urban Design Framework Final Report was prepared in June 2010 with several recommendations. Some of the first priorities were the key Design, investigation and planning work needed to be undertaken for the future with all first priorities to be commenced within 2 years and complete within 4 years. Here we are in 2024, 14 years later looking and advocating for the planning and design work to commence.

Then in September 2020, I met with residents and discussed the delivery of a new footpath in 2020/21 of approximately 350 meters from Jordan Drive along Blacktop Road and towards the OTH Institute. The project was to improve connectivity, safety, and accessibility of the Jordan Drive residents to the township and was being delivered as part of the new Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program with funding received from the Australian Government. Unfortunately, the section of land where the proposed footpath was to be constructed was an Environmental offset area which restricted the construction of the planned footpath.

The design work is in line with our Strategic Plan - overarching theme – Community and City Foundations. The foundational needs were identified by the community and summarised under the following themes;

Community Theme 1

Improving safety and accessibility.

Community Theme 2

Lifting city appearance.

Community Theme 3

Connecting with our community and each other.

Community Theme 4

Supporting Business and local employment opportunities.

Community Theme 5

Using money wisely.

The design and upgrade also align to the criteria in the Strategic plan 2024 to 2028 Connecting Our People. The plan is to focus on areas that help connect our people to each other and their local community.

Hopefully see you at the One Tree Hill Markets just inside the main hall at the community table.

CFS INCIDENT REPORT



Not a lot to write about again this month which is pleasing considering the burst of hot weather at the start of March. The two major fires we attended were both out of our area one at Upper Hermitage which caused a lot of concern locally with the plume of smoke clearly visible from the township, and the other was a fire in peat mulch at Dublin.

The 3rd alarm fire at Upper Hermitage occurred around 3 pm on the 22nd of February and had more than 20 appliances from surrounding areas in attendance including all the trucks from the One Tree Hill station. The fire was in hilly terrain off Warner Road and took over 2 hours to bring under control because of the rough conditions with 4 aircraft doing multiple drops to control the forward spread of the fire.

The mulch fire at Dublin was started by spontaneous combustion in the early hours of the morning on the 15th of March. The One Tree Hill Bulk Water Carrier was called in to assist with laying down a blanket of foam from the CAFS (Compressed Air Foam System) on board. Crews were on the scene for nearly 8 hours before the fire was eventually extinguished.

In addition to these fires, there were 2 fires within a week at Jo Gapper Park on the eastern edge of the Hillbank area, the first at around 1.30 in the morning on the 17th of February which took around 90 minutes to bring under control and the other at around 7 o'clock at night on the 24th. Both of these fires were reported in the press as being suspicious with security camera footage of one of the incidents showing suspects fleeing from the scene.

Crews from Elizabeth MFS and OTH were called to a car fire in nearby Sanctuary Rise on the 13th of March. This fire caused a lot of concern for local residents with the fire blocking the only access road in and out of the neighbourhood and highlighted problems with access into this recently developed area.

Easter is upon us ... already

With the early Easter this year, the usual warning to take care on the roads over this busy period is going to be a bit late for most of us. Hopefully we all had a happy and safe Easter break. It is also that time of year again when the One Tree Hill and Tea Tree Gully Soccer clubs host the Annual CFS Charity Shield in support of the two local Brigades on the 23rd of March. Thanks in advance to the two clubs and their sponsors and there will be more about this event next month.

Just a quick reminder that while the Fire Danger Season ends for some areas of the state on the 15th of April, in the Adelaide Metropolitan and Mount Lofty Ranges areas the finish date is the 30th of April. Please make a note of this and don't get caught out. The current "Indian Summer" still has conditions very dry throughout our area and while we may get milder weather, fires can still catch and spread very quickly until we have significant rain.

KOALA RESCUE NEWS Bronwyn Wilton

Scoliosis

It is a condition in which the spine bends to the side abnormally.

It can result from poor quality nutrition, genetics, and evolutionary flaw or all of these factors. In its early stages a koala with scoliosis can lead a relatively normal life.

As time progresses the curvature reaches a point where there is such pressure on the diaphragm that the koala's breathing becomes difficult as with climbing with them having to spend time on the ground which makes them vulnerable to predators and starvation.

BIRDS IN MY BACKYARD Julie Buttery, Humbug Scrub



It's seven in the morning and another hot day starting. Outside my studio window the small birds are taking advantage of the bird baths. We have two birdbaths, automatically filled four times a day by the garden watering system.

Who is there at the moment? A grey fantail, two whitethroated treecreepers, a female fairy-wren. Oh, here come the red-browed finches, six or seven of them. It won't be long before the New Holland Honeyeaters arrive.

New Holland Honeyeaters are quite confident for little birds. I suspect that is because they always have the backing of a large family group. Ours nest in two bottle-brushes, with several nests to a tree. They will drive away the large birds, especially ravens and currawongs, but also object to rosellas drinking "their" nectar. Their indignant "tchik" as they attack a larger bird has drawn

me from the house several times. Their agile flight through the tree, a bottle-brush and quite dense, amazes me.

The New Holland Honeyeater (NHH) is fairly distinctive in colour, with bold patterns of black and white along the belly and a flash of yellow on the ends of wings and tail. Once recognised, it can only be mistaken for the white-cheeked honeyeater but they don't share the same distribution. NHH are found along the coastal strip from Eyre Peninsula to Brisbane, with a different subspecies in the SW of Western Australian and another in Tasmania. The adult has a white eye ring.

NHH (Phylidonyris novaehollandiae) eat mostly nectar (Who would have thought it, with a name including "honeyeater") but they also eat insects. Watching them around sunset catching insects on the wing is an amazing sight but I am not good enough with the camera to get a shot. They tend to stand on a fence wire and leap from there, returning to the same place. With their long curved beak they can use larger flowers, especially our agapanthus.



WHAT'S FLOWERING IN MY GARDEN Heather Fischer, Humbug Scrub

It's been hot. Extremely hot. Heatwave hot. At the time of writing this article the cool change has arrived with just a sprinkle of moisture. Many trees and shrubs are showing signs of needing a prolonged drink of water but the weather forecasters are not predicting any precipitation in the near future. I'm sure that we will notice shortly that many small trees on our roadsides will die from lack of water in our soils.

The ever reliable Grevillea Peaches and Cream is flowering as well as a few Callistemons (Bottlebrushes). Both of these continue to provide a source of nectar for many Honeyeaters and both have received a drink from a sprinkler during the Summer months. Despite the heatwave, the first beautiful cream and pink puff ball flowers of Hakea Stockdale Sensation have burst open to welcome the start of Autumn.

Eucalyptus goniocalyx, a local eucalypt, has been flowering for the past few weeks. This species of Eucalypt is found throughout the Great Dividing Range with sub species occurring In the Flinders Ranges and the Mt lofty Ranges. This locally growing sub species, found in a small area of Humbug Scrub and Kersbrook, is often referred to as the Long Leafed Box as some of it's pendulous leaves can be up to 30cms in

length. The main trunk has dark grey persistent rough bark and can grow up to 18m high and with a wide canopy this tree becomes a valuable shade tree in the landscape. Clusters of cream coloured flowers open up from lime green small elliptical shaped buds during Summer and Autumn attracting many bees that enjoy the nectar producing flowers. The juvenile pale blue leaves are commercially harvested and are often seen in bunches of flowers. Many trees were burnt during the Sampson Flat bushfire but many survived by producing stunningly beautiful pale silvery blue to pink new growth, often from the lignotuber. The new growth that we saw nine years ago has now matured to support strong branches that are now producing flower buds. The local Koala does not eat leaves of this Eucalypt but many Pardalotes, Silver Eyes, Honeyeaters and Shrike Thrush birds visit daily to clean out any insects that can be found on the branches, leaves and flower buds.

Eucalyptus goniocalyx is such a magnificent tree and our local sub species is special because of its small population. If you have one at your place, nurture any seedlings that may pop up. The rabbits and roos do enjoy the succulent young seedlings.

MENTAL HEALTH - Dr. Lisa Kettler

I wrote recently about why I am passionate about mindfulness and self compassion and would like to share more now about what mindfulness it is all about.

This widely used definition is the one that I like best: mindfulness is awareness that arises through paying attention to, or being in contact with the present moment, on purpose, and non-judgmentally.

This might sound like a very simple idea. All of us have moments in any given day, when we are fully present and engaged in what we are doing. Perhaps it is the first bite of your favourite meal. Perhaps it is when you are watching the cliffhanger ending to season one of your current favourite show on Netflix. Or maybe it's that moment three seconds before the final siren in the AFL grand final, when your team is playing and you're in the crowd at the game.

But how many of these moments are actually free of some aspect of judgement, or of past or future thinking? Is the taste of that meal free of the memory of the last time you ate it? Is your engagement in that cliffhanger free of your possible angst about how long you have to wait until the next season is available? Is that moment of engagement at the footy completely free of your thoughts about whether you will be stuck in traffic for ages on the way home? Perhaps you sometimes realise later that you've gotten more caught up in those reflections and ideas than in experiencing the moment itself. The "on purpose, and non-judgementally" aspects of mindfulness, are not actually that simple!

You might also have noticed that there are times in your day when you've been on autopilot- so caught up in thinking about other things, that you weren't really present when you would like to have been. Perhaps you've had an entire conversation with a family member about something that happened in their day, but you can't remember it a minute later, because you were actually mentally writing a to-do list for tomorrow at the time. Maybe you find yourself arriving in a room in your house and have no idea why you were going there? Sometimes being actually present in the moment you are in is not so simple!

Of course thinking about the past and the future, making judgements and reflecting on our emotions are fundamental aspects of our humanity. We bring them into our present moment experience to help us make sense of it and give it meaning. Those are essential skills! Imagine how bewildering and overwhelming our lives would feel if we couldn't reference the past or think about the future. Likewise, being able to do some things on auto-pilot is a blessing. It reduces our mental load, and gives us time for sense making that we may not otherwise have.

Cultivating mindfulness is not therefore, about trying to stop these essential processes from happening, but it is about noticing them more often, and when we notice them, checking in with ourselves about that; taking a moment to observe the sense making that is happening. If, when we check in, we notice we have become caught up unhelpfully, we now have an option we did not have before; to choose a different response. We create the opportunity for the NEXT moment to be hugely and helpfully different than it may otherwise have been. After all, this moment, RIGHT NOW is a moment we will never again have to experience.

No one can be mindful all the time. But we are all capable of cultivating more mindful moments in our day. Simple cues can help. Try using the first sip of your morning cuppa, or brushing your teeth at night as your reminder to stop, check in with yourself and be fully present, with curiosity and acceptance, for whatever arises.

THE ANZAC BISCUIT

During World War One, friends and families sent food to the fighting men. Due to the time delays in getting food items to the front lines, they had to send food that would remain edible for long periods of time and retained high nutritional value. The Anzac biscuit met this need.

The biscuit was first known as the Soldiers' Biscuit. The current name, Anzac Biscuit, has as much to do with Australia's desire to recognise the Anzac tradition and the Anzac biscuit as part of the staple diet at Gallipoli.

The Anzac biscuit is one of the few commodities that are able to be legally marketed in Australia using the word 'Anzac', which is protected by Federal Legislation.

Although there are variations, the basic ingredients are:

1 cup rolled oats 1 cup plain flour

1 cup firmly packed light brown sugar ½ cup dessicated coconut

125g butter2 tablespoons golden syrup ½ teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1 tablespoon water

Method

- Preheat the oven to 160°C. Grease two oven trays and line them with baking paper.
- Combine oats, flour, sugar and coconut.
- Stir butter, syrup and water in a small saucepan over low heat until smooth, then add the bicarbonate of soda.
- Stir wet mixture into dry mixture until well-combined
- Spoon level teaspoons of the combined mixture onto baking trays, flattening slightly and leaving about three inches of space between each.
- Bake for 20 minutes, allow to cool and enjoy!

Seen any of these garden escapees?

Coolatai grass and fountain grass were both once planted as ornamental garden plants. Both have since escaped from landscaping and urban gardens to run rampant in the hills!





Left: The aggressive Coolatai grass can grow to over 1m in just a few months! Right: Fountain grass may look elegant in full flower but the light fluffy seeds are quick to spread!

Now declared pest plants, both Coolatai grass (Hyparrhenia hirta), also known as tambookie grass and fountain grass (Cenchrys setaceus) are environmental weeds that invade native grasslands, pastures and grassy woodlands threatening biodiversity, reducing pasture quality and increasing fire risk. Fast-growing and drought tolerant, these plants easily outcompete native species in drier habitats. They are also low in nutrition and unpalatable to stock.

Once these plants have gotten away and established in steep gullies they are very difficult to manage, so it is best to promptly control any plants before they spread.

Coolatai grass is already well established on some steep slopes of the Little Para River but we want to stop the spread to new areas. If you see any large unusual grasses suddenly appear on your property please have it identified. Coolatai grass can be confused with the native kangaroo grass (*Themeda triandra*) so be sure to correctly identify plants before controlling.

There are two forms of fountain grass, the highly invasive green leafed fountain grass is quite distinctive once flowering with its mass of fluffy pale pink-purple seed heads, which is not to be confused with the less fertile purple leafed garden variety which is safe to keep.

Observations of weeds can be entered into iNaturalist, an app that assists with identification and maps their distribution.

Spot outbreaks of both weedy grasses have been seen kilometres from main infestations. The best control strategy for both plants is prevention, so continued vigilance on your property for new outbreaks is required to prevent it from establishing.
