

#### PLAYFORD COUNCIL - LOCAL COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

I hope this edition of the Grapevine finds everyone well.

The City of Playford Rate Rebates 2024/25 was before the Strategy and Services Committee Meeting on Tuesday the 14<sup>th of</sup> May 2024 with a staff recommendation to move into confidence. While there is a need for some information to be held in confidence, we need to have greater transparency on these matters that are relevant to all ratepayers. I was the only Elected Member that voted against the matter being held in confidence. It is unfortunate that ratepayers are unable to watch the debate to really understand what is occurring behind the scenes.

The positive news is that we have in large maintained the Rural Rebates and the chamber supported the release of the Committee Resolution. The Committee Resolution will now need to be supported in a coming Ordinary Council Meeting.

Thank you to the residents of Humbug Scrub and Yattalunga that have been raising their concerns with the ever-increasing numbers of feral deer. They certainly have been wreaking havoc on gardens and impacting road safety. The initial discussions with our local Green Adelaide Landscape Officer have recommended residents using the Feral Scan Pest Mapping App. This information can be used to monitor populations, and to better target pests through coordinated pest control programs.

I am seeking support from landowners to see a proactive and coordinated approach to reducing the deer population. If you are interested, please give me a call for further information and register your interest.

#### **CFS INCIDENT REPORT JUNE 2024**



#### Incident Report Incident Report

Unfortunately, the end of Fire Danger season did not mean the end of the grass fires, with the Brigade called to five grass fires between the 1st and the 7<sup>th</sup> of May. The two major ones were a 2<sup>nd</sup> alarm fire at Salisbury Heights and an out-of-control burn-off in Lower Hermitage around 3:30 pm on the 7<sup>th</sup> and involved 17 vehicles and 4 drops from the fire bombers before it was brought under control. The steep terrain in the area made the firefighting difficult and crews remained on scene until midnight to mopping up.

Other fires within our area, since the end of April, were on Kurrajong Road at Gould Creek on the 4<sup>th</sup> of May, Humbug Scrub Road at Humbug Scrub about an hour later, and Blackburn Road at Hillbank on the 6<sup>th</sup>. Prior to the end of the month we had attended two other fires, one reported as an unattended fire in a paddock on One Tree Hill Road at Gould Creek on the 17<sup>th</sup> of April. In the other, a property owner and neighbours on Toolunga Road had an unwelcome fright on the 22<sup>nd</sup> when an electrical fault in a rainwater pump set fire to the surrounding undergrowth. Fortunately, the fire occurred at night which meant favourable weather conditions stopped the fire spreading before crews were able to knock it down.

Apart from a call to assist the SA Ambulance with a patient lift, the other 5 incidents for the month were all Vehicle accidents with 4 of them involving cars into trees. Two of these were on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of April with one at 6:40 am on Hannaford Hump Road at Gould Creek, and the second was at 8.20 pm on the corner of Black Top and Yorktown Roads. These are both very common accident sites, Hannaford Hump Road in particular, where the slippery road has led to the demise of many vehicles over recent years.

The others were Gawler One Tree Hill Road on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of May, Uley Road on the 5<sup>th</sup> of May (also a local accident "hot spot", and on Yorktown Road just out of Craigmore on the 12<sup>th</sup>.

#### Winter is coming ...

We hope! Hopefully, by the time you are reading this article that the weather has broken, and we have had some substantial rain, if not, please be careful and comply with the regulations if you are burning off. Remember, amongst other things, that there must be someone in attendance until the fire is extinguished and they must have the equipment and water available to extinguish the fire if it looks like getting out of control.

If the rain does come, the roads will be extra slippery for the first couple of weeks. Over long dry periods there is a build up of grime on the roads which makes them treacherous if you are not driving to the conditions. As we have seen this month there were already too many accidents, so please be careful on the roads.

A reminder for people who use fuel burning heaters of any type in their houses and sheds, whether that be a kerosene heater in your house (do they still make those?), an overhead heater on the patio or a jetfire in your shed. Anything that burns fuel also produces Carbon Monoxide, which is a silent killer. Please make sure the area is well ventilated when using these types of burners.

Thanks once again to the cadets for their assistance with the Anzac Day ceremony, it was a great turn-out and congratulations to the organising committee. We also want to thank the owners of Da Vinci café who donated a bain marie, kitchen appliances and cutlery to the brigade. We wish them well in their future endeavours.

#### BIRDS IN MY BACKYARD Julie Buttery, Humbug Scrub

Recently someone mentioned that the gums look like they are dying, that the dry weather is killing them. I think it is thrips causing the yellowing of the leaves. If you look at the leaves they have tiny insects on them. These thrips suck the juice from the leaf and kill the leaf. The useless leaf is dropped by the tree. I suggested that there would soon be a biological control to these insects and within a few days they arrived.

Thornbill birds are insect (including thrip) eaters and they arrived in large numbers. For the first time I was able to identify three species of Thornbill at home.

Thornbills are of the genus *Acanthiza* and are tiny birds, with wing spans of about ten centimetres and weights of around five to ten grams. Yep, that is about the weight of one to two teaspoons of water. They are sometimes referred to as LBB (Little Brown Birds) in spotters' lists as they can be difficult to identify as they fly through the tree canopy. But if you can get a clear view of their rump it is much easier. Hence my hundreds of photos for the one which shows me what I am looking for. Thank goodness for digital cameras.

The Buff-rumped Thornbill (A reguloides) seems to be the most common here although I frequently confuse it with the Yellow-rumped Thornbill (A chrysorrhoa), also a common visitor. In general the yellow-rumped seems to be bigger, stronger and brighter in all aspects. The rump is brighter yellow, the crown is more strongly spotted, with a slight supercilium, the song is louder and more melodic and the bird is about TWO grams larger. Ha ha, like you will notice that as they fly through the crown of a eucalypt.

Both species forage on the ground as well as enjoying those thrips high in the trees, with the yellow-rump more likely to be on the ground than the buff-rump.

The third species I have observed, and only a single bird multiple times in the same location, is the Chestnut-rumped Thornbill. *A uropygialis* has (surprise!) a chestnut rump patch otherwise is very similar to the other two. The breast is much paler but the rump really caught my eye as it flashed through the tree. The scalloping (spots) on the head are fainter than the others but still present especially in adults.

In all these species the tail is black.

The call or song of all these is a high pitched "pzt" or "pitapitta" although the experts can tell the differences. The actual song varies on their activity, including alarms, foraging, mating or territorial.

So next time you see the leaves browning off, begin to look for the tiny biological controls that arrive soon after, thornbills.







#### WHAT'S FLOWERING IN MY GARDEN

The sun is shining, the skies are blue but there is no rain forecast for the near future. My goodness, so many of our local native trees and shrub s are really struggling due to the lack of moisture. If the weather forecastors' predictions come to fruition, we are in for a wet Winter and Spring and, perhaps, another la Nina Summer. We will wait and we will really appreciate the rain when it finally comes.

Hakea Stockdale Sensation plants with their stunningly beautiful puff ball shaped cream, pink and crimson flowers are flowering and are just beautiful but I had to give them a good drink of water as most flowers were very droopy. Many Correas want to open their colourful buds but are just waiting for a splash of moisture but there are enough open flowers to keep the nectar loving birds happy.

It is at this time of the season during mid to late Autumn that many of the Australian East Coast Banksias begin to show off their stunningly beautiful flowers. Many Banksia spinulosa varieties have been created over the years ranging from small ground cover plants to small specimens suitable for large pot culture as well as medium sized rounded shaped plants up to 1.5m high and wide. One variety of Banksia spinulosa is known as Black Magic. This plant will grow to 1.5 m wide and high and is suitable to grow in rockeries, gardens and large pots. Growing in full sun to part shade in well drained sandy loamy soils, this plant, once established should be drought tolerant. It would be wise to observe this and other plants to provide them with a drink of water if the plant looks a little stressed from needing a good drink. Banksia spinulosa Black Magic bears large eye catching tall cylindrical spikes of rich golden honey yellow coloured flowers that are tipped with black styles. These stunning flower spikes are borne on this evergreen dark green grey leaved bush to which many nectar loving

birds and insects are attracted. I marvel at the ability of the Eastern Spinebills to hover close to flowers and seek nectar using their long curved beaks. Just amazing. This plant and other varieties of Banksia spinulosa can be purchased from most good nurseries and once established will provide many months of stunningly attractive flower spikes. Many seed loving birds eg Cockatoos will enjoy munching of seed that is encapsulated in old flower spikes.

Banksia spinolosa is such a worthwhile plant for any garden. Find one or two, nurture them and enjoy the flowers and the many birds that will visit your garden.

#### MENTAL HEALTH - Lisa Kettler

What comes to mind for you when you say the words "self compassion" to yourself? Did saying those words evoke a positive, neutral or negative response for you? Some of you might have noticed a feeling of warmth or relief at the idea of offering yourself compassion, or may already have an active self compassion practice. Others may have experienced curiosity or interest about a new idea. Some people will likely have noticed a feeling of wariness, maybe a dismissive (cue the eye roll) "whatever" response. And for some people the idea of self compassion may have evoked an "ick" factor or even an outright rejection.

Perhaps just take a moment to notice where your response to this idea comes from. Is it a response

coming from your personal or family history? Perhaps a response that feels part of the culture or environment you were raised in? Is it something else you notice? If your response to the idea was a negative one, is that a belief you want to continue to hold? If yes, why do you think that might be?

The idea of self compassion is fundamentally a simple one, fleshed out in detail by Dr Kristen Neff in her book "Self-Compassion - the proven power of being kind to yourself." It is predicated on the idea that just by virtue of being a member of the human race, you are worthy of compassion during times of suffering. Compassion is considered to be a basic human right, afforded to us all. You don't have to do or be anything special in order to deserve this and in fact it is *because* you are just as messily human and flawed in your own unique ways as any other person that you are worthy of experiencing compassion.

Perhaps just take a moment to let that land with you.......

To be human is to experience difficult events and emotions and yet many of us routinely exclude ourselves from the circle of those we offer compassion to when these things occur, either through benign neglect, or perhaps views that offering compassion to ourselves is weak, lazy, self indulgent or selfish. Moreover, not only may we fail to offer ourselves the same compassion we might offer to a friend, loved one or colleague in a time of suffering, but we take it a step further and engage in some pretty harsh self-criticism in response to our own failings and our own suffering. Many of us are much more harsh towards ourselves than we would be to even a person we don't like!

If the idea of self compassion still feels uncomfortable or you still have "but what about..." questions, the following may be of interest. The research in the area of self compassion is compelling: individuals who are self compassionate are in fact more likely to be caring and compassionate towards others, to cope better with adversity, are more likely to engage in realistic perspective taking and more likely to take greater personal responsibility for their actions. They are also more likely to persist after failure.

#### ALL BUTTS ARE DIFFERENT

Koalas have white sporting on their bottoms, these spots are unique to each koala and these markings stay with them for life and never change. Therefore these markings can be used to identify an individual koala.

The spots also act as a camouflage, when a koala is sitting up in a tree the patches of white appear to be clouds or light coming through the tree canopy's and can therefore make a koala hard to spot.

#### Winter weed watch

Discover 4 declared weeds that respond to winter rains. These are best controlled early in the season to prevent spring seed set.



#### Coolatai grass (Hyparrhenia hirta)

Coolatai grass is a dense, long-lived, clumping grass growing to around 1m high. It has thin grey-green leaves, with silky flowers growing in v shaped pairs, at the end of the stalks. Coolatai grass persists under heavy grazing and burning. It can form dense monocultures taking over large areas impacting on both biodiversity and pastures and is difficult to control once established. Juvenile plants can be confused with native kangaroo grass so best to confirm before controlling. This is a notifiable weed and sightings should be reported to your regional landscape board.


#### Gazania (Gazania spp.)

The gazania genus is an escaped garden plant comprised of multiple species which can hybridise freely. Flowers are brightly coloured, commonly yellow or orange. Gazanias are highly invasive, hardy plants, growing on most soil types. Growing in clumps they can form dense carpets covering large areas, excluding other plants and impacting on biodiversity. If you have these in your garden, replace with an alternative plant to prevent them from spreading.



#### Wild artichoke (Cynara cardunculus)

Wild artichoke produces annual leaves and flowers from a perennial taproot which is large and fleshy. They can grow to 1.5m high and 1.6m wide and can form dense populations of prickly vegetation that smothers pasture. The long, rigid spines on the leaves and flowers deter grazing animals and can cause injury to stock and people. Concerted efforts to control this prickly weed over the years has seen a great reduction of its occurrence across the hills.



These species sprout leaves and flowers annually from bulbs through winter and early spring. Plants have either 1 or 2-3 long strappy flat leaves and salmon pink or orange flowers that emerge on stems up to 60 cm high. Cape tulip impacts on biodiversity in native bushland and the toxic plants also invade grazing paddocks reducing pasture quality.

When undertaking weed control, select the appropriate method and herbicide for your situation. What may suit pasture control may not suit control in areas of native vegetation. If using herbicide always read the label to ensure it is suitable for its intended purpose and can be used safely. Care should be taken to avoid native and desirable plants, and always check plant identification as some native species may look very similar to weeds.

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
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
