



One Tree Hill Progress... Rate-Payers Sub-Committee Report

Rate Rises Remain a Concern!

The rate issue and substantial rate rises remain a concern for the residents in the City of Playford. CEO Mal Hemmerling has previously stated in a meeting that the council plans to re address the rates after the next council elections. **Will we still be targeted?**

The ratepayers subcommittee would like to hear from local residents who may like to run as councillors to represent our community. Some councillors are elected unopposed and therefore the question remains, are we being represented appropriately? If you have an interest in the local community and would like to run in the process for councillor, we'd like to hear from you.

I personally attended the last council meeting, where we were labelled or referred to as negative. I find this to be insulting to the rural and One Tree Hill community. We wish to work with council in a positive fashion but need some real answers and transparency rather than the generic brush off's that we are receiving.

After the rural sectors were targeted by council, we have raised questions and had a closer look at what we perceive as inequities within council. Some of these issues are frustrating and I personally stand by the local community with understanding. It is not reasonable in my opinion that we are left to negotiate often unsafe roads. Pot holes sometimes dinner plate size and above pose safety issues. I've had to call council numerous times reporting the same safety concerns. Then I visit Prince George Plaza with free WiFi, solar powered mobile device recharge stations, over head lighting and water fountain. The project cost of a reported 5.5 million.

The plaza looks fantastic. I encourage everyone to go and have a look. I'm not against this development for the City of Playford, I'm concerned about the expenditure, long term maintenance of these assets, the inequities between communities and the impact on future rate rises.



Bushfire season is now upon us. I hope we have all prepared ourselves and our properties to best survive an event, as prevention is better than cure. Summer appears to want to hit us with a vengeance so please keep an eye out for the elderly, your neighbours, snakes, and any suspicious acts or events, and most of all, keep cool and safe.

Christmas is fast approaching and a Playford event is the Christmas Carols. This year <u>Anthony Callea</u> is to headline Playford Community Carols. Anthony Callea will be joined by Adelaide singer songwriter, Rachael Leahcar, and Adelaide's leading gospel choir, the Gospo Collective, in an evening of entertainment and Christmas carols at this year's Playford Community Carols at Fremont Park on Saturday 2 December. Freemont Park will looks its best for the event with park upgrades, new shared use pathways and landscaping works due for completion by Friday 24 November 2017.

Tennis Centre Official Opening seven-time Grand Slam doubles winner and former Australian Davis Cup captain John Fitzgerald attended the official opening of the centre with Tennis Australia and City of Playford Mayor Glenn Docherty. John says the new \$8.9 million Playford Tennis Centre is one of the best new grassroots facilities he's seen in Australia. The tennis legend commented 'What a facility this is, not just for the local community, but for the greater population of tennis players South Australia wide. This is as good as it gets in terms of a community centre where families can come and enjoy our great sport. It's exciting to be here.'

Angle Vale Community Sports Facility Carpark Playford's Smart Living Program supports the ongoing development and renewal cycle of the city. Through the program, local clubs benefit from improved facilities and infrastructure. An example of this is the recently completed Angle Vale Community Sports Facility Carpark. Community sport and recreation infrastructure is vital in creating liveable neighbourhoods. It also plays an important role in supporting a healthy and socially connected community.

<u>Temporary Parking during Construction of New Multi-storey Carpark</u> Pike Constructions, a third generation South Australian Construction company, has been awarded the contract to design and construct the new Playford CBD multi-storey carpark on the corner of Main North Road and Philip Highway. Ahead of construction in mid-December, a new temporary carpark will be prepared behind the Playford Civic Centre. One Tree Hill CFS — Incident Report October 2017



With the weather warming up, the operational tempo has also risen. The month started with an unusual fire in an electrical mains pit in Hillbank. Another call to Hillbank a couple of days later for a grass fire turned out to be a trailer full of household rubbish that had been dumped and set on fire. The warm weather at the end of October led to the busiest period since the floods in September 2017. The weekend started with a call to assist units with a stump fire near Inglewood and on the Saturday afternoon to a smoke sighting near Gulfview Drive.

Strong winds on Sunday the 29th led to a very busy day for the Brigade. A fire on McGilp Road invoked a quick response from the Brigade and multiple units from local Brigades and the MFS. Considering the conditions and location, the fire siren was sounded to warn township residents of imminent danger and a Bushfire advice message was released. Partial curing of the vegetation helped reduce the rate of spread of the fire and as a result the fire was quickly controlled. Shortly after returning to the station the Brigade was called to provide units for strike teams to fires in Mount Crawford and then to Worlds End north of Burra. A further unit was dispatched to Worlds End the next morning.

The following weekend a grass fire on the Gawler-One Tree Hill Road threatened a house before being extinguished and then on the 11th of November, the Brigade was called to an Alarm Level 4 fire on Medlow Road. Access issues at these fires reminds us that our trucks are very wide and the minimum width of your gates needs to be four metres to allow entry. You should also take into account the turning circle of the trucks as we approach the gate if we do not have direct access.

The CFS has recently released its "Complacency Kills" campaign and we encourage everyone to take a look at the CFS website to create a 5 minute Bushfire Plan.

















Recipes of the Month... Jubilee Cake

Melting Moments with Lemon Filling

An Easy Recipe the Kids will love to help you make

Ingredients

250g butter, room temperature

- 1/3 cup icing sugar, sifted, plus extra for dusting
- 1 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 1 3/4 cup plain flour, sifted

1/3 cup custard powder, sifted

Filling

1 1/4 cups icing sugar

60g butter, melted

Finely grated rind of 1 lemon



Method

Step 1: Preheat oven to 180°C or 160°C fanforced. Line a baking tray with baking paper.

Step 2: Using electric beaters, beat butter, icing sugar and vanilla together until pale and creamy. Add flour and custard powder and mix on low speed until just combined.

Step 3: On a lightly floured surface, knead the dough gently until it has all come together. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for 30 mins.

Step 4: On a lightly floured surface roll out to a 5mm thickness. Using a star-shape cutter, make around 40 stars. Place on prepared tray and bake for 12-15 mins until pale golden. Cool completely on tray before adding filling.

Step 5 :To make filling, beat together all ingredients until pale and smooth.

Step 6: Add a small amount onto one star biscuit and sandwich together with another.

Step 7: Dust with icing sugar to serve.



Ingredients:

125g self raising flour

25g butter

25g sugar

90g mixed fruit (sultanas, currants raisins)

1 egg

1/4 cup milk

Icing

Icing Sugar

Lemon Juice

Desiccated Coconut

Method:

Sift flour, rub in butter and add sugar and fruit.


Beat egg and add milk to egg.

Stir egg and milk to flour and fruit.

Bake in a greased log tin at 170°C for 25-30 mins.

Mix icing sugar with a little lemon juice. Spread on warm cake, sprinkle with coconut.

History... Humbug Scrub Wildlife Sanctuary 1950 to 1959

"Living Memorial" says "The News" headlines in 1951. "Humbug Scrub, a 300-acre property 25 miles northeast of Adelaide, has now been incorporated as a wild life sanctuary trust by the children of the original owner – noted SA naturalist Mr. T. P. Bellchambers, who died 22 years ago."

It was incorporated as "The Wild Life Sanctuary" situated at Humbug Scrub on 23rd February 1951.

For the first time it was not privately owned by the Bellchambers' family. It consisted of 100 acres of freehold land and a further 200 acres of leased land, on a 99 year lease. [NOTE: Previous articles have referred to the loss of the lease in 1925. This was a misunderstanding on my part. In 1925, Tom was worried about what would happen when the lease ran out and had tried to buy the land. This was refused (not the lease being cancelled). ed]

Ray and Tom's sentiments regarding conservation were being supported by the ornithologist of the SA Museum, Mr H. Condon. Mr Condon said that the areas being put aside were not large enough to protect the native birds, whose value was unappreciated. He stressed that the birds were very useful in controlling pests, as so many are insect eaters. (It is worth noting here that even those fruit destroying rosellas eat larvae, especially during nesting time. ed).

During 1950 a commission, led by Dr Cleland, was set up to try to find suitable land for a reserve in the Humbug Scrub area but there was no suitable land. They wanted a large tract of land that could be self sustaining but most of the large areas were State Pine forests. In 1951, now-Professor Cleland was pleased by the decision to make the sanctuary a trust, saying the sanctuary was filling a vital role in the preservation of SA flora and fauna.

In 1953, Ray makes note that there are over 60 species of birds breeding in the sanctuary. He says that they will eat themselves out of food sources and he wishes to plant more trees to provide for them in the future.

In a discussion about the Koala Bear Farm (*sic*) in the Parklands being closed down, Ray mentions that his father had first bred koalas in SA in 1927 and that the colony still existed in the sanctuary.

February 1953 saw a major bushfire which threatened the sanctuary. When a tractor caught fire, the resulting blaze burnt about 1000 acres of the Kersbrook State Pine Forest, 2000 acres of South Para Reserve and threatened Williamstown. Rabbits and foxes, with fur ablaze, helped spread the fire, as well as sparks which jumped half a mile ahead of fire breaks and fire fighters. As the wind dropped in the evening, men burnt a break to protect the sanctuary from flare-ups.

By October 1953, Ray is again asking for support, this time to purchase a utility vehicle. This time it appears his pleas are heard as there are several donations sent via the newspapers. But there is also a letter from a supporter: a new pleasure resort has been set up from government funds to the cost of £33,000 yet Ray is asking for £1,000 which is not available. Another supporter notes that the ute will replace the broken-down 1922 model "the only inmate that does not look the picture of health". As Ray worked away for much of the week, the sanctuary was usually only open to visitors on weekends and public holidays. Increased funds must have been very small. According to one source very close to Ray, he was rewarded with a second hand car, delivered to the sanctuary.

1954 sees adverts in the For Sale column. 1000 split red and blue gum posts for £30, and a "Master Buick (1924) well shod" (but otherwise it sounds as if it is only fit for scrap.) for which he asks £40.

At this point, Ray disappears from the newspapers. For the next 7 years, I can find no trace of him or the sanctuary in the archives. Personal discussions indicate his family took much of his time: illness, young children and the sanctuary itself. But he did manage to get a new dam approved and dug. The dam is now known as Duck Lake and is immediately below the cottage he lived in all his life.



We'll keep the community updated as the season progresses. There is a break from tennis over Christmas and January, returning again once the school term commences.



Animals ... Horses: Warm up

Like all athletes, a horse needs to warm up his muscles before exercise. But many of our ideas come from Europe and we know Europe has a different climate and a different way of keeping horses.

The stabled horse, in a cold climate, needs to gently warm his muscles prior to serious work. Failure to do so will cause tears and strains resulting in lameness or soreness. A paddocked horse in Australia, especially in the warmer months, does not need to warm to the same extent. There is a good chance he has been racing around the paddock and has therefore warmed his muscles himself. Even gentle walking will result in looser, warmer muscles than standing in a stable. But he should still have the muscles gently stretched and loosened prior to serious work. Once we put a saddle on, we cause him to



carry himself in a different frame. We need to make sure he has stretched the appropriate muscles to carry us.

Warm up should never be allowing the horse to rush around on the end of a lunge rein. You may call it "getting the tickles out" (Black Beauty) or "taking the kinks out" (used on half broken horses) but please don't call it warming up. You will deceive yourself.

Warm up does not have to be a waste of time. Use it to do your pre ride check. Check the steering, brakes, power. How is he feeling today? This was covered in November 2016 in "Fit to Ride".

After doing your responsiveness checks, continue with warm up work. Increase the speed, tempo and gait in increments. Start at a long rein walk, collect up to normal length, and release again. This allows him to stretch anything that has pulled. Allow him to move in whatever frame he wants. This is about getting him ready to work so we don't care if he is not collected. He SHOULD stretch his neck out, and down, and tuck his chin in at different times as he flexes his muscles. He may even have a shake. Ask for a slow trot, a jog trot. Back to walk for a few strides, then ask for a faster trot. Alternate with short periods of collection (as far as his training goes) but release the demand quickly, allowing more stretch and slow warm up. Start with big circles, adding smaller ones as he warms up properly. Always check both directions as he may be stiff on one side only.

Only after proper warming up should we proceed to training exercises or fast work. If at any time the horse shows discomfort then he is not fit to work today. Give him more gentle exercise, book a physio or give him the day off, as appropriate for this horse today. Of course, you have to read your horse. If he just wants to avoid work, push him for a minute of two. Then give him a break (30 seconds). He may decide it isn't worth the fight.

Remember that warm up is also used in reverse as cool down at the end of fast work. Allow the muscles to go into slow mode and work the lactic acid out before putting him away. You will have less stiffness for the next ride.

If he worked hard yesterday, he needs a slow warm up or a rest day. If he hasn't done any work for weeks, he needs a slow warm up. If he is old, he needs a slow warm up. If he has been hooning in the paddock, he only needs an attitude check. No need to warm him up as he already did that.

Animals ... Goats

CAE: Caprine Arthritis Encephalitis. Make sure you do not buy a goat with this virus. It is transmissible via milk, body fluids, through shared water containers. It causes hard udder (very little or no milk production), arthritis of every joint and encephalitis in young kids (damaged brain membrane and the kid usually dies quickly). Now known to be a variant of maedia visna virus in sheep, it used to be thought it did not transmit across species, but now seems to do so. The virus has now been renamed "small ruminant lenti-virus".

Calcium: An essential mineral, used in making milk and bones. Too much is also a problem, causing urinary calculi in bucks and bent leg in kids.

CLA: Caseous Lymphadenitis Abscesses. Previously called cheesy gland as infected glands look like cottage cheese. The abscesses break through the skin, oozing a cheesy or semi liquid fluid. The infection can kill a goat. Highly contagious, infected meat should not be eaten, nor milk be drunk. Prevention by vaccination. It is available in the 3-in-1 and 5-in-1 vaccines. NOTE: 5-in-1 is not recommended for goats. Some goats have very severe reactions to some of the components.

Cashmere: The downy fleece of Cashmere goats. This is the undercoat. Not to be confused with mohair, from Angora goats, which is the longer guard hairs. Most goats produce some cashmere, a handful each spring.

Chevon: The meat of a goat, when prepared for eating. Similar to lamb but less fat.

Cobalt: A mineral which is essential in minute amounts. Goats seem to need more cobalt than many other animals. Probably best supplied in a mineral lick such as Cobb&Co (copper and cobalt). Both these are in short supply in the One Tree Hill soils.

Copper: An essential mineral, available in Cobb & Co mineral lick. Red haired animals need more copper than white ones. This means brown goats, chestnut horses and red-headed people need more than those who have white/blonde or black hair.

Cud: The regurgitated food that a goat, and other ruminants, bring back from their rumen and re-chew before swallowing. The first chew is done in a hurry, getting the food into the "carry basket" rumen or first stomach. When the animal has a chance to rest, usually lie down, it will bring the food back up and chew more thoroughly. Once it is chewed a second time, the animal stretches its neck as it swallows, sending the food through the bypass gullet and into the second stomach. From there it is processed in a similar way to our food. The cud is the food being chewed for the second time. Cudding is the act of chewing the cud. Because of the contemplative look of the animal (it is often half asleep) "chewing the cud" is now taken to mean resting and conversing, usually about nothing too urgent.

Cycling: Not bike riding. It is the time when a doe comes into season or oestrus so she may be receptive to the buck and fall pregnant. Happens for about 3 days every 3 weeks for 5 months over winter (but times vary between individual goats).
