#### PLAYFORD COUNCIL - LOCAL COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

I hope this edition of the Grapevine finds everyone well.

As the bushfire season is approaching it is important to note that the General Notice - Burning Permits ends on the 30<sup>th</sup> of October 2024. This is a month before the actual fire danger season starts on the 1st December 2024, unless the date is moved forward to an earlier time. It is important to note that residential areas are excluded from burning permits and this includes the OTH township.

#### **Uley Road Cemetery**

After many discussions and the completion of the ground penetrating (GPR) survey the city operations team have included the Uley Road Cemetery in their work program regarding ongoing maintenance and repairs. The further items such as shelters, signage and seating will need to be determined through the Annual Budget process.

#### **One Tree Hill Cemetery**

The City of Playford is now planning the engagement of the contractor for the GPR survey. It is unfortunate that there have been so many delays in this process however we will continue advocating for the desired outcomes.

The heritage wall and the stormwater to the cemetery was included in this year's ABP, and depending upon the design outcomes, it is intended that construction will be included in the 2025/26 renewal program.

# McGilp Recreation Park: Summary to update as of mid-October 2024

The City of Playford has been monitoring progress and reports:

- Steelwork and reinforcement for the changeroom footings complete. Concrete slab being completed.
- · Carpark subgrade earthworks completed
- Tennis court subgrade earthworks completed
- New irrigation line to oval extension completed
- Stormwater to northern end of oval partially completed

The City of Playford provided the school with an information leaflet for the recommencement of the term and will continue to monitor the traffic flows and effectiveness of the traffic management measures.

#### **Speeding in the OTH Township**

Residents are continuing to raise their concerns of speeding through the township with suggestions of larger 50 signs and 50 approaching signage to be installed. Please give me your feedback. I'll be raising your feedback and advocating with our local MP Rhiannon Pearce as Blacktop Road is a Department road.

## **CFS INCIDENT REPORT OCTOBER 2024**

OTH CFS Brigade attended 11 callouts this past month, including 2 burn offs, 4 vehicle fires, 4 vehicle accidents, and one spill

clean-up callout. The 17<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> of September were our busiest day this month with two incidents on each day.

The past month saw two incidents on the 17<sup>th</sup> of September, the first when crews were called to an oil spill on Yorktown Rd near Yelki Rd. A truck had spilled oil for approx. 50m. The crew used a spill kit to soak up and clean the road. The same day OTH34P turned out to a Motor Vehicle accident (MVA), Car v Motorbike. The incident occurred on Humbug Scrub Rd near the Bassnet Rd intersection.

Crews attended a car fire on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of September. The occupant of the car noticed smoke from the bonnet and dash. Crew quickly extinguished the vehicle without further incident.

Another MVA involving two cars occurred on Blacktop Rd on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of September.

We believe that the notorious uneven surface of Blacktop Rd-Williams Rd intersection was the cause of another MVA on 26<sup>th</sup> of September.

Crews were called to another MVA on the 28<sup>th</sup> of September at Blacktop Rd past the quarry entrance.

September 30<sup>th</sup> saw the brigade called out to a structure fire. Upon arrival crews found a boat on a trailer going well. The boat was fully involved, and crews quickly extinguished the fire making the area safe.

The Brigade assisted a local resident with a controlled burn of feral olives on 4<sup>th</sup> of October. Feral olives are a high fuel source vegetation, when green or dry. Crews gained valuable experience of managing high fuel load burns.

Crews also attended a MVA involving 2 car at the Tyeka and Cornishmans Hill Rd intersection. Upon arrival crews noticed smoke coming from the bonnet of a vehicle. Crews made the scene safe.

On the 12th of October crews attended another structure fire at the intersection of Cornishmans Hill Rd and Blacktop Rd.

On arrival crews found a boat on fire next to a home. Crews extinguished the boat and returned to the station.

Once again, the Brigade assisted ALRU farm, providing parking assistance for their guests at the ALRU Family Day on the 29<sup>th</sup> of September. The parking proceeds being generously donated to the OTH CFS Brigade. Thank you to the members that generously volunteered their time.

OTH CFS Cadets attended the State Cadet Championships on the 12<sup>th</sup> of October competing against other Cadet brigades from around the state at Stockport. The cadets competed in drills and team building exercises including two lines, two lengths, hose and hydrant, knapsack response, and portable pump relay.

Monday October 14<sup>th</sup> saw all appliances attend Fraser Fire and Rescue to tour the facility and look over the latest builds of CFS trucks. The night was well attended and crews were able to inspect and ask questions about the latest innovations for the SACFS newest trucks.

The warmer weather has seen north facing vegetation starting to dry off and cure. The slight brown tinge is evident in OTH and the surrounding areas.

If you haven't done so, now would be a good time to get firebreaks cut, feral olives removed, and excessive growth areas cleared from around your homes.

Stay safe and drive carefully.

## **KOALA RESCUE NEWS - Bronwyn Wilton**

#### KOALA SCAT MOTH-SCATOCHRESIS EPISEMA

This moth uses koala scats as its larval host were it will lay its eggs, the caterpillar will spend its time feeding inside the scat and once it emerges as a moth with pale grey-brown with some dark markings, including a narrow broken back band near the base, two other further along the wing, and four prominent black spots on the costa. The hind wings are plain grey fading towards the base with a wing span of about 2 cms.

Koalas are an umbrella species, meaning their survival is pivotal to the survival of other species.

Given this, it's been suggested that the koala scat moth could be close to extinction in Australia, due to the drastic reduction in koala numbers due to bushfire and other factors.

The species has been found in South Australia, Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria.

#### WHAT'S FLOWERING IN MY GARDEN

#### Heather Fischer, Humbug Scrub



What's flowering in my garden?

Wow! So many ground cover plants, bushes and trees are in flower with each plant contributing to a wonderful garden full of brightly coloured spaces. There's the dainty pink and cream pendulous flowers of Correa Carpet Layer, the large bronze yellow red spires of Grevillea Coconut Ice, the mass of hot pink star shaped flowers of Calytrix tetragona, the many drooping sprays of pale pink Thryptomenes as well as the bold pinks and purples of the Geralton Wax Flowers.

It is mid Spring and at this time of the year many gardens are at their best showing off so many flowers from so many plants.

The Roses are just beautifull and the late flowering Daffodils are a delight to enjoy. If you have some Bearded Iris, enjoy the tall colourfull stems of this hardy plant as it has a short flowering season.

Many Natives are in flower at the moment including the Prostantheras. With the common name of Mint Bush, these aromatic plants are covered in many flowers.

Prostanthera rotundifolia has small round dark green leaves and many pale to mid pink pendulous flowers held on narrow stems. This very hardy plant will grow up to 1.5 m high and up 1m wide in well drained loamy soils and will respond well with new growth after pruning.

Mint bushes, being aromatic, emit a strong mint scent when touched but can be smelt in a garden even without brushing past these most interesting bushes.

As Prostanthera rotundifolia is a small rounded plant it is one that can be planted as a fill in plant in a small space between larger plants.

Honey bees and other pollinators enjoy flitting around this delightful plant which is available from most good nurseries. Plant one or more to enjoy and have a go at striking cuttings from these Mint Bushes.

Just beautiful.

# Which grass you ask?

Well, Chilean needlegrass of course. Yep, it's that time of year when landholders should be undertaking seasonal control.

**Chilean needlegrass** (*Nassella neesiana*) is regarded as one of the worst weeds in Australia because of its invasiveness, negative impact on farm productivity, cause of injury to stock, and displacement of native grasses.

Chilean needlegrass (CNG) is a long lived tussock grass, often remaining green for longer into summer. It is best identified by its large red-purple glumes (seed husk), the typically drooping seed heads and the small, sharp, needle-like seeds with a distinct ring of densely packed hairs at base of the seed.

Care needs to be taken to identify the grass correctly as it can be confused with native spear grasses, as well as other exotic grasses that have similar seeds and a drooping form.

It's always best to look twice or check the seed for confirmation.

## Mowing and verge controls

Property bushfire prevention mowing is best done in late September to early October before CNG plants start to send flowering seed stalks out in mid to late October.

Once you have looked for and controlled any CNG throughout November, it would then be safe to slash again in late November, when you are confident no seeds are going to be spread.

Did you know that council modifies its verge mowing program on some rural roads during peak CNG season to accommodate for monitoring and control work from October to December?

Please be aware that road verge mowing by landholders or alterations on roadsides requires permission from council. Some roadsides also contain native vegetation and council takes care to conserve them. If you wish to mow your road verge outside of CNG control season, please contact City of Playford on 8256 0333 to arrange for a permit. If you obtained one last season please be reminded not to mow during the months of October and November.

### BIRDS IN MY BACKYARD Julie Buttery, Humbug Scrub

This issue I want to write about three species that have a distinctive eyebrow. One I am sure you are familiar with, the other two maybe less so.

Willie Wagtail is so well known he barely needs introduction. We had a breeding pair here when we arrived but with more bushes and a reliable water supply there is now at least two pair, on opposite sides of the dam. *Rhipidura leucophrys* is black and white, although the juvenile may have buff markings on the wing coverts, giving it a mottled appearance. Their voice has been described as "chitta chitta" but some years ago I was told a Kuarna name for them was "chucka chucka" and that fits for me. My Chucka seems to recognise me, for when he gets all upset about my presence and I say "It's okay Chucka" he calms down and stops swooping me. I know there is an active nest close by when he begins his swooping — nearly as disconcerting as a magpie swoop although with less possibility of serious damage.

Willie's tail wag is thought to be to drive prey from the leaf litter. And if you think he is frowning at you, you may be right. He varies his eyebrow according to mood. It may appear to be wider or longer and also changes shape from almost straight to a curve. Male and female are identical in all respects.

The **Grey Fantail** is a close relative of Willie Wagtail. *Rhipidura albiscapa* is smaller than Willie, about two thirds the size, and grey rather than black. There are six subspecies but the one around here is *R a alisteri* and has a buff tinted belly. Their white eyebrow (actually called the supercilium) is shorter than Willie's but they have a spot behind the eye. They also have white markings on the wing feathers. The grey fantail also hunts insects by driving them with the wagging tail. I kept mistaking them for Willie Wagtails until I took photos. In shaded areas at a distance, they can be deceptive.

The third eyebrow species is the **White-browed scrubwren**. *Sericornis frontalis* is much the same size as the fantail but with short wings and tail. They like dense undergrowth, denser than the previous two species. Their supercilium meets above the beak and here is another line below the eye. With ten subspecies and three being in this area, I am not going to hazard a guess. Variations are in colour density. Their alarm call sounds like a buzz with a more musical call to friends. They are insectivores and more closely related to thornbills than to fantails.













## **SETTING BOUNDARIES - NATASHA STEEN**

#### **Setting Boundaries:**

#### A Key to Healthy Relationships with Self and Others

I am always looking for simple things that support people to be at their best. To be at their best with their physical and mental health.

Over many years it has become clearer that "Setting Boundaries" is one of most useful skillsets we can have in our tool kit. Many of my clients are in crisis with self or others because they did not have clear self + interpersonal boundaries in place.

Setting boundaries is an essential skill for maintaining healthy relationships, both with ourselves and others. It involves communicating our limits clearly and respectfully, which can lead to improved mental well-being, reduced stress, and more fulfilling interactions.

#### What Are Boundaries?

Boundaries are the physical, emotional, and mental limits we set to protect our personal space and well-being. They can pertain to various aspects of life, including:

- **Emotional Boundaries:** Protecting your feelings and emotional health.
- **Physical Boundaries:** Maintaining your personal space and physical autonomy.
- **Time Boundaries:** Allocating your time according to your priorities and needs.

**Material Boundaries:** Defining how you share or lend your belongings.

#### Why Are Boundaries Important?

- 1. **Promote Self-Care:** By setting boundaries, you prioritize your needs, helping you to maintain your mental and emotional health.
- 2. **Enhance Relationships:** Clear boundaries foster trust and respect in relationships. They allow for honest communication and help prevent resentment.
- 3. **Prevent Burnout:** In both personal and professional contexts, boundaries help you manage your workload and avoid overwhelming situations.

**Encourage Personal Growth:** Setting and enforcing boundaries encourages self-awareness and assertiveness, key components of personal development.

It seems that many people struggle with finding the skills and confidence to do this. I notice that often this comes from fear of offending other people, fear of conflict, fear of losing relationships or even fear of anything unknown. Guilt can also be a challenge when we try to set boundaries. It's normal to feel guilty when setting boundaries, especially if others react

negatively. Remember that your well-being is a priority. Cultural background can impact also - some cultures discourage boundary-setting, viewing it as selfish. You may need to recognise these influences but focus on what feels right for you.

There is certainly a lot to consider when it comes to knowing what your boundaries are and then who this might impact and how on earth you then communicate these!

# Here are a few steps that may help you with Setting Boundaries

- 1. Make sure your motivations are clear: Boundaries should be about your own wellbeing not about controlling other people!
- 2. **Identify Your Limits:** Reflect on what makes you feel uncomfortable, stressed, or overwhelmed. Consider what areas of your life need clearer boundaries.
- 3. **Communicate Clearly:** When expressing your boundaries, be direct and honest. Use "I" statements to convey your feelings without placing blame (e.g., "I feel overwhelmed when..."). It is important to understand a little bit about how you can communicate in an assertive style rather than aggressive or passive. This can be a big learning need for many people.
- 4. **Be Consistent:** Consistency is crucial for boundaries to be respected. If you waver or compromise too easily, others may not take your limits seriously.
- 5. **Practice Self-Compassion:** Understand that setting boundaries is a process. It's okay to feel uncomfortable initially, and you may need time to adjust.
- 6. **Be Prepared for Pushback:** You may have to prepare for a little discomfort with how others react to you. Not everyone will respect your boundaries immediately. Be firm but polite and remind others of your limits as necessary.

**Evaluate and Adjust:** Regularly assess how your boundaries are working. Are they effective? Do they need to be adjusted? Growth is an ongoing process.

Setting boundaries is a vital part of nurturing your mental and emotional health. By clearly communicating your limits, you can foster healthier relationships and create a life that aligns with your values and needs. Remember, boundaries are not walls; they're guidelines that help you navigate your interactions with respect and clarity. Embrace the process and give yourself permission to establish the boundaries that serve you best.

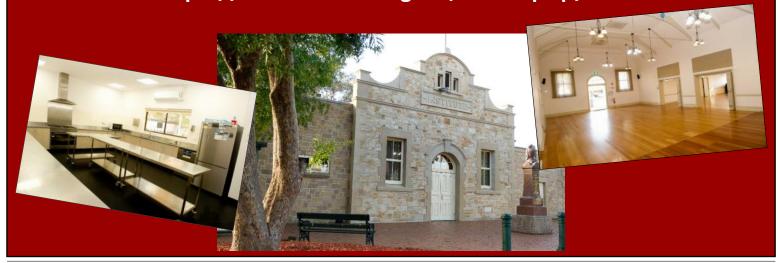

#### YOUTH IN EMERGENCIES PROGRAM

#### Henry Brown, One Tree Hill

#### INTRODUCTION

My name is Henry, and I have been part of the Youth in Emergencies Programme run by the Red Cross for several months where I am working towards my Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award. This is a new programme, and I am part of the first group of teenagers taking part. For the skills section of the award, the Red Cross has created a series of online learning modules that teach us about natural disasters that effect Australia and how to prepare for them. The main point of the programme is learning how young people can help their community become more resilient during an emergency or disaster. For this project I have chosen to learn about bushfires as it is something that greatly effects One Tree Hill, and I am writing some articles in the Grapevine so that I can use my knowledge to help my community. This month I am reminding people what to do when a bushfire happens.

#### **GETTING NEWS**

When a bushfire has started, getting news about it is vital because you need to know where it is heading and if you need to evacuate or not.

You can stay up to date with the news about bushfires by first using the AlertSA app and setting up a watch zone, so you are notified when a fire starts. The CFS posts updates about fires on Facebook (@CountryFireService) and X (Twitter) (@CFSalerts) and these will show you warning messages for a bushfire and the area it applies to. There are 3 warning levels — advice, watch and act, and emergency warnings — but they are not progressive so if a bushfire started it could be an emergency warning straight away. You might get a text or voice message telling you to evacuate sent by +61 444 444 444 which is the number used by Emergency Alert, the national telephone warning system. However, this is not always used, and you should not wait to receive a message before you evacuate.

You can also call the bushfire information hotline (1800 362 361), however be warned that the mobile phone signal may go down during a fire if the power goes off or the infrastructure is damaged, and landline phones might not work either. You can use a handheld battery-powered radio to monitor local news and emergency alerts on ABC Radio Adelaide (891 AM), FIVEaa (1395 AM) or Triple M (104.7).

It is important not to rely on only one source and make sure you are checking multiple sources before acting.

#### WHERE TO GO

Before a bushfire strikes, identify safe locations where you can seek refuge. This might include homes of friends or family outside the danger zone of the bushfire, going to a Bushfire Safer Area (Adelaide suburbs and central Gawler) or as a last resort if your first plan has failed and you have nowhere else

to go, going to a last resort refuge (but remember that there isn't a last resort refuge in One Tree Hill). Knowing where these places are is important in helping you to leave swiftly and not having to make decisions in the moment when you are under pressure which can lead you to make the wrong choice.

#### **CHECKING ON NEIGHBOURS**

Checking on neighbours is crucial during emergencies, especially bushfires, to see if they know what to do and where to go, especially those who may need extra assistance, such as the elderly or those with mobility issues. Encouraging everyone to look out for each other can make a significant difference in ensuring everyone's safety in the community.

#### WHAT TO BRING

When preparing to evacuate, ensure you already have all essential belongings in your bushfire survival kit and it is easy to grab and go in a bushfire. This includes important documents like identification, insurance information, and any other vital records, as well as your pets, and any leads, carriers and food etc. With pets like cats keeping them inside the night before a catastrophic fire day is recommended so you are not panicking looking for them when you need to be leaving the house. Having these items ready to go can save you precious time and reduce stress during an evacuation.

#### **WORST CASE SCENARIO**

If you find yourself caught in a bushfire, your best chance of survival is to seek shelter in your home or a solid brick building. Avoid sheltering in bathrooms, as they usually have only one exit and can trap you if the fire spreads, and you can't see through the frosted window. Instead, try to stay inside the building, ensuring you have two points of exit, including one direct route outside. Remember that radiant heat is the most significant danger, so protecting yourself from its effects is crucial for your safety. Wear long sleeve natural fabrics which won't melt in the heat.

#### **CONCLUSION**

As bushfire threats loom, it is crucial for individuals and families to take proactive steps to ensure their safety. By sticking to a well-prepared bushfire plan, having essential belongings and your survival kit ready, staying informed, knowing when and where to evacuate, checking on neighbours, you can better protect yourself and your family during a bushfire emergency. Finally, remember it is always better to leave early than waiting too long and then not being able to evacuate. Don't wait until you can see smoke or embers as then it is too late to leave.



#### You must

- Clear 20 metres around your house.
- Clear 5 metres around other buildings and structures on your property.
- Cut long grass on your property (occupied and vacant land allotments)
- Create fire breaks.
- Prune tree limbs and branches which overhang your home.

#### We encourage

- Removal of dead branches, dead undergrowth and leaf litter from your property.
- Removal of bark, heavy mulch, wood piles and other flammable materials close to your home and shed.
- Regularly cleaning your gutters.

## Going the extra mile

- Clearing vegetation further than 20 metres from your house for fire prevention with a permit from the CFS. (Native vegetation is protected by law, under the Native Vegetation Act, and permission is required to clear it on your property.)
- A swimming pool or additional water tank (of at least 5,000 litres) can act as an alternative water supply in a fire emergency.

If you're planning any mowing or alterations on roadsides, bear in mind that this requires permission from Council in accordance with the Local Government Act 1999. The City of Playford will conduct flammable undergrowth inspections prior to the fire danger season to ensure landowners comply with the Fire and Emergency Services Act.

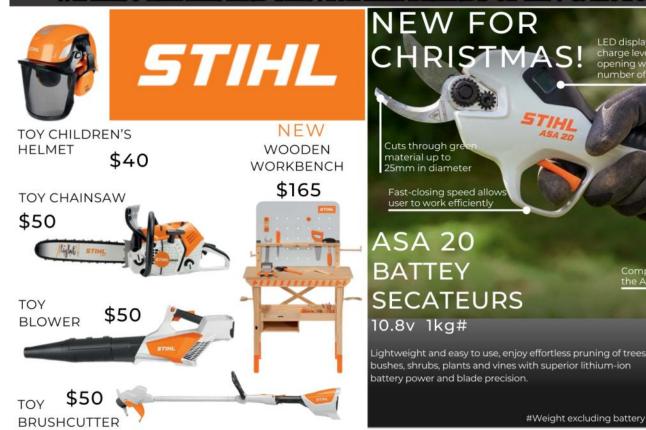

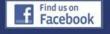

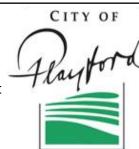
