

PLAYFORD COUNCIL - LOCAL COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

I hope this Edition of the Grapevine finds you well. It has been a dry winter, and we can only hope to receive the much needed rain during spring for the countryside and the rainwater tanks.

Speeding and Safety Concerns -Blacktop Road and Township - Roadside Meeting.

Thank you to everyone who braved the wet weather and attended our roadside engagement on the 17^{th of} August with Rhiannon Pearce MP and Peter as the representative from the ministers. It was positive to see open, frank and robust discussion on the speeding and safety concerns with Rhiannon and the minister's representative. There were several suggestions raised for further consideration and hopefully we will receive updates soon.

I am also pleased to hear that the Department for Infrastructure and Transport has undertaken a review of speed limits,

following the communities concern. As a result of the review, the Department will reduce the speed limit on both Yorktown Road and Blacktop Road from 100km/h to 80km/h. The signage and reduced speed limits are expected to be in place by the end of October. I'd also like to say thank you to everyone who has contacted Rhiannon Pearce MP and me with feedback.

McGilp Recreation Park update:

- 1. The civil and construction company BluBuilt has been secured for the delivery of the upgrade works.
- 2. To facilitate this major upgrade, portions of the oval and current parking areas will be temporarily unavailable from Friday the 23^{rd of} August until mid-2025, with temporary fencing being installed.
- 3. The City of Playford will communicate directly with a key contact at each tenant club via email about any temporary relocation and alternative arrangements.
 - OTH Tennis Club, the gravel area near the tennis courts, currently used for parking, will also be closed from this date. The tennis club will be relocated to the Playford Tennis Centre for the duration of the project.
 - **OTH Soccer Junior teams** will relocate to Uley Reserve for training and games to align with the senior teams.
 - **OTH Cricket** to relocate to Uley Reserve for training in the cricket nets and games to be played at the eastern end of Uley Oval.
 - **OTH Scouts**, vehicle access to the Scout Hall will be provided, as the scouts will continue to be based at the precinct over the project, however its entry points will change periodically.

This area and other areas will be closed from Friday 23 August 2024 for the McGilp Recreation Park Upgrade



- 4. Access to a portion of the oval will always be maintained for the school and public use. However, the point of access to the oval may change over the course of construction to accommodate different stages of the project.
- 5. The verge area across from the primary school will be upgraded into formal parking bays and the area will be completely closed during construction.
- 6. The City of Playford will communicate with the OTH Primary School giving relevant updates to be passed onto parents and caregivers as the project progresses.

CFS INCIDENT REPORT AUGUST 2024



The brigade attended 9 callouts this past month including 3 vehicle fires, 2 out of area structure fires, 2 vehicle accidents, one tree down and one call to assist SA ambulance services with a patient lift.

It is alarming that nefarious members of the public view our quiet township and surrounds as the ideal location to commit vehicle arson. The brigade attended three suspicious vehicle fires this month. The first occurred on Kersbrook Rd on the morning of the 23rd of July. The vehicle had been burning for some time before a CFS member passing by reported the vehicle fire. Crews quickly extinguished the vehicle and handed over the scene to SA Police.

The second vehicle fire occurred on Uley Rd at 1.15am in the vicinity of the water tank. OTH 34P and OTH 34 responded finding a vehicle fully involved. A Breathing apparatus (BA) trained fire fighter extinguished the vehicle while crew members from OTH 34 provided traffic control. SA Police attended locating suspicious containers of accelerant nearby.

The third vehicle fire occurred on Blacktop Rd just east of the quarry entrance at Gould Creek at 9.57pm on the 2nd of August. Again, OTH 34P and OTH 34 responded arriving to find the vehicle fully involved requiring 2 BA trained crewmembers to extinguish the blaze. This fire posed additional threats to crews with exploding tyres and magnesium in the vehicle. SA Police attended and crew from OTH 34 provided traffic management on a difficult stretch of Blacktop Rd.

The out of area structure fires on 22nd and 29th of July saw Para Bulk Water 10 respond to provide additional water for both MFS and CFS crews on scene at Virginia and St Kilda respectively. The Virginia structure fire was fortunately an abandoned house with no reported injuries, while the St Kilda fire kept crews busy as a large pile of rubbish had ignited. Compressed Air Foam (CAFS) was applied to cap and smoother the fire.

The first motor vehicle accident (MVA), car v tree, occurred on a private property on One Tree Hill Rd at Gould Creek on the 16th July at 11.20pm. The second, car v embankment, occurred on One Tree Hill Rd just east of the Hannaford Hump Rd turnoff towards Snake Gully at 11.15pm on 29th of July. Fortunately, no one was seriously injured in either accident with crews administering basic first aid until SA Ambulance services arrived. On both occasions two trucks rolled with a full complement of crew.

The assist Emergency Services incident occurred on the 26th of July at 11.25pm on Cornishmans Hill Rd at One Tree Hill. OTH 34P crew assisted SA Ambulance Service with a patient lift. The crew were able to expedite the patients retrieval and subsequent transportation to hospital. Considering the late call out times and the cold weather on these incidents, the crew turn out provides a testament to the dedication and sense of community spirit the OTH CFS brigade members possess.

The final incident occurred within the township on Jordan Drive at 5.25am on the 20th of July. OTH 34P responded to a larger tree blocking most of Jordan drive and a residents driveway. Para Car 2 also attended bring with it another chainsaw and chainsaw operator to assit with removal of the tree. The crews took around 45 minutes to clear the fallen tree and reopen the road.

AGM and Community Open day update.

The OTH Brigade held its Annual General Meeting, in attendance were the outgoing and incoming Deputy Group Officer. The brigade looks forward to working with Brad and thanks to Gerry for his support and guidance over the years. This was a non-voting year, so no leadership positions have changed. A massive shout out to the Kitchen crew who provided an excellent spread for dinner prior to the AGM. The kitchen crew has been going from strength to strength thanks to their dedication and willingness to assist the brigade at every opportunity.

Planning is well underway for the upcoming Community Open day on Sunday 7th of September. There will be live and static displays on the day, and we welcome everyone to come along and visit with us. CFS Community Engagement will be present, and it also gives any prospective member the opportunity to engage with current brigade members. Their may also be a launch of something the brigade has never done before. Mark the Community open day in your calendars and stay tuned to our Facebook page for more details closer to the date.

A special thank you to the local resident that allowed the brigade access to their property to conduct our annual chainsaw training and skills maintenance. With the mix of slightly warmer weather and regular rains, consider keeping on top of those areas close to your property and surrounding buildings that may pose a fire risk if they become overgrown. As always, be vigilant within the township and surrounding areas and drive to the road conditions.

KOALA RESCUE NEWS - Bronwyn Wilton

Chlamydia is an obligate intracellular gram negative bacteria, which means it needs to live and reproduce inside the cells of a host.

In Koalas, Chlamydiosis is primarily a sexually transmitted disease that requires close contact from an infected animal. But can also be transferred from mother to Joey. The organism does not survive outside the host cells, although the **elementary bodies** (which are like spores) can remain infectious for longer, maybe 3 days in ideal conditions of temperature and humidity, outside the host. Humans cannot get the chlamydia that Koalas get as it is an entirely different bacteria, so there is no concern whilst handling a Koala that one would be exposed to getting Chlamydia but there has to be care that one does not transfer the chlamydia strain to other Koalas if a carer.

Chlamydia in Koalas can effect one or all of these organs:

- Eyes (ocular)
- Lungs
- Kidneys
- Reproductive organs.....female can become sterile.









<u>REMEMBER:</u> Do not pick up a sick koala, it can still inflict serious injuries with its teeth and claws. If you see an injured, sick or orphaned koala please ring our free 24/7 hotline on 0474 737 283

KEEPING KIDS SAFER AROUND PADDOCKS AND OUTDOOR AREAS — Leah Meier

There is no doubt that growing up in One Tree Hill is pretty special. Whether you live in the township, are a "blocky" or have a larger land holding, you likely value the outdoor spaces that are on offer for the kids, grandkids or visiting little people. With all that fun and adventure, it is important to remain mindful of potential hazards and have plans in place to reduce and manage the risks. Maybe you are new to the area, or it has been some years since your own kids mucked around in the paddock, but before any new visitors arrive it is useful to take some time to consider areas that kids will have access to.

According to the Australian Government (FarmSafe Australia) the most common causes of injury and fatality for children on farms in Australia is water, motorised equipment, animals, chemicals (exposure through ingesting, inhaling, absorption and injection) and confined spaces. And while you may not have a silo or guad bike on your property, a number of these hazards are likely to be found in many of our yards. (Some really good information about quad bikes and motorised equipment can be found at Kidsafe SA and FarmSafe Australia provided below).

Safety around water needs to include more than pools and bathtubs. It is important to consider the sometimes less obvious water bodies on your property, winter creeks, dams, stock feeders/waterers, rusting tanks and even old drums and metal, can all hold water. Preventing children's access as well as active supervision is key.

As well as farm chemicals many common gardening and cleaning products can be very harmful. Managing any hazardous products should include locking them away securely, always keeping them in their original containers as these have important labels, checking for damaged packaging and if you need to dispose of chemicals do so in accordance with local rules and keep them locked away until you're taking them to dispose of.

Even in smaller back yards, having a designated play area with age-appropriate outdoor activities as far away from driveways, shedding and other hazards makes sense. Providing kids with fun outdoor activities that involve some level of calculated risky play and discovery in an area you can supervise, is a better option then allowing them to wonder off unchecked. Check the condition of any improvised or purchased play equipment and trim kid eye level branches. Check the state of their favourite climbing tree, have an understanding of their capacities and be realistic about what kids can safely manage. What was in good working order when your kids were little is unlikely to be safe years later if grandkids or visitors pop over.

There is a saying to never work with kids or animals, but they are usually some of the best things in our lives. Teaching kids to interact with farm animals can be really rewarding for you and the children, with supervision even small kids can be shown how to approach farm animals with respect, however active supervision is always needed. Kidsafe SA also suggests separating dogs and any visiting children and staying within reach if a dog is nearby.

If something does go wrong, have a plan in place. Ensure yourself, visitors and kids understand how to raise help if needed, including how to use a mobile to phone 000 and what your property's address details are. Be aware that there are still areas in One Tree Hill that have limited phone reception (yes my folks live in one!). Having a properly stocked first aid kit and being up to date with first aid training should also be on your list.

Children are naturally very curious, however most children, particularly young children are unable to assess risk in new activities no matter how much we discuss dangers with them. Age appropriate discussions with kids about boundaries and putting safety rules in place can be beneficial, but removing and separating hazards and providing active supervision from an adult who is familiar with your property and aware of the hazards is the best way to help keep kids safer.

BIRDS IN MY BACKYARD Julie Buttery, Humbug Scrub

Going for my morning stroll I hear so many birds. To-day's score is being played by: a lone New Holland Honeyeater, Australian Wood Ducks (sounds like a pair), Rainbow Lorikeets, Australian Magpies (a whole family in full chorus), two pair of galahs, Little raven, Grey currawongs, Red-browed finches (a large flock – about twenty) and, the pièce de résistance the Grey Shrike-thrush.

The first tone from the shrike-thrush this morning was a wolf whistle. You know the sound: twit-twoo. But his full range is a glorious melody, varying with reason for singing. He has an alert, a wooing ("come hither young lady") and a challenge. He even slides from the wooing to the challenge if you copy his call, as my husband does occasionally.

Even the name of this beautiful bird indicates his song has been admired for many years. He is Colluricincla **harmonica**. (Bold text to draw your attention to it).

Mr Harmonica sings the most but occasionally his ladywife will reply and her song, although not as varied, is just as melodic. Sometimes it sounds to my fanciful ear that she is scolding him for replying to the assumed challenge of my husband, or his own reflection in my window. He appears at first glance to be a plain grey bird but on close examination there are shades of grey and brown. With a distribution over all of Australia, there are many slight variations in tone of brown and grey, with five subspecies being identified.

They eat insects and small vertebrates, hunting through branches and leaf litter. They are about twelve to fifteen centimetres long.

Although extremely shy, our pair have become habituated to our presence and even built a nest outside my craft room window. From there I was able to watch the building, egg laying and hatching.

A few notes/requests:

- 1: do not climb to look inside a nest. You will cause it to be abandoned.
- 2: My window wears a net curtain on the outside during mating season, to reduce the chance of bird strikes or wasted time and energy in challenges.



WHAT'S FLOWERING IN MY GARDEN

Spring is almost upon us with the depths of a cold Winter becoming a memory. We have had some rain but much more is needed as we have had, this Winter season, about half of our average rainfall. The grass may be green but some dam levels are still quite low. Many Wattles are in bloom bringing a bright splash of golden yellow amongst the trees and shrubs along our roadsides and in our paddocks.

All plants have responded to the recent rains with many pretty Thryptomenes and Correas now in full flower and new growth showing on many plants. Quite a few Hakeas have been flowering over Winter providing much needed nectar for the bees and the nectar loving birds. The tall Hakea multilineata with it's creamy pink puff ball flowers and Hakea franscisiana with it's red cylindrical spikes have been a delight to enjoy. Hakea clavata, planted about 8 years ago is flowering for the first time. This small open growing shrub, growing up to 1m x 1m, is unusual as it does look like a cactus. The only similarity to a cactus is the nasty tiny spike that grows on the end of this plant's mid green fleshy but thick rounded flat edged leaves. Always wear sturdy gloves when working near this most unusual Australian native plant.

This small scrambling plant grows naturally along the coastal regions near Esperance and inland into the Eyre region. It is a very hardy plant that prefers to grow in full sun and will grow on well drained sandy loamy soils. Hakea clavata, with the common name of Coastal Hakea, bears beautiful small puff ball type clusters of flowers that appear along the stems at the base of the leaves. The flower colour is a subtle mauve dusky pink but as the flowers age the colour changes to a pale pink and flowering finishes as a white cluster of flowers. The New Holland Honeyeaters, Lesser Honeyeaters, Eastern Spinebills and the Red Wattle Birds are enjoying foraging for nectar as well as the bees. This plant does grow from cuttings and is available from good nurseries from time to time. Hakea clavate has taken a long time to flower but the wait to see and enjoy it's lovely flowers has been so worthwhile.

MENTAL HEALTH & THE COST OF LIVING - NATASHA STEEN

Recently I visited a workplace to talk on the topic of **Mental Health and the Cost of Living**. This may sound a little odd, and I initially thought the same, but I soon realised the relevance. This employer was very clever, as they were keen to address some of the underlying factors that are placing people at risk of poorer states of mental health.

It makes sense that we try to learn more about what may lead to declining mental health and encourage prevention, where possible. My presentation shared information about cost of living pressures and how we approach people who may need wellbeing support.


Please consider that there are many signs and symptoms that people may be sliding into poorer states of mental health. The key thing to look out for is any "deviation from a person's normal".

Here are some of the key things that we might observe and may mean it is worth checking in on them:

- Person is avoiding usual activities or events
- Not completing things they may normally do
- Using alcohol or drugs more than usual
- Talking very negative or approaching you on personal topics
- Seeming very emotional
- Significant changes in physical health, exercise patterns or diet

If you are willing to reach out to someone who appears to be struggling it would be good to try to ask "RUOK"... but if it seems to relate to the cost of living...you need to keep the following in mind:

- Be aware of stigma often there is a lot of pride and privacy may be important
- The link between financial strain and mental health may not be noticed or accepted
- The impact on mental health may not be obvious and may steadily creep in
- Other unhealthy habits may set in gambling, dishonesty, substance abuse
- Taking care of Mental Health may not be a priority in the scheme of other challenges



 If money is a challenge, reactions can be diverse – from depressed to inflated ego

Most of us are feeling the pinch of inflation rises. Many of us are juggling the impact as best as we can. Some of us may need a little more support. Take care on these testing times and reach out to others where you can.

I might add ...my presentation did involve sharing some money saving tips, budgeting tools and resources. I don't proclaim to be an economist and I am certainly not a Financial Counsellor, so I won't share anything extensive, however here are a couple of very helpful resources that may be valuable:



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
