ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT APRIL 2017



Incident Report

The Brigade has been slightly busier this month with 11 call-outs, most involving cars or trees and 3 call-outs involving both. We started the month with 3 fire calls all on the same day, one for a vehicle dumped just outside of Craigmore, one to provide tanker support for a house fire in Sandy Creek and the third which turned out to be a bonfire.

This was followed by two serious vehicle accidents where cars had hit trees and the occupants needed to be airlifted to hospital. The first was on the Para Wirra Road behind the National Park and the second was on Medlow Road. Helicopter landings used to be a rarity but we were called to another one on the 22nd April on the Kersbrook Road but were stood down before arriving.

Easter had 2 callouts, one for a car/motorbike accident on One Tree Hill Road at Gould Creek and the other for a tree down on Uley Road. It is probably worth noting that although many of us know this stretch of road as Snake Gully, if you are ever required to call in an emergency from this area, it is officially called One Tree Hill Road. Rounding off the month we had a tree down on Crockers Road, a minor car/tree incident on Craigmore Road and a roll over on Black Top Road. In this case, the occupant was transported to hospital by ambulance.

Fire Danger Season Ends on 30th April, 2017

With the Fire Danger season about to end the rain has started with most of the area receiving more than 2 inches in the week after Easter. Although none of this month's accidents were attributed to wet weather, the roads will soon be wet and slippery and as always, we ask that you drive to conditions.

Many people ask about fire permits and although we were involved in the past, this is no longer the case. You might like to look at Joe Federico's article on the back page of last month's Grapevine for more information or his report below.

Councillor's April 2017 Report

Before I give the really BAD news I will start off with some GOOD news. Thanks to months of deliberations, accusations, and plain out right bull headedness coupled with the show of support from all those people who sent in emails in support of the issuing of a General Burning Permit by Council, Council has AGREED to issue a general burning permit. What does this mean? It means that you will not require a burning permit for bushfire load reduction as of the end of the bushfire season and until the end of October. If you require to burn in November and if the new bushfire season has not been declared you will need a permit. The Township's ability to burn and previous burning conditions remain as previous. Council staff will be at the One Tree Hill Country Market handing out information sheets and answering questions! I will be available to answer questions but feel I may be inundated with questions in relation to the BAD NEWS.

At Tuesday night's Ordinary Council meeting held a week early due to ANZAC day Council (attended by some 100 angry Primary Producers) after much deliberation and fiery debate, especially from the rural sector ward members, bar one, finally agreed to come out with 3 options for rating for public consultation by the community. The three options are 1: Proposed rate strategy 2: Freeze Commercial rates (under current policy) and 3: Retain the current rating policy. I cannot impress upon you the need to have a say, write in, and speak, at the public hearing because if option 1 gets up every farmer, primary producer, horticulturalist, viticulturalist, cropper, grazier (I think you get the picture) except for the lucky 6.9% whose properties are valued below \$450K will be hit with an UNCONSCIONABLE RATE RISE.

There is just too much to say to describe the immoral proposal of option 1 so I will give you an example. If your property is valued at \$550K you can expect to wake up to the new financial year with an \$800 rate rise. If your property is valued at \$1million you can expect a \$3,000 rate rise and if your property is valued at \$10 million you will get a \$56,000 increase, watch out for bracket creep the following year.

So what is this windfall money going to be used for? Well it's to reduce the Commercial Rates and to give 60% of the, and I quote, "The Overwhelming Majority" a small rate reduction obviously funded by the Underwhelming Minority. Public Consultation begins 26th April to 23rd May followed by a public hearing at 7.00pm on the 23rd May at the Council Chambers.

I cannot express upon you enough the need to write in and be heard at the public hearing. Full details can be viewed online at playford.sa.gov.au or via request by phoning 8256 0333 or visit Customer Care Locations at: Playford Civic Centre 10 Playford Boulevard, Elizabeth, the Stretton Centre -30 Peachy Road, Munno Para. Written feedback can be sent to: Rating Policy Review, Playford Operations Centre, 12 Bishopstone Road, Davoren Park, SA 5113. This reprehensible move by Council has attracted a great deal of media attention and will continue to gain momentum, please, I urge you to have your say because if option 1 gets up it will have devastating ongoing effects on our lives, gross domestic product, and employment opportunities. This whole concept flies in the face of the recently introduced State Governments, "Environment and Food Production Areas" (EFPA) which recognises the value of the Farmer/ Primary Producer and strives to protect the industry. Of special interest to us are the clauses around subdivision especially for Residential development in the Rural Zones, once again too much to explain hence **DPTI will be having an** information session on Tuesday 9th May from 4.00 to 7.00pm at the Playford Civic Centre to answer any questions.

Japanese Air Raids on Darwin and Northern Australia 1942-1943

On February 19th, 1942 mainland Australia came under attack for the first time when Japanese forces mounted two air raids on Darwin. The two attacks, which were planned and led by the commander responsible for the attack on Pearl Harbor ten weeks earlier, involved 188 attack aircraft which were launched from four Japanese aircraft carriers in the Timor Sea, and a second raid of 54 land based bombers. The carrier battle group consisted additionally of two heavy cruisers, one light cruiser, seven destroyers, three submarines, and two other heavy cruisers on distant cover.

In the first attack, which began just before 10am, Kate bombers hit shipping infrastructure and the town; and Val dive bombers escorted by Zero fighters then attacked shipping in the harbour, and the military and civil aerodromes. The attack ceased after about 25 minutes. The second raid, which began about 11.45am, involved high altitude bombing of the Royal Australian Air Force base by twin engine machines. The two raids killed 235 people with a further 300 to 400 wounded. Thirty aircraft were destroyed, including nine out of the ten flying in defence, nine ships in the harbour and two outside were sunk, and some of the civil and military facilities in Darwin were destroyed.

The Japanese lost four aircraft to a spirited defence two Val bombers and two Zero fighters. One of the fighters crash-landed on Melville island to Darwin's north, and its pilot was captured by a local Aboriginal man, to become the first prisoner of war taken on Australian soil.

Contrary to widespread belief at the time, the attacks were not a precursor to an invasion. The Japanese were preparing to invade Timor, and anticipated that a disruptive air attack would damage Australian morale. The Japanese also planned to take New Guinea, cutting Australia off from US support. Denying Darwin's ability to act as a base would help achieve that aim.

The Response

In the hours following the air raids of 19th February, believing that an invasion was imminent, some of Darwin's civilian population began to stream southwards. Approximately half of Darwin's civilian population ultimately fled. The panic in the town was paralleled by confusion at the RAAF base, where personnel were directed in difficult circumstances to other areas in great numbers. Looting and disorder, and impact of the first raids, subsequently led the government to hurriedly appoint a Commission of Inquiry led by Mr. Justice Lowe, which issued two reports, one on 27th March and the other on 9th April 1942.

However, within a few months, Darwin was mounting an even more credible defence, which grew to a coordinated response involving fighters, radar and searchlights. The response grew steadily to involve counter strikes from bombers, largely manned by US forces. Other squadrons involved Dutch and British aircraft joining the Australian effort, and naval units continued to operate against the enemy. By the end of 1942 the tide was beginning to turn and the Japanese started to be pushed back from the lands they had taken in what is now known as Indonesia and Timor.

Nearly 1,000 people agreed and the car park was full to overflowing. Overflowed up the driveway to Neville's house, and along a rarely used track. There were complaints that people needed 4WD vehicles but it was no worse than many country people drive on to get home each day.

The St John volunteer ambos who attended were kept busy putting band aids on scratches. Despite the warning signs, one person got bitten by a bird and needed a bigger dressing. (The ambos say it's a good gig; they don't have to carry packs around and nothing serious happens).

With 19 volunteers on the ground we were able to keep things moving pretty smoothly, especially the barbecue. Steaks and sausages from our very own Kamcheyenne Limousin went very well, and for the vegetarians, hot potatoes from She's Apples, Gawler, went - well, like hot potatoes!

The animals that are hand fed by visitors were well fed. In fact they were so full that the next day they were very picky about their breakfast.

There was a beautiful raffle prize to be won, donated by Hilltop Fresh Florists, with 2nd and 3rd prizes also up for the draw. The ice-cream van had to pack up at 3.40 because they had run out of the makings.

Apparently, all the stalls did a roaring trade, most paying more for their sites than we asked. Our own stall raised enough to pay the feed bill (lucky you, One Tree Hill Fodder, you will get paid this month).

I thought I would have an easy day the following day, but it was not to be. I had a phone call at 8am to do a radio interview at 10.20am. As I was on duty at the sanctuary, I did the interview from the main gate, waving people through, knowing no-one was there to receive them at the display area. We were in the "Advertiser" that day. That has been followed by more interviews and newspaper items. Life has been rather busy but well worth the effort.

The sanctuary, 112 years old, is still giving refuge to Australia's unique wildlife just as its founder planned all those years ago.


This is a very basic recipe for scones, perhaps your children will be able to make some for Mother's Day or when you have unexpected visitors visit.

- Jam & Whipped Cream to serve.


MFTHOD:

Council's City Operations Team

The City of Playford's City Operations Team provide a programmed, practical approach to regular maintenance work around the City based on a routine cyclic maintenance program. We also take specific action in situations that pose a risk to the public.

To do this, the City is divided into precincts and work teams move through each precinct on an agreed cycle, with the entire Council area serviced equally. Work outside of the routine maintenance cycles is also undertaken where it is identified that there is a high risk to the public such as severely raised or broken sections of footpaths, road failures, tree and shrub encroachments and horizontally displaced sections of kerb and water table.

There are five teams as described below

ROADS & STORMWATER TEAM - Road surface & signage maintenance and illegally dumped rubbish collection What they do.... Maintenance and repair:

- Road shoulders
- **Patrol Grading**
- Fire tracks
- Roads sealed & unsealed, potholes, patching, minor kerb * Drains swale & open side entry pit (SEP) cleaning & repair
 - Signs repair & replacement incl. guideposts, safety barriers
 - Illegally dumped rubbish collection & litter bin emptying

PARKS & VERGES TEAM - Reserve and verge mowing & maintenance, open space & roadside slashing

- Verge & reserve mowing
- Street-sweeping

- Tractor slashing
- Reserve maintenance including irrigation repair

PARKS & LANDSCAPES TEAM - Responsible for high end landscapes, ovals, regional parks & civil spaces What they do

- High end garden bed maintenance

UPCOMING PROGRAM FOR ONE TREE HILL

The Roads & Stormwater team will be in the One Tree Hill precinct during September/October 2017 and will undertake patrol grading of unsealed roads and maintenance to swale and open drains.

The Parks & Verges urban verge mowing program is divided up throughout the City and Township areas to ensure I that each section is manageable and completed within given timeframes and serviced equally. Street sweepers follow the verge mowing program to have the grass collected from the road surface. The verge mowing program will be cutting verges and open space in the One Tree Hill Township towards the end of May.

The Parks & Landscape team mows McGilp oval each week and takes care of the surrounds, such as spraying, whipper-snipping etc. each fortnight. Clucas Green is mown on a fortnightly basis in addition to regular maintenance each month e.g. pruning, hedging and hand weeding. Each month this team sprays and hand weeds around traffic islands and other protuberances. This team mulched Clucas Green and in front of the One Tree Hill Institute in the lead up to Anzac Day.

Our Support Services monitors the graffiti hot spots each fortnight and provides a fast and effective removal service. This team also inspects and maintains two playgrounds in One Tree Hill located at McGilp Road and Black | Top Road, on a fortnightly basis. A rapid response service that takes care of any hazards posing an immediate danger to the public, for example a fallen tree on a road, is also provided to the community.

The Next 12 Months

Over the next year, Council will invest more than \$95 million to provide a wide range of existing 'business as usual' services to our community. These include city presentation services, community programs, health and environment services, sports and recreation programs, regulatory services and customer care.

Council's \$60.3 million Capital Works Program will fund the renewal or replacement of our existing assets, as well as delivery of new or enhanced assets.

To minimise the impact of rate rises on our community the Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget is based on an average rates increase of 2.8 per cent to cover inflationary costs and cost pressures such as electricity prices. This proposed rate increase equates to about \$40 per year for a home valued at \$229,000.

Council has achieved over \$1 million in ongoing savings in the past year. These savings will be used to further expand our community services and fund 11 new projects without the need to raise rates above 2.8 per cent. Projects include the Black Spot Road Upgrade, rural road sealing and public toilets at Jo Gapper Park.

Growth revenue will be used to fund 10 new projects including works at Fremont Park, new parking at Argana Park and stormwater infrastructure upgrades, again without an impact on rates.

From The Past - Assorted Clippings From The Early Days

The Bunyip Friday 21st April, 1916

The tenth annual festival in connection with the One Tree Hill Rechabite Lodge was held on the grounds of Mr. W. Smith, Sampson's Flat, on Saturday afternoon.

The members of the Lodge generously agreed to hand the proceeds to the Gawler Motor Ambulance and Red Cross Society and in return the Gawler friends promised to provide the concert programme.

Messrs. Taylor Bros kindly placed their motor charabanc at the disposal of the Gawler committee and this proved inadequate a drag was also chartered from Messrs. W. Hobart and Son, and was well patronised.

Several Gawler people motored or drove out to One Tree Hill so that there was quite a large attendance.

Sports were the order of the afternoon, and both juvenile

and adult events were contested. Mr. P. Broderick realised £5 from his cheap jack show: Mr. G. Humphrys also helped with his shooting gallery and Mr. A. Milne and Mr. A. Stewart with skittles netted a few shillings.

Mr. F. Barritt presented a fine sheep for disposal and in the guessing competition for the weight of the animal, Mr. McGee guessed the exact weight, 117½ lbs.

The competition brought in £4/3/- and the sheep was bought back by the committee and sold during the interval of the concert on the Bugler system, Mr. Broderick acted as the auctioneer and realised £11/11/-. Mr. J. Purdie being the ultimate owner.

A dog presented by Captain Connor brought 8/-. The Tea realised £6/16/7, and the takings at the concert about £8. The total proceeds amounted to £38 so there should be over £30 to divide between the Motor Ambulance and Red Cross Funds.

The following took part in the concert: - Anzac Orchestra, consisting of Mrs. F. Baker, Misses H. Rogers and M. May, and Mr. H. Coombe played selections. Solos were given by Mrs. C. Fergusson, Misses M. Cilento, R.. Black, and Mr. A. Wingate; duet by Misses Smith and Rebbeck, banjo selections by Mr. E. Marchant and recitations by Misses E. Lewis and M. May. The accompanists were Mrs. C. Fergusson, Misses M. May and J. Paterson.

Mrs. W. J. May and Miss D. Ey arranged the programme and the other duties at the Gawler end were carried out by Messrs. A. Milne, Beadnall and P. Broderick, while Mr. Geo. Bowman, as

Secretary and a strong committee had the arrangements well carried out at One Tree Hill. D.C.R. Bro. W.J. Boyd was chairman and during the evening both he and D.S.J.T. Bro. H. Evans gave addresses.



From the Bunyip Newspaper Friday 1st May, 1925

The nineteenth festival in connection with the Independent Order of Rechabites, Morning Star Tent, No. 47, was held on Anzac Saturday, on Sampson's Flat, the weather being intensely cold.

Various athletic events, log-chopping, motor driving, trotting and sheaf-tossing were contested, and gave every enjoyment.

A public tea followed in the local hall, after which an exceptionally fine elocutionary recital was given by Mr. and Mrs. James Anderson and Master V. Anderson, assisted Misses Thelma Martin and Jean Sinclair, Miss G. Blake, of Smithfield, acted as an accompanist.

There was a large and appreciative audience present. Addresses on the principles of Rechabitism were given by Bro. E.H. Lowe, D.C.R., and Bro. W. Arnold, D.D.R.

In memory of the fallen at Anzac, Kipling's Recessional "Lest we Forget", was sung by the audience before the commencement of the evening's programme. Messrs. Bowman and Willison were the joint secretaries of the festival.

Tuesday May 25th, 1948 - Cars Collide Head-On

Mrs. Bassnett, of One Tree Hill was admitted to hospital with shock, cuts and abrasions after a head-on collision between two motor cars on the One Tree Hill road on Saturday night.

Her husband was driving one car and the other was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. F. McKenzie, of One Tree Hill, who were treated for minor injuries.

One Tree Hill Friday February 3rd, 1939

One Tree Hill people gathered at the Methodist Church last Sunday to honour the memory of Kennard Francis James Chinner, who died recently at the early age of nineteen. His unexpected death stirred the district and much sympathy was expressed for his parents.

The Rev. D.T. Reddin conducted the service which was largely attended, and but for a number who were compelled to be on guard at the controlled bushfire, would have been crowded. He quoted Ken's school master, Mr. N. Robinson, who bore witness to the sterling character of his influence when at the Uley school, and emphasised dependability as an outstanding characteristic.

Mr. Redden referred to Ken's deliberate choice of Christ as Lord and Master, and stressed the fact that surrender to Divine leadership, was followed by that trustworthiness referred to by Mr. Robinson.

Misses Twelvetree sang two solos. Mrs. F. A. Thomas presided at the organ.

An Important Experiment


The Department of Agriculture Bureau, has taken an intelligent practical step by forwarding to various parts of the state - manure - five different sorts in each consignment of half a ton - with which to experiment upon pasture.

Strips of land, a considerable distance apart, are to receive the dressing so that the results of each variety taken account, may be readily adjudicated upon.

The half-ton parcels are forwarded free of cost to the experiments. The success of artificial manures in wheat growing has proved beyond doubt; and the fact that subsequent pasture gets lambs into condition for market fully two months in advance of the ordinary supply is sufficient to warrant the experiment.

Mr. Ifould, of Uley Farm, has been entrusted with the work in this district and finished, with the drill this week.

Circumstances permitted him to treat a variety of soil - loam, sand, light, and fairly heavy - so that interesting results are expected. The absence of rain at this juncture may not be in our favour of the soil receiving full benefit of the manure, but it will furnish an interesting feature of the trial.





General Notice - Burning Permits FAQs

The new Environment Protection (Air Quality Policy) 2016 came into effect with the intention of boosting the health of South Australians, their communities and the environment through improved air quality. The Environment Protection Authority (EPA) policy, which took effect from 23 July 2016, includes a number of changes to allowable burning activities in Council areas. Below is all you need to know when seeking a burning permit.

The table below helps clarify the new Policy conditions and requirements for burning within the metropolitan Adelaide boundary during non-fire danger season, and the circumstances covered by the proposed General Permit:

When can I burn *inside* metropolitan Adelaide and townships?

Clause 5 of the policy allows burning in the open within metropolitan Adelaide and townships where it is for:

- preparation of food or beverages
- heating an outdoor area using a brazier, chiminea or fire pit – charcoal only
- fire prevention or control requires council approval (this may be by individual permit or general notice published in a newspaper)
- disposal of agricultural or forestry waste requires council approval (this may be by individual permit or by general notice published in a newspaper)


 other – requires council approval through written consent or general notice.

Is backyard burning permitted?

It depends on your location and the type of burning. Please refer to the below graphic on page 2 for a summary of burning in the open requirements.

However, it is prohibited to burn certain substances in all locations and at all times. This includes treated timber, tyres, plastics and listed wastes (specified in Schedule 1 Part B of the EP Act).

What can I burn when preparing food and beverages?

Dry wood, charcoal or dry plant material may be used.

What can I burn when heating an outdoor area (eg in a fire pit, brazier, chiminea or outdoor wood/combustion heater)?

Inside metropolitan Adelaide and townships charcoal only

Why am I only allowed to use charcoal when burning inside metropolitan Adelaide or townships for the purposes of heating an outdoor area?

If you are burning in a brazier, chiminea or fire pit in metropolitan Adelaide or a township and it is for the purpose of heating an outdoor area you must use charcoal. Charcoal produces less smoke than wood and the requirement to use charcoal is to minimise the impacts of smoke on surrounding neighbours and any corresponding health and amenity impacts.

Is it permissible to burn Copper Chrome Arsenate (CCA) treated timber or painted timber?

Burning timber treated with CCA, creosote or other preservatives or painted timber is an environmentally unacceptable practice, and is prohibited under clause 7 of the Air Quality Policy. High risks to health and the larger environment are associated with such activity. Ash and fumes can contaminate the local area with heavy metals (eg arsenic), and

contamination can migrate in water.

Can I burn plastic and other household rubbish?

No, burning plastic, tyres, treated timber and listed wastes (Schedule 1 Part B of the EP Act) is prohibited under the Air Quality Policy.

Who can I contact to report excessive smoke from the burning of farm crops?

Contact the Fire Prevention Officer on 8256 0333. The officer is responsible for dealing with this issue. Under clause 5 of the Air Quality Policy, the burning of agricultural waste or forestry waste is permitted in metropolitan Adelaide or townships provided a person has a permit under clause 6 of the policy. Where burning occurs outside of metropolitan Adelaide or townships a person must burn in accordance with the relevant recommendations of the SA CFS Broad Acre Burning Code of Practice for 2015.

Am I allowed to burn wood as excess fuel for fire management purposes?

Yes. Burning in the open for fuel reduction purposes is an important part of reducing bushfire risk on some properties, however consent from the council is required before the burn can occur.

If you are inside metropolitan Adelaide, burning in the open for fire prevention or control requires council approval either through an individual permit or general notice published in a newspaper.



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
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Horse Care - Healthy Hooves (and nails)

Just a thought: For many years I have been talking and writing about how to grow healthy hooves on horses and goats. But until I started banjo and guitar lessons I haven't worried about my own nails.

Our finger and toe nails are made of the same material as hooves of animals, mostly keratin. So I figured, if I made sure my own diet contained those things I recommend for horses, then my fingernails should improve. Guitar and banjo picking plays havoc with nails.

I believe I get sufficient protein, now to add vitamin H (biotin), zinc and calcium to my diet, as well as a good fatty acid (linseed is one I have started using, with both omega-3 and omego-6). I will let you know if my picking nails strengthen.

It's not just any old protein that is required, either. Methionine is the most important. This is expensive and, when manufacturers list protein content, you can bet that very few will have added methionine. Luckily, your horse can get most of their methionine from grass. Plenty of good grazing is all it needs.

While thinking about supplementation, don't forget that it needs to be balanced. For example, too much zinc will reduce absorption of copper, and possibly the reverse.

Most minerals have a similar relationships to another (e.g. calcium/phosphorus). Amazingly, grass has them all in the right ratio, if grown on nutrient rich soil. It is overfertilisation and over grazing that causes most of the deficiencies.

The best advice on supplementation I have to offer is: make sure your horse has plenty of good quality grass, or failing that, good quality hay. After all, that is what he has evolved to eat. Extra grain is great in the right season (they would have eaten grain from the heads), but as soon as we add grain we need to think about rebalancing the ration.

When watching for improvements, don't forget that growth of nails takes place in the nail bed: above the cuticle on our hands, and above the coronet band on horses. So we have to have patience to wait for the good hoof to grow down from the band. It takes 6 to 15 months, depending on the season and the nutrition levels. Don't give up too soon. Farriers tell us that hooves grow fastest in spring and autumn and quite slowly in winter.

Now: where can I get myself a good feed of grass?

GOATS - Teats, how many is too many?

Goats have udders that are divided into two parts. (Strangely, we still tend to call them "quarters" as if they had four, like cows).

Each section of udder needs a teat so the milk can be removed, either by the kid or by human milking.

Sometimes you will find there is an extra teat.
Sometimes one teat is split into two branches ("spurs"), or occasionally a teat is extra thick and has two canals inside it ("double"). These are all problems when the doe starts to produce milk.

Often the extra teat has a compartment for an udder but the teat is "blind" that is, there is no opening. That part of the udder will fill with milk but you will not be able to get the milk out. Mastitis can result. As this tendency to have extra "quarters" that have blind teats is hereditary, do not breed from bucks or does with supernumerary (too many) teats. It does not occur very often, but it a nuisance when it does.

Spurs and double teats are particularly difficult to milk by hand. If you can get the whole teat into the milking cup, it can be milked by machine. But there is potential for a problem. If one is blind, with no milk being produced through it, then the suction of the milking machine can damage the flesh.

Kids also seem to dislike the extra teats, especially those that are close to the main one. They fuss, spit the teat out and try again.

Some double and spurred teats produce milk. These cause less problems for that particular doe but may result in blind teats in their progeny. For this reason, Dairy Goats cannot be registered if they have more than the required two teats.

History of Humbug Scrub - Part 4 - 1905 to 1915

Thomas Paine Bellchambers had achieved his dream: to be able to establish a sanctuary for the wildlife of his adopted country.

He moved in with his wife and 8 children in winter 1905, living first in tents then moving into the cottage vacated by the Adams family.

There was a good orchard on the slopes below the cottage and this, along with vegetables grown by the family, were the staple diet for some time. Although Tom was a conservationist, he was not averse to hunting for meat. It was wanton destruction and waste that he abhorred.

He said "Nature always provides a surplus for legitimate use, far in excess of needs, to ensure continuance of species (but) unrestrained, man uses up the capital instead of the surplus and this must, by natural law, end in disaster".

Tom was, in his own words, "uneducated". But he had a thirst for knowledge and was well-read. His own mother was an avid reader. He learned to operate a camera, taking many photographs of the wildlife. He learnt to make lantern slides and showed them in lectures. He wrote many letters and articles for the newspapers of the time. He was an instigator of the founding of the Nature Lovers' League and hoped they would back him in his endeavours to protect the wildlife. He was somewhat successful in this, but there were many trials ahead.

Tom was not a "man of means". He worked hard to provide for his growing family; not only his human children but also the creatures that grew to trust him. He built fences to protect animals from foxes (which began appearing there in 1907) and to warn hunters from shooting on his property. He stripped wattle bark from trees and sold it for tanning, carrying the rolls of bark for many miles. He grew hay for use on the sanctuary and thyme for sale.

In spite of all these activities, Tom continued to travel the country. He walked, exploring and studying the creatures he came across. He made many trips to the Mallee area and along the Murray River. Some of these trips lasted 6 weeks.

Meanwhile his wife was at home caring for their family and the sanctuary. In later trips he took carrier pigeons with him so if he fell ill or injured he could at least let her know.


Humbug Scrub Wildlife Sanctuary One of Tom's aims had always been to breed birds and animals that were in danger from white man's shooting "past - times". One success was the Mallee Fowl. In 1914, the first clutch of mallee fowl hatched at the sanctuary, with a successful breeding program continuing for 50 years.

Tom's second son, Victor, went to war, serving at Gallipoli, where he was wounded. He spent some time recuperating in England. When finally allowed to come home, he brought his wife Sarah, whom he had met when she nursed him in England.

Tom wrote a list of the native animals he found on the sanctuary in 1905. They included these major ones: native cat (quoll), carnivorous squirrel (this was possibly the brush—tail phascogale), kangaroo rat (possibly a rat-kangaroo or potoroo), dama wallaby (possibly the Tamar, also found on Kangaroo island but Tom always held it was a different species), brushtail possum, (western) grey kangaroo, yellow-footed pouched mouse (phascogale), barred anteater (numbat), native hare (his descriptions indicate a likeness to bandicoots, but he says they were gone by 1907), sharpnosed wallaby (his photos do not match up with anything we know), common bandicoot (probably the southern brown bandicoot), ring tailed possum, opossum mouse (possibly a phalanger).

Tom's descriptions are so detailed that we can guess the identity of his guests but in most cases they have not been seen in the Adelaide Hills region since Tom died. He said, in 1924, that "many have disappeared".

50th Anniversary 1867 - The Story of the Church at One Tree

PART 4 - 1867 to 1989


The records we have do not indicate much of what was happening between the opening of the church in 1867 and the

However, the adjacent cemetery appears to have been established even before the church was built. On the 5th November, 1861, Mr. Purdie conveyed a piece of land to Messrs Kelly, Harvey and Blackham for £3 to be used as a public cemetery. The cemetery contains interesting graves of many pioneers of the district including the Kelly and Gould families. In December 1932, the ownership of the cemetery was taken over by the District Council of Munno Para East.

In a letter from E. Ray to Mrs. Richards, held at the Playford Library, she wrote "the front wall of the church was built by Mr. Jack Walter".

After speaking with some of the older generation she added that she was convinced the church had been built with the help of organised 'Busy Bees'.

In 1967, it was written for the 100th Anniversary, "the One



As with any community, One Tree Hill has seen many changes and in 1977 the Uniting Church of Australia was formed (combining Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational Churches). At this time the congregation consisted of only a few families and there was some talk of the church being closed. The remaining members, though few in number remained steadfast in their resolve not to close, and their prayers were answered as numbers

gradually grew, and more people moved

into the district.

Sunday School rooms were erected in 1976 and the toilets were upgraded. In 1981 the porch was built at the front of the church using stone to blend with the original building.

In 1989 the old vestry was replaced with a new hall and kitchen, built of stone from the old Uleybury Chapel, donated by the then Munno Para Council.

The church's grateful thanks go to Eric Connor as the new hall was his vision and he worked endlessly towards achieving it.

After plans were finalised, Eric, a builder by profession, took over and used his building skills plus people he knew in the trade to get things underway. He managed the whole process with the help of many working bees and the help of all the men and women of the congregation. Doug Winsor assisted Denis Frith to make the four leadlight windows for



the new hall. Eric also inspired people to raise the money needed in faith and with the help of donations, interest free loans and a fundraising concert, the hall was adequately paid for when completed.

The new hall was officially opened on 29th October, 1989. Various working bees have been opportunities for fellowship over the years and they have maintained the property. Of course, the shared lunches



and morning teas at these events have always been a highlight for those taking part.

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
