ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT DECEMBER/JANUARY



Happy New Year and thanks to the Editors for picking up the last minute changes in the last article when the Pinery fire occurred between the times it was written and it going to print. Needless to say this was a terrible event and the OTH Brigade was involved virtually from the start and then over the ensuing 6 days providing trucks, crews and incident management support. Looking back over the last two months it has been a horrific period for bushfires in Australia with many houses and lives lost. The thoughts and best wishes of the members of the CFS go out to those affected by the fires.

Incident Report

The Brigade was called to the Pinery fire early in the development of the blaze but was diverted en route to another 25 hectare fire just west of Elizabeth which was threatening homes and businesses. The units attending that fire were then sent on to Pinery where they stayed well into the night. The Brigade was also part of a strike team on New Year's Eve that went to the Mosquito Hill fire.

While the operational tempo generally has been relatively high, it has been quiet in the local area over the last two months. Half a dozen calls have been for trees down or for vehicle accidents but a late night grass fire on Black Top Road that started by the roadside reminds us that we still have a couple of months of hot weather where we all need to stay vigilant. We have been lucky but recent incidents remind us that one spark, whether accidental or deliberate, and the results can be disastrous.

With the uptake of "dashboard cameras", several videos have surfaced on the internet from people caught in the Pinery fire showing the ferocity of the blaze. It's chilling footage, but do you find yourself asking, "why were they there"? Sure, many people were escaping the fire but others continued driving towards the fire even when it became apparent how bad it was. Bushfires are dangerous and unpredictable and just as you have a Bushfire Plan for your home; you should have one for when you are travelling. Driving through a fire front should never be part of that plan unless there is no alternative.

How To Make A Plate Butterfly Feeder

Who doesn't like to see butterflies fluttering around the garden, this project will encourage even more butterflies.

Things you will need: Acrylic plate, a wire plate holder, string, metal washer, sponge, silk flowers and leaves, glass beads, hot glue. For the plate feeder: Sugar, water, wire.

Step 1: Attach wire plate holder to back of an acrylic plate, you can find these in home décor stores. Cut four pieces of string about 60cm long and tie to the prongs gripping the edge of the plate. These four strings will suspend the butterfly feeder on the tree.

Step 2: At random points along the four strings, thread some glass beads and secure them with knots on either side. These beads will help catch the light to attract butterflies. You can also glue some silk flowers to the string.

Step 3: Take the four strings and tie them together around a metal washer. The washer will be used later for hanging the feeder on a tree.

Step 4: Make your own butterfly food mix by mixing 10 parts water with one part sugar. Heat the mixture until the sugar dissolves, allow to cool.

Step 5: In the centre of the plate, place a sponge on some silk leaves. Spoon some of the sugar- water mixture onto the sponge until it is saturated, but not overflowing. Then hang the butterfly feeder from a tree branch using wire connected to the washer. Check the feeder regularly to make sure there is plenty of sugar water on the sponge.

If you don't have a place to hang the feeder you can place it on a table or perhaps a tree stump in your garden.

How Well Did You Know South Australia?

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS ON PAGE 7

- 1) The Sturt Desert Pea. The Government adopted Sturt's Desert Pea as the Floral Emblem of South Australia on November 23, 1961.
- 2) Oxford University herbarium has specimens collected by William Dampier in the seventeenth century.
- 3) Near Cooper Creek, during his 1845 expedition into central Australia.
- 4) In September of October. The seed's coating is very hard and should be rubbed between sand-paper or with a file to aid germination. Alternatively, the seed can be nicked with a knife or soaked in hot water.
- 5) The hairy-nosed wombat. The hairy nosed or plains wombat was adopted by the Government as the Fauna Emblem of South Australia on August 27, 1970.
- 6) The species is most abundant on Eyre Peninsula, the Gawler Ranges and the Nullabor Plain.
- 7) Opal. It was proclaimed the South Australian gemstone emblem on August 15, 1985.
- 8) Red, blue and gold.
- 9) The coat of arms depicts citrus fruit, grape vines, cereal crops, manufacturing industry and mining.
- 10) The piping shrike or white-backed magpie on a gum tree branch. The background is a golden circle representing the rising sun. The present coat of arms was conferred by Queen Elizabeth II on 19th April, 1984.



- 11) The Murray, Torrens and Onkaparinga rivers.
- 12) The Hackney Bridge on Hackney Road, The Albert Bridge on Frome Road and The University Footbridge adjacent to the University of Adelaide.
- 13) Adelaide is the only major world city completely surrounded by parklands.
- 14) 691 Hectares.
- 15) The Botanic Gardens.
- 16) Adelaide-Himeji Garden on South Terrace.
- 17) Christchurch - New Zealand, Georgetown - Penang, Austin - Texas and Himeji - Japan.

Horse Care - Floating the Horse



Last month we looked at the equipment you need. Now we look at the loading. He must do each of these things well to be good to float.

- ◆ Go forward when asked
- ◆ Go past you when asked
- ◆ Squeeze between you and an object (it will be the side of the float)
- ◆ Stop when asked and then go forward when asked. Does not assume to go backwards.
- ◆ Back on request (how else do you get him off?). Untrained horses will get off a float but it may be when he is frustrated by what you are asking and beginning to panic. Not a good basis for future floating.

Some basic ground work should include walking between a drum and you (squeeze), around a drum and stop, over poles, stopping when you say (maybe with one foot either side of a pole). Don't always ask for lots of steps. You will only need one or two when loading that last step into the float. Once you have established good general ground work, work toward training to go into a float.

- ◆ Lead at walk toward the float. If he gets anxious, or you think he might because of past experience, stop before he resists. Wait a short time. Turn away or back up. Go forward.
- ◆ Point his head where you want him to go. If you ask for forward, use the whip to tap until you get it. One step is a try if he is resisting. Reward every try.
- ◆ If he backs without you asking, tap until he steps forward. Go with him. You do not have to stop the backward motion, just do not reward it. Keep up a little pressure on the lead rope. If he travels too fast, let the rope slip through your hand but only slowly, so you keep up pressure. (Good reason to wear gloves and have a long rope).

- ◆ If he gets sideways, do not take him away to straighten him up. If his head goes in, the feet physically cannot go around to the front. Keep his head pointed in and wait for the body to catch up. Pressure with lead rope and whip taps.
- ◆ Do not close him in until he stands calmly with no indication that he is about to back off.
- ◆ Put the rump bar up. Always stand to one side in case he comes out.
- ◆ Close the ramp if he is still calm. Do not get behind the ramp. Horses have been known to go under rump bars and knock the ramp down. People have been killed by "safe" horses coming out in a hurry.
- ◆ Tie his head AFTER closing the ramp.

To Unload:

- ◆ Clip his lead rope onto his halter and put the rope over his back.
- ◆ Untie his head. Check he is comfortable (not tangled in hay net or something).
- ◆ Quietly drop the ramp FROM THE SIDE talking to him so he knows it is you there. Tell him to "stand" if he is used to the word. No need to shout, he can hear you.
- ◆ When he is standing quietly, remove rump bar – being careful to stand to one side. Reaffirm the "stand" cue if he is pushing to get off.
- ◆ Cue him to back and pick up the rope as he passes you.
- ◆ Expect him to stop when he is standing on the level ground.
- ◆ Give him a moment to look around. Ideally, let him have a pick of grass. It reinforces the "hang around" idea so he is less likely to rush off.

From The Past - Assorted Clippings From The Early Days

Tuesday January 4, 1882

SUCCESSFUL BAZAAR

On December 26 a most successful bazaar in aid of the Wesleyan Church Trust Fund was opened at One Tree Hill by the Rev. R. Campbell. Active business was at once begun, and continued without intermission throughout the afternoon and evening, a number of visitors from the Lady Alice and other surrounding districts assisting in the rapid clearance of the stalls. Mesdames Bowman, Blackham, Gifford, Beckwick, Kelly, Misses Kelly and Blackham presided at the stalls, the Mesdames Harvey and Skewes being unavoidably absent. Mrs. Emerson disposed of fruit and flowers to all who would pay, and the refreshment stall and Christmas tree were under the charge of Mrs. Beck, the Misses Bowman, Gifford, Harvey, Beckwick, Stuart, Kelly, and Skewes. A public tea, held in the evening, was largely attended, as was the promenade concert. Duets by the Misses Blake, Innes, and Beckwick, Master and Miss Harvey, and Misses Wilson were much appreciated by the audience. Mrs. Linklater, Misses Gifford, Kelly (3), Beckwick (2) Skewes, Messrs. Bowman (2), Blackham (2), and K. Owen also took part in the entertainment. The proceeds amounted to £60 9s.

January 14th, 1887

ONE TREE HILL, January 13 1887

A fire broke out on Sunday about 2 o'clock, on a section belonging to Thos Docherty, near his house, and consumed about 100 acres of grass and a large quantity of timber and fencing. Mr. Ifould being the greatest sufferer, Mr. Muller also lost one line of fence and a quantity of timber, and a few vines were scorched before the fire could be arrested. Mr. Ifould had about 500 sheep running in a paddock at the time which were with difficulty saved, the fire reached within a few yards of them. The fire was with difficulty confined to the space burnt owing to the large quantity of burning timber and had to be watched all Sunday night. Great praises and many thanks are due to the district for their exertions in arresting the further progress of the devouring element. This is the second or third occurrence of fire near Docherty's place and should make him more careful in future.

Friday November 13, 1925 - LEAVING ONE TREE HILL

One Tree Hill is losing one of its oldest and most respected residents in Mr. James Purdie, who is leaving to reside in Gawler. Mr. Purdie, who was born in the district but with the exception of a few years in the north has lived in the One Tree Hill district all his life, and has for many years been conducting a cream carrying round for Taylor Bros. Limited, of Gawler, and has never missed a trip during the term of his contract. He has always been courteous and obliging and his place will be hard to fill. A farewell evening was tendered him in the One Tree Hill hall on Saturday evening, when the attendance was a tribute of the goodwill in which he is held. Speeches were made by Messrs. F.L. Ifould, W. Groth, F. Dawson, Cundy, and the chairman (Mr. H.H. Blackham), who on behalf of the residents presented Mr. Purdie with a purse of money as a token of recognition and esteem. Mr. O. Cundy also presented the guest with a gold watch on behalf of Taylor Bros. Limited, of Gawler (for whom he has carried cream for 17 years), and a silver mounted pipe and tobacco pouch from their employees. The watch bore the initials J.P. and was suitably inscribed inside. The programme for the evening consisted of pianoforte selections and songs by the following: - Mesdames French and Toby, Miss Fiebig and Mr. Toby. Another feature of the evening was community singing led by Mrs. H. W. Kelly. A supper and dance followed.

Thursday 26 January, 1940

LAMBS FATTENED ON TURNIPS Splendid Results At One Tree Hill

Mr. Harvey Kelly, of One Tree Hill, is always ready to improve the carrying capacity of his property and has for some time successfully grown peas, turnips and early sown cereals for his sheep. This season he has introduced turnips as a fodder crop, with undoubted success. Land prepared as fallow for the cereal crop was sown to mammoth purple top turnips on November 15, at the rate of 1 lb of seed an acre. The crop, which consisted of 100 acres, had no further attention and grazing was commenced on January 17. An adjoining field of 50 acres, which contained a very light crop of peas and oats, was made accessible to lambs which also had 37 acres of turnips to graze upon.

Cost 11/, Realised 22/8

The lambs consisted of 505 store weaners which were bought at an average price of 11/ a head, and an additional 300 stud weaners, all of which were carried from January 17 to April 17. That results were satisfactory can be gauged from the fact that the 505 weaners were marketed off the crop at an average return of 22/8 a head. The carrying capacity was represented by 74,060 sheep days over the months of January to April.

Although as previously stated, Mr. Kelly had used various other crops to increase his carrying capacity he has never carried weaners so well as with his combined crops of turnips and peas. Immediately the turnips were grazed out, the land was cultivated for a cereal crop for grain. At the present time this cereal crop appears equal to any in the district and shows no signs of having suffered from the preceding crop of turnips.

The remainder of the 100 acres of turnips was grazed to advantage, but records were only kept of the area grazed in conjunction with peas.

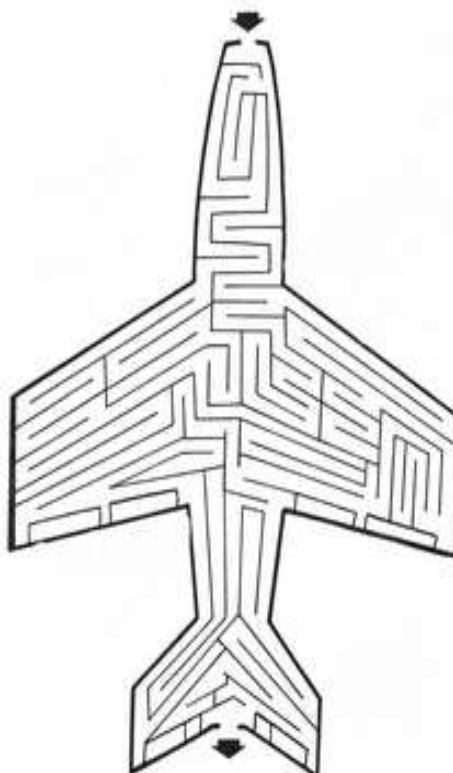

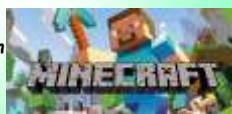

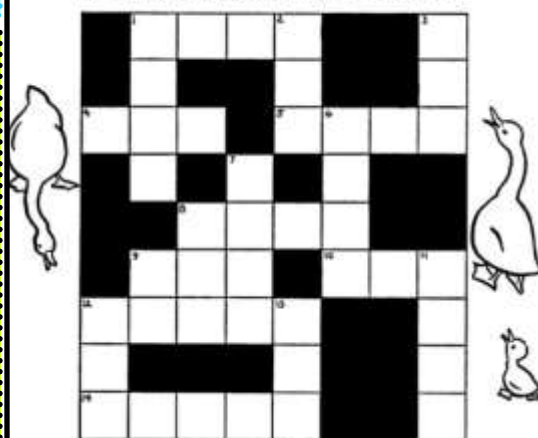

Goats - CAE in Goats



CAE is fast disappearing, thanks to the diligence of registered breeders. However, it still turns up in private sales, and there are a few people who do not think it actually exists. So why write this article? Because I don't want you to experience the heart ache of losing an animal that you bought in innocence. Know the problem and beware.

Caprine Arthritis Encephalitis (CAE) is a goat-specific retrovirus, of the same class of viruses as AIDS. It cannot be transmitted to humans or other animals. It is transmitted to other goats via body fluids: blood, semen, vaginal fluids and especially milk. There is no cure; it is only possible to treat the symptoms. (Caveat: it is possible in very unusual circumstances, to transmit it to sheep, usually by direct blood transfusions).

Symptoms include swelling of the knees (CAE was previously called Big Knees because of this symptom); ill thrift (looking poorly, stunted or having a very harsh coat for no obvious reason); a tendency to fall ill with other diseases such as pneumonia or mastitis; and poor milk production, often associated with hard udder. More advanced, and often life threatening, effects include arthritis to the point that the animal cannot stand (mainly affecting hips, spine, hocks and knees,) encephalitis (swelling of the brain) and wasting.

The vet can take blood samples of an animal suspected to have CAE and send them for testing. As the disease may be dormant for some time, it is recommended that bloods be taken at 12 month intervals with no possible chance of a carrier coming into contact in that time. Some goats still do not show as positive until they have been put under stress; attending a show, or kidding is likely to trigger it. After two or three tests with stress triggers present, negative results can be said to mean the animal is clear.

CAE was particularly common in dairy herds in the 1970's and 80's, because of the practice of pooling milk to feed all the kids. Other breeds tend to leave the kids with their dams to raise them. This pooling of milk meant that if one goat was infected, then all of the kids in the herd would become infected. It has been eradicated from the herds of most registered breeders by heavy culling, an expensive and heartbreaking method.

It is possible to prevent CAE from spreading by catching kids from infected does at birth. Do not allow any body fluids from a possibly infected goat to come into contact with an uninfected one. This means that an infected doe is not allowed to lick or suckle her newborn kid, and that the milk to raise the newborn must come from an uninfected goat or be made from formula. Do not share water sources, use only tested bucks for breeding (and don't let untested or positive does come to your buck).

It is better to avoid CAE altogether. It is only if you require particular bloodlines that you should consider buying a CAE positive animal.

Shows in South Australia require that all goats must have tested negative to CAE and be on an ongoing negative program. After 30 years of testing and heavy culling there really is no excuse for positive animals to still be around.

On a positive note: the eradication of CAE reduced many other health issues (lice, worms etc.) as they could not be transmitted between goats due to the stringent quarantine in eradication programs.

Protecting Your Identity

Your identity is one of the most valuable things you have. Being able to prove who you are is important for most aspects of your life - from getting a home loan to starting a new job to buying something.

If criminals steal your identity, you may find everyday activities like these more difficult. The stress and financial costs can last for years.

Your identity can be stolen if criminals gain access to personal documents, such as your passport, driver's licence or utility bills.

They can also steal your identity by gaining access to your personal information, such as your tax file number or information on social media sites. Even if you think that thieves only have a small amount of information about you, they can use public sources to find out additional information about you.

Simple Tips For Keeping Your Identity Safe

- 1) Secure your personal documents at home, when you are travelling.
- 2) Be cautious about using social media and limit the amount of personal information you publish on line.
- 3) Secure your computer and mobile phone with security software and strong passwords, and avoid using public computers for sensitive activities.
- 4) Learn how to avoid common scams at www.scamwatch.gov.au
- 5) Be cautious about requests for your personal information over the internet, phone and in person in case it is a scam.
- 6) Investigate the arrival of new credit cards you didn't ask for or bills for goods and services that aren't yours.
- 7) Be alert for any unusual bank transactions or missing mail.
- 8) If you are a victim of identity crime - report it to the police, contact iDcare for advice and alert any relevant organisations.

General Household Tips

1: To restore finished wood furniture, soak two tea bags in hot water for 10 minutes. Let cool, then dampen a clean soft cloth with the tea and wipe over furniture. It will bring out the woods natural colour and shine.

2: Use kitty litter mixed with baking soda in a pan to neutralize musty or bad odours.

3: If the tip of your shoe lace becomes frayed snip off the frayed end. Then paint or dip the end into clear nail polish and let dry. Good as new.

4: If your new shoes are too tight put the nozzle of your hairdryer into shoe and turn on low. When shoe gets warm, stuff with paper or socks to stretch.

5: To clean oil based paint off your hands use vegetable oil. Then wash with warm soapy water.

6: Half a lemon sprinkled with salt can be used safely to clean or remove stains from granite bench tops. For stains leave lemon and salt on stain to soak, then rinse with clean water and dry.

7: Dampen a cloth with white vinegar and add a sprinkle of cream of tartar this is great for cleaning porcelain.

8: Spray WD-40 on a cloth and wipe over leather shoes or boots, then buff with a soft cloth to shine and make them waterproof.

February In Your Garden

As your summer crop is having a little bit of a last hoorah, it's time to start preparing your garden for autumn planting. This month we have loads of tips and ideas of what to do now that will ensure your patch is ready to go. Wait until the heat of the day is over and then spend some productive time in the garden.

Weeding: Weeding is a great job to do at this time of the year. Cut down the competition between your plants and stop these space invaders. It may be tedious but it's incredibly rewarding.

Mulching: Top up the mulch on your vegetable patches, herb gardens and ornamental beds. This is especially important if you are heading away or are caught up in the bustle of back to school. A hot summer tip is to mulch after watering your garden beds, to a depth of about 7cm. Keep mulch clear of the stems of plants, especially seedlings. Choose sustainable, low environmental impact mulch, you need to enrich your soil as it breaks down.

Planning: Now is the time to think about what you will be planting in April. Preparing beds and plots now means that when autumn planting rolls around, your garden will be ready and waiting. Removing spent plants, clearing areas of weeds and topping up organic matter is an excellent February job. A rake, some good organic compost and lovely sustainable mulch is the perfect recipe for productive patches of the future.

Shade for your plants: On non-gardening days, why not head out to the shed, and construct a couple of shade cloth tents. They don't have to be elaborate, just a simple, moveable structure that you can pop over the top of some of the sun sensitive veggies such as eggplant and capsicum especially on high UV days, windy days and during your holidays.

Watering: Water smarter at this time of the year and always first thing in the morning. A nice, deep drink a couple of times a week is far more beneficial than frequent, short watering.

It's still warm outside, but there are some tasty treats you can plant out this month. Try silverbeet, leeks, spring onions, Brussel sprouts, bush beans, broccoli, cauliflower and celery.... But wait until the end of the month. Lettuce is lovely at the end of February but if the days are still quite hot, consider popping the seedlings under some shade cloth. It is still too hot for most herbs but lemongrass will take the heat if planted out now. Basil is happy to go in now as well, so why not mix it up and try some purple Thai and lemon basil, as well as our old favourite sweet basil.

Why not try some lovely flowering plants as well, like nasturtium, verbena, petunias and marigolds. These flowers are great for attracting pollinators and beneficial insects to your garden and they look great as well.

Want to save some money? Avocados are quite expensive at the moment but in a few years time, it shouldn't worry you. Towards the end of February try planting an avocado.

Enjoy the warm evenings in the garden and be rewarded.



Make a Wildlife Retreat in your Garden

Give birds, lizards and other small creatures a place to call home by creating a wildlife retreat where they can forage and live safely. This great idea works in gardens large or small, and the kids can help with the planning and planting.

Bricks or rocks are used to create hiding spots for animals with plants nearby to provide cover and food. You will also need a water source for flying visitors but make sure it is high enough to be safe from dogs and cats.

Step 1: Clear the area of plants and weeds. Position your brick or rock so they are well supported with mini dens underneath, this will ensure that creatures won't be flooded and with at least one sunny spot for lizards to bask.



Step 2: Position native plants like grevillea near the bricks to provide cover for the creatures in the dens. Dig planting holes twice as wide as the rootballs then position the plants, backfill with soil and water well.



Step 3: Install a birdbath among the native plants and fill it with water. If you don't have a bird bath, make one by using a terracotta pot and large terracotta saucer on top stuck down with glue or other suitable adhesive.

CLEAN YOUR JEWELLERY AT HOME

Never buy jewellery cleaner again. Just mix together the ingredients below and you can keep your jewellery looking sparkling.

- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 tablespoon baking soda
- 1 tablespoon dish washing detergent
- 1 cup water
- 1 piece of aluminum foil



Directions: Heat water in the microwave for 1 - 2 minutes. Cut a piece of foil that roughly covers the bottom of a small bowl. Pour hot water into bowl. Place salt, soda, and dish washing liquid into bowl. Place jewellery on top of foil and let it sit for 5 to 10 minutes. Rinse jewellery in cool water and dry jewellery completely with a soft cloth. Discard solution after use and make a new batch next time.

This works well on gold filled, brass, German (nickel) silver, and sterling silver. Fresh water pearls and mother of pearl also clean up in this solution.
