

One Tree Hill CFS ~ Incident Report May 2019

Another quiet month this month with only two callouts, one for a tree down at Sampson Flat on the 30th of April and then a call to attend a fluid clean-up on the 15th of May. The second incident involved a motor bike which had hit a kangaroo in the early hours of the morning. There seems to be a lot of wildlife close to the township recently with a large mob of kangaroos spotted near the corner of Blacktop, Precolumb and Crosshill roads and a koala knocked down near Jordan Drive at the start of the month.



Training continues every Monday night and with the low number of incidents, the training officer has introduced more realism into training to help simulate the conditions that we might face at a call-out. Monday the 13th of May saw us simultaneously "respond" to two calls with a tree down on cars in Kaiser Drive and a "call" to the Church where smoke was issuing from the building and people were possibly trapped inside.

The Brigade also attended a large burn conducted by DEWNR on the 28th of April which gave many of the newer members a chance to experience live fire for the first time. DEWNR continues to conduct a number of "cool" burns to control the fuel load at this time of year and if you see a large amount of smoke it is probably one of their burns. Details for these prescribed burns are usually posted on the CFS website if you have any concerns.

Burning in the Open



With the Fire Danger season finally over everyone is keen to get their burning done before we get too much rain. Please refer to your local Council website, either Playford or Adelaide Hills to determine whether you are covered by General Burning Permits or whether you will need to apply individually. Details for Playford were also posted on our OTH CFS Facebook page on the 13th of May. Please take note of the conditions relating to these permits which govern things like the size of the pile, the hours and days that the permit covers and what sort of materials you can burn.

With the cold weather setting in with a vengeance, many of us have started firing up our combustion heaters, but how many of us took the time to check them out before we did? It's not too late and a bit of routine maintenance, particularly when it comes to cleaning your flue, may be all that stands between you and a disastrous chimney fire. A reminder also to make sure that your ashes are completely dead before placing them in combustible containers like wheelie bins.

Playford Council ~ Local Councillor's Report

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

The consultation period for the 2019/20 Draft Business Plans will have past by the time this edition of the Grapevine hits the street. I really hope the community has had the time to consider the Draft Business Plans and complete the online forms.

This Draft Business Plan, if approved will deliver a 3.9% rate increase to the ratepayers of Playford. (The highest rate increase of the metropolitan councils). There are a few dilemmas in the decision-making process, I will be listening carefully to all deputations and feedback.

One of the concerns raised by several residents in this Draft Business Plan has been the debt increase resulting from the budget. These new services are being largely funded from the capital budget resulting in further debt levels and serviced with the increase in rates from the operating budget. This Draft Business Plan will see an increase in our debt by over twenty million, extending our debt to approximately \$169 million.

While the debt levels can provide inter-generational equity, it is my opinion that the City of Playford need to continue with a debt reduction strategy. Recent discussions have confirmed positive plans moving forward to reduce old debt.

We are a growing council and there are needs in services to accommodate this growth. It is a question of what services we need and how these are to be funded. The other area I seek feedback as one of your councillors, is on the delivery of social and youth services. There are many fantastic programmes and services provided through the City of Playford. The question remains however, who should be funding the extension of these programmes. The City of Playford or the State and federal governments?

My focus over the last few months have seen many discussions on driving efficiencies. I feel its time to consider how we sharpen the pencil for reducing expenditure and I have been discussing a few ideas. The power of driving efficiencies has a major effect on the bottom line and reduces future pressure on rates.

It was excellent to see the City of Playford using the Grapevine to advise the community on the Consultation Period for the Draft business Plans and the Burning Permits.



What's Flowering In My Garden?

Rain, rain and more rain. The paddocks are green and the plants have been revived but more rain is needed to seep through to the subsoil.

Many Eucalypts are in flower, showing off shades of red, cream and white. Many other Eucalypts are showing signs of flowering later during winter.

Some Banksias have sent up their colourful flower spikes and the New Holland Honeyeaters are really enjoying foraging along these brightly coloured beautifullspikes. Banksia Coastal Cushion is one of a few low growing, prostrate and compact forms of Banksia spinulosa.

This plant displays small branches that are covered with narrow mid green narrow leaves with it's upright flower spikes appearing at the end of the small branches. Each stunning golden yellow and maroon flower spike is about 20cms long and is visited by many bees.

This plant had to be protected with a wire guard most recently when the hungry kangaroos decided that the flowers made for a tasty meal. Plant this spectacular flowering native in full sun or part shade in well drained soil in a rockery or as a border plant. It may need a little extra water during a dry summer. Plants are available at all good nurseries.

Banksia Coastal Cushion is spectacular when flowering.

Friends of Para Wirra Mark 30 Years of Volunteering



In early May, local volunteer organisation Friends of Para Wirra celebrated 30 years! A celebration was held at Para Wirra Conservation Park with a catered lunch and a special cake to commemorate the occasion, attended by almost 100 people, including most importantly the Friends members themselves, and invited guests and supporters.

On 4th May 1989, the Department of National Parks and Wildlife convened a public meeting at One Tree Hill for those interested in forming a Para Wirra Friends Group. Ted Hughes was elected President, and, with his wife Molly, led the newly formed group for 18 years with great dedication and leadership. The Friends started to collect seeds and propagate plants to revegetate degraded areas in the park, and attacked boneseed and bridal creeper, which were major weed infestations. They became involved in the construction of the walking trails.



In 2002, member activities expanded and a quarterly newsletter was set up. They hosted the annual Friends of Parks Forum, with delegates from every part of the state. They also embarked on sampling the river and lake on behalf of Water Watch, visits to the South Para Biodiversity Nursery to help propagate seedlings, and wildflower walks became regular projects. Members set up a Herbarium, hosted school and club visits, catered for functions at the park, monitored visitor numbers in Hale and Warren Parks and became involved in heritage conservation.

In 2019, the Friends of Para Wirra continue to be an active friendly "family", looking after One Tree Hill's closest conservation park. The important work done by the Friends of Para Wirra is highly valued, and the group should be commended on their efforts and dedication to our community over such a long period of time. The Friends of Para Wirra re always looking for new volunteers to join them. They meet at Para Wirra on the first



Wednesday and third Saturday of each month at 9:00 am, usually at the Park Office, 2 km from main entrance.

OTH Girls To Represent Australia in Orienteering

Maybe you've seen these twin girls on a training run or bike ride around our town, and wondered what they are training so hard for? Here's an explanation! One Tree Hill young people competing on a world stage is always worth hearing about.

Outstanding orienteers Abigail and Joanna George (in Year 11 at Trinity College Senior) have both been named in Australian teams following performances in Western Australia during the recent school holidays.

Joanna has been named in the Australian team for the Junior Worlds in Denmark in July. This is a truly outstanding achievement for Joanna who has been a highly successful competitor at National titles since 2015. She has been named three times (2016, 2017 and 2018) in the Australian AllSchools National Orienteering Team which recognises the outstanding competitors of the championships. Her representation in Denmark will be the first time she competes in Australian colours.

Abigail has been named in the Australian Bushrangers Team to compete in New Zealand in June. She has been named in the U20 women's team to compete in a test match against the New Zealand Pine Stars. She was also named in the Australian AllSchools National Orienteering Team in 2018.

Both girls have also been successful in winning three consecutive SSSSA Cross Country Team titles for Trinity College in 2016, 2017 and 2018.



One Tree Hill Area Weeds of Concern

Capeweed (Arctotheca calendula) is an agricultural weed in South Australia. Agricultural weeds affect field cropping, horticulture, and livestock grazing, and reduce the quantity and quality of agricultural products. They affect quantity through yield loss due to competition, and by acting as alternate hosts to pathogens, viruses and insect pests. Weed

presence can lead to increased effort needed during harvesting and indirectly cause crop damage through the application of control activities. Quality of agricultural commodities is affected by smaller size, poorer appearance and contamination of crops, and through poisoning or injury to livestock. Agricultural weeds costs money and time, and control measures can impact on the natural environment.

Capeweed is a common weed of pastures, crops and roadsides, but also quite common in disturbed bushland. It competes with pasture grass and clover, and in the home garden with herbaceous and lawn plants. It is native to the Cape of Good Hope in South Africa.

Capeweed is an autumn/winter germinating, stemless annual herb. Nearly all the seed germinates within a few weeks of the autumn rains

and late germinations in crops are not common. It grows rapidly in warm temperatures often smothering companion plants in early winter. As plants mature they develop into a rosette, or whorl of leaves close to the ground. Capeweed rosettes are similar to storksbill, crowsfoot, bittercress, and mustards, but can be identified by the undersides of the leaves

which are whitish and covered by a thick mat of short hairs. The leaves 30-250 mm long are deeply lobed and succulent. Yellow petalled daisy flowers about 40 mm diameter with a black to brown centre appear in spring on individual 200 mm stalks. The tiny woolly fruits are topped by minute scales.

Capeweed is nutritious to stock and is valued by some graziers. However, during winter capeweed has a higher (90-95%) water content than other pasture plants (80-90%). This may restrict the amount of feed an animal grazing mainly capeweed can eat. Capeweed can cause nitrate or nitrite poisoning in sheep and cattle but this is rare. Milk from dairy cows may be tainted if they are grazing mainly capeweed. Once mature and dry the plants break up quickly, leaving virtually no feed or cover on the area over summer. This leaves the ground open to soil erosion during this period.

Capeweed can be controlled by spraying with a herbicide. While spraying appears to offer an easy option, effective pest control with chemicals requires planning, knowledge, application skills and a high level of management. The leaf area to be sprayed needs to be large enough to absorb sufficient chemical for it to be effective. In case of Capeweed, spray when the rosettes are approximately 15cm in diameter.


However, there are other options available that reduce reliance on chemicals, and which can be much safer. Allowing Capeweed to germinate, then killing it early by cultivating before sowing or

planting, will reduce the number of weed seeds that germinate in the crop. If there is a high population of Capeweed, then consider growing it as a cover crop then slashing before the weed crop sets seed to establish a mulch. Alternatively, dig it in as a green manure. Either method will break the weed's lifecycle by preventing seed set and will also improve soil condition. In

the case of Capeweed in a garden, the right option might be to hoe or hand-pull the weeds.


