

PFAS Investigations are taking priority at the –RAAF Base Edinburg and in fact around the world. What are per- and poly-fluoro alkyl substances? Per- and poly-fluoro alkyl substances, also known as "PFASs", are a group of manufactured chemicals that have been used since the 1950s in a range of common household products and specialty applications, including in the manufacture of non-stick cookware; fabric, furniture and carpet stain protection applications; food packaging; some industrial processes; and in some types of fire -fighting foam. Until recently, this group of chemicals was known as "per fluorinated chemicals", or "PFCs". The name change has come about to avoid confusion with another group of chemicals that are relevant to climate change, which are also known as "PFCs". There are many types of PFASs. The best known examples are: perfluorooctane sulfonate, also known as "PFOS"; and perfluorooctanoic acid, also known as "PFOA". Perfluorohexane sulfonate (PFHxS) is another chemical of the PFAS group and is also present in some fire-fighting foams. Why are people worried about PFAS chemicals? There is global concern about the chemicals because they do not degrade in the natural environment (and are suspected of being a possible cancer trigger). The chemicals are known as an "emerging contaminant" and their specific impact on the environment and humans is still being investigated. The primary exposure pathway for humans is from drinking water. Other exposure routes can include eating food stuffs produced from impacted land and water systems like fish, poultry, meat and vegetables. PFASs have been found in ground water at RAAF Edinburg, where there is a Hotline 1800 957 7770 that concerned residents may wish to phone to get further information, we are being assured that there is no danger to ratepayers. However the long term effects of PFASs is an unknown quantity and ongoing research is being conducted globally including by Qantas.

Now for some updates on Council showcase items the **Sports Precinct Tennis**: The First tennis tournament has commenced at the new City of Playford Tennis Centre with 111 local and interstate men and women players arriving for the City of Playford Gold AMT Tennis Australia sanctioned event. ASO to feature at Prince George Plaza Grand Opening a performance by the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra will herald the return of Windsor Green Fountain to pride of place in the centre of Playford at the opening of the new Prince George Plaza on Friday 6 October 2017. The Mayor of Playford will open the Plaza at 7pm in an event open to the whole community. Following the ASO performance, a spectacular lightshow finale is planned. CBD: Prince George Plaza With the opening ceremony only a month away, the Plaza is looking more and more complete by the day. Lawns are now in place creating a welcoming natural touch and an expanse of green colour to go with the Windsor Green fountain. With the tree plantings finalised in the now completed planter boxes, there remains only minor finishing details and the final power and services connections remaining until the project reaches practical completion. Health Precinct: Streetscape Upgrade Project Landscape Architects are assisting Council with initial consultations to gather input and feedback on streetscape redesign and upgrade works needed to meet current and future needs and to facilitate investment and growth within the Playford City Health Precinct. A recent signage audit has identified improvements needed to wayfinding and signage for the area. The project will also look at landscaping and footpaths, road seal, kerbing and Smart City infrastructure for the precinct.

One Tree Hill CFS — Incident Report Sept. 2017



Slightly more incidents this month with 8 calls including 3 for fallen trees, 3 vehicle incidents and 2 small fires. The Gawler

-One Tree Hill Road was once again the scene of an unusual incident where crews were called to a vehicle fire between

Uley and Medlow Roads. On arrival, the crew found a Toyota with the front passenger wheel missing and on investigation found that an attempt had been made to set fire to the vehicle which had failed. The occupant had fled the scene before crews arrived and Police are investigating.

In another incident, the One Tree Hill Road was closed in the Snake Gully section after a car hit a tree and ended up across the road blocking traffic. The occupant was taken to hospital by ambulance and crews manhandled the car onto the side of the road to get the road open again. The two fires turned out to be a bonfire and a burn off.







Recipes of the Month ... Lemon Coconut Slice

Frozen Banana Ghosts

An Easy Recipe the Kids will love to help you make

Ingredients:

- 200g white chocolate
- 4 medium-large ripe bananas
- 85g desiccated coconut
- Dark Chocolate drops



Method:

In a small bowl, gently melt the chocolate either in the microwave - in short bursts on high or over a pan of simmering water (make sure the bowl isn't touching the water). Set aside for a moment while you get the bananas ready.

Peel the bananas, cut in half, and push a lolly stick into the middle of each piece. Spread the coconut out in a shallow bowl. Line a large baking tray with baking paper, and make sure there is room for the tray in the freezer.

Using a pastry brush, coat a banana half in chocolate, letting excess drip away. Sprinkle with plenty of the coconut until coated, then set it on the prepared sheet. Now add two chocolate eyes and a mouth, and if you like, cut a few little eyebrows from the chocolate drops too. Freeze the lollies for at least 4hrs, and up to a week.

Ingredients:

- 50g butter, chopped
- 395g can NESTLE Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lemon juice, plus 2 tablespoons extra
- 2 tablespoons of finely grated lemon rind
- 250g Arnott's Milk Arrowroot Biscuits, blender crushed
- 1/2 cup (40g) desiccated coconut
- 1 3/4 cups (280g) icing sugar mixture


Method:

- 1. Grease and line a 28cm x 18cm lamington pan.
- 2. Place butter and NESTLÉ Sweetened Condensed Milk in a small saucepan; stir over low heat

until smooth; stir in lemon juice, set aside.

3. In a large bowl, combine crushed biscuits and coconut. Stir in Sweetened Condensed Milk mixture; press mixture firmly and evenly into prepared pan.

4. To make lemon icing combine icing sugar, extra lemon juice and lemon rind in a small bowl. Stir until mixture is mixed through and completely smooth. Pour over base. Refrigerate 3 hours or overnight; cut into slices before serving.



Are you bushfire ready?

Prepare your home or workplace now.

You must...

- · Clear 20 metres around your house
- · Clear five metres around other buildings and structures on your property
- · Cut long grass on your property (occupied and vacant land allotments)
- · Prune tree limbs and branches which overhang your home
- · Create fire breaks.

You should...

- · Remove 'dead' branches, 'dead' undergrowth and leaf litter from your property
- · Remove bark, heavy mulch, wood piles and other flammable materials close to your home and shed
- Regularly clean your gutters
- Create access to an alternative water supply (at least 5,000 litres) such as a swimming pool or water tank.

You can...

· Clear vegetation further than 20 metres from your house for fire prevention WITH A PERMIT FROM THE CFS. Native vegetation is protected by law, under the Native Vegetation Act, and permission is required to clear it on your property.

Please be reminded that any mowing or alterations on roadsides requires permission to be obtained from









Council in accordance with the Local Government Act 1999. The City of Playford will conduct flammable undergrowth inspections prior to the 2017/2018 fire danger season to ensure landowners comply with the Fire and Emergency Services Act.

History ... Humbug Scrub Wildlife Sanctuary 1929 to 1939



Ray Bellchambers when he was a child

Raynor Francis Bellchambers was the youngest son of Thomas Paine Bellchambers. Born approximately 1908, he had always been interested in the sanctuary, helping his father most days. At 14, he left school to spend more time at the sanctuary, learning to care for the creatures his father had taken into his fold.

When his father died in 1929, Ray took over as owner, manager and champion of the sanctuary. He is quoted as saying "My father asked me to keep this as a haven for wildlife, not a playground for people". But the finances were stretched and Ray was forced to open for paying visitors. The ridiculously low fee of 10 cents for adults and 5 cents for children was charged in 1978.

Ray married Gwen Tilley and they had four boys. They raised those boys in the cottage built in 1919 by Tom and his son-in-law. The cottage is still standing, used today as a museum. With no phone, power, running water or septic, they may as well been back in pioneer days. But there was never a surfeit of funds and the animals always came first.

The local media continued to be interested in the sanctuary, with articles in the Bunyip (1929) and The Advertiser (1933).

Arthur Mee (writer for The Children's newspaper) compared the Canadian grant of a thousand pounds for a sanctuary with the non-existent help that the Bellchambers family received.

The Advertiser, in 1933, reported that the sanctuary "has nothing in common with the vast fauna reserves in which...may see at best the whisk of a furry tail". For the sanctuary kept everything small and intimate, with the animals expecting a hand out and trusting the people to be kind. Koalas had bred in the trees for 9 years by then, and are still breeding there today.

Tom had built fences to keep foxes out and Ray maintained them.

In 1934, Ray wrote to a friend of the hardship a heat wave had brought.

"The prolonged hot weather greatly upset our bears (koalas), and on the last day of the heat wave they all left the trees and came down to the fence in evident distress. This necessitated the erection of bag shelters and frequent shower baths per medium of a syringe. In this manner I managed to pull them through safely. One of the males squatted for hours with his hands in a dish of water, from which he occasionally took a mouthful, but the other male, although he had not been handled for 2 years, came to me and begged for milk. In normal weather, the koalas never, drink apparently depending entirely on the gum leaves to supply the required moisture. Snakes are plentiful, and during the hot weather they hunt for food at night. I have killed them in the house and aviaries on many a night."

Ray, signing himself as R. Francis Bellchambers, wrote many letters to newspapers. Many of them complain about the extension of the duck hunting season, people who shot animals on the sanctuary land, and feral cats. He waged a never-ending war on cats found on his land. He complained that they had all but wiped out the wrens, in particular the blue wren (Superb Fairy Wren), as well as many other small birds. Way back in 1935 he advocated them being registered and kept at home or classed as feral and destroyed.

Although some considered that interest in wildlife was low, he quoted from his visitor book that he had up to 10 cars of visitors per day, with 84 people recorded on one day. This was 1939: the beginning of WWII and few people had cars.

Animals ... Goats-Hand Raising Kids (& lambs & others)

A previous article detailed the actual feeding (Oct 2015). This is about some of the problems and how to deal with them.


Bottle or bucket fed animals get upset stomachs far easier than udder fed ones. Causes can be: too much milk, wrong milk, poor hygiene, insufficient immunity, too hot/cold milk.

Too much milk over-taxes the digestive system. Don't do it. If the kid/lamb/calf/foal/pup/kitten/piglet has a belly that protrudes past its ribs, then it is getting too much milk. The flank area (between ribs and hips) should fill out, not bulge out.

Incorrect milk for the species over-taxes the system. Buy a purpose-made product. There are many excellent ones on the market these days. Lambs and kids should not have calf milk replacer. It has fat molecules that are too big for it to digest. Native animals need specialist milk replacers as their

fat and protein requirements are very specific. If all else fails, try goat milk. It has been successfully used to raise everything from kids, lambs, calves, piglets, foals, pups, camels and even humans.

Poor hygiene will cause scours (diarrhoea). Make sure the bottle or feeding bowl is clean. After feeding, rinse in cold water, scrub in cold water, wash in hot water with detergent, rinse in very hot water. Note: use cold water first. Don't forget the teat also needs scrubbing. Salt in the tip and worked around as a grinding paste helps here. If a patina develops, it is probably "milk stone". This is a build up of milk and is a frequent cause of upset stomachs. It can be removed by scrubbing metal containers but is better removed with caustic soda solution, especially in plastic or if you can't reach to scrub (inside bottles). Rinse very well. Bleach can also be



used to sterilise the bottles if you have cleaned them first. Baby bottle cleaning solutions are basically bleach made expensive.

Hygiene also extends to whatever else the baby will suck on: bedding, gates, clothes. Keep them clean but not sterilised.

Immunity can best be addressed in the first 24 hours. Try to ensure the baby gets colostrum. If mother doesn't have any, is there another new mother close by that you can steal a bit of milk from (any species). Colostrum is only produced in the first 48 hours after birth and must be drunk within 48 hours (prefer 24 hours) AND before any other milk is drunk. It is no good giving it a feed and supplying colostrum the next day. The stomach closes against colostrum when normal milk is drunk. If you have an animal that is producing lots of milk (immediately after giving birth), take a bit of colostrum and store it in your freezer (in lots of about 100ml) for when you need it for another animal. It is better to give a lamb 50ml of colostrum from your cow than for it to go without. 100ml is plenty for most animals, including calves and foals, if they don't have a mum. Colostrum should ideally come from an animal from your farm, or the neighbour.

Hot milk is more likely to cause scours than cold milk. Check the temperature immediately before you feed it. Don't let it sit around for too long after making up. Either feed it or chill it. It should feel comfortably hot on your wrist, not tepid like for human babies but not scalding.

If your baby gets a runny tummy, stop giving it milk! "Oh but I can't do that". Well, it is the only way you will stop the scours. Milk continues it. Sloppy droppings are not natural after the first 48 hours. They will not be firm pellets but not liquid either. 24 hours on water only, and you will probably stop the runs. If not, try giving red cordial, fruit based, not coloured water. (check the ingredients list). If you haven't stopped the runs in 3 days you probably need a vet to give antibiotics.

First droppings are dark, then they may be yellow (while on all milk) and sticky, finally turning dark and pellets when the animal starts normal adult

feed.

A warning about disease. If you choose to use the neighbour's or friend's milk please check health status. You do not want to give goat milk to any animal if the goat has CAE, cow has Johnes or sheep has MV or ...

Letter to the Editor ... Roundabout Woes

Have you noticed? We have an awesome new roundabout at the Kersbrook Crossroads. I feel so much safer when I drive through it every time I go out. But as a walker, it is scary and I don't believe it would be safe to ride a horse through.

My daughter used to ride to Pony Club. It was always a risk, but with a steady pony and wide verges she was relatively safe. Now I would refuse permission. Why? Because there is nowhere to get off the road.

I recently walked to the shops and assessed the possible route. Best route is to walk on the verge until I get to the beginning of the safety fence. Then onto the road (!) until I can cross to the median strip, stepping over the safety fence. Along the median strip until it meets the roundabout roadway proper. Cross the road, stepping over 2 safety fences. Avoid the huge boulders that form part of the drainage system (don't break your ankle). Cross the centre area then reverse the procedure for the other side. Now I am back on a verge and can continue toward the village.

There is no way to stay off the roundabout and follow a farm fence along. The boulders of the drainage prevent such a course.

But on a horse? Once you reach the safety fence you have to ride on the bitumen. There is absolutely nowhere to get off. You are trapped between the vehicles and the safety fence. (Is it really a safety fence for you?) All is good if all drivers give way and slow down until you are safely off the bitumen area again. But since many already toot, rev and swerve to scare horse riders, where do you stand? I certainly would not like to be on the roundabout on a horse, no matter how steady it was.

Similar issues arise for those on bicycles. It may be fine for the road warriors who regularly travel at 40kph but for the weekender or adolescent, they are also in jeopardy.

All it requires to fix this problem is a decent path on the outside of the safety fences. A path with firm footing (and no boulders) that can be easily accessed from the road by horse or foot traffic, and probably bicycle traffic as well. It doesn't have to be bitumen, or even gravel. A dirt track would suit most of us. A level surface, similar to a verge. Sure, we would have to wind from one track to another, crossing the road each time, but we would have somewhere to retreat to if vehicular traffic became obnoxious.

In spite of road laws saying drivers must treat them as if they are a vehicle and must stop if directed to do so by a rider or driver of a horse, many drivers are louts, causing fear in otherwise steady horses. Why would you want to be on a roundabout with no way off?

Does anyone still ride to Pony Club? Or is it all just too hard.

PS If you are one of those louts, think about what happens to your car and you if a 500kg horse sits on your bonnet, or goes through the windscreen.
