Incident Report

February has been another quiet month with only a couple of local incidents, including a tree down, a vehicle accident, assistance to other local brigades and a grass fire. The grass fire, which was near the "Power Station", was quickly brought under control with the help of bombers. In addition, we have had crew who have been involved in the Tasmania deployment, and we are presently waiting to see if there is to be a 4th deployment to help our friends in the "Apple Isle".

As this is being written, a large fire has destroyed houses near Ballarat in Victoria and reminds us that February and March are still high fire danger months. Despite this year's benevolence, we cannot afford to become complacent; the bushfire threat does not abate until we have had significant rain.

Looking back over the last couple of years, this year has actually been exceptionally quiet; last year of course we were dealing with the aftermath of the Sampson Flat fire. In 2014, we were heavily involved in the Eden Valley and Bangor fires, as well as the two major fires at Para Dam that many of you will remember.

All of those fires were started by lightning and as the summer weather breaks thunderstorms become a part of the landscape adding to the other potential ignition threats we have to deal with.

As autumn approaches and the odd chilly night lets us know that winter is not far away, our thoughts turn to the comfort of the wood heater. While you are having those thoughts, it might also pay to think of the last time you had your flue cleaned. No-one likes to see the tragedy that a chimney fire can cause and yet every autumn we see reports of house fires around the state that could have been avoided.

With an early Easter on the horizon, we know there will be a lot of people taking advantage of the warm weather to take a short break. That means there will be a lot of cars on the road and that seems to lead to tragedy. It doesn't have to; please be patient, please drive to the conditions and please have a safe and enjoyable Easter.

Councillor's February Report

s is typical most of the interesting stuff happens in confidence or in informal meetings. Yes, it's that time of the year again the Draft, City, Financial and Long Term Plans are being formulated and that means rate increases, how much remains to be seen. A bus tour will be arranged to inform Elected Members of what we are trying, I mean going to achieve in the 12 months, July 16 to June 17. Who knows the bus may even make it to One Tree Hill this year but I won't hold my breath.

There are some exciting potential good news stories in the pipeline provided we can bring them to fruition. On another note the importation of more than 9 cubic metres in a Flood Plain or Hills Face Zone requires Development Plan approval, please be wary of this.

Gas guns are not allowed to be used on less than 5 Hectares of land, or be a multiple detonation device, can only be detonated between the hours of 7.00am to 8.00pm at not more than 6 times per hour and or within 300 metres of an animal or sensitive receptor, unfortunately the by-law does not take into consideration weekends or public holidays. Let's hope our friends who operate outside of these regulations finish picking soon and we can all get some sleep. Council investigators do not apparently have the resources and or time to spend more than a short period of time when investigating these complaints.

A customer satisfaction survey was carried out and included the princely sum of 38 people, one of which was a young girl from One Tree Hill. The survey results are available on Council's web site. An interesting revelation was that apparently rate payers do not know who their Elected Members are and when Council meetings are held despite the circulation the magazine North is Up or the information being readily available on Council's web site.

caller ID function, I cannot return your call.



Farewell to a Much Loved Local Identity

It is with much sadness that we say goodbye to Rose Shillabeer who will be dearly missed by residents of the One Tree Hill area.

Rose was born on the 15th August, 1914 in Unley to parents Martin and Selma Bonds. Rose was the eldest of 5 children, Edna Charlson, Phyllis McKenzie, Alf and Charles Bonds. Alf is the last remaining of the children at the age of 94.

In many ways Rose had a very tough childhood as at the age of 11 her mother Selma died and Rose and brother Alf were sent to live with their Uncle Dick and Auntie May Westley in Taylors Road, One Tree Hill. Rose remained in One Tree Hill for the remainder of her life apart from a couple of short stays away due to employment.

Having completed her schooling at the Precolumb Primary School, Rose helped on the property which had fruit trees and plantings of sage and thyme.

Later the fruit trees were pulled out and more thyme was grown. At one stage they had the biggest planting of thyme in the Southern Hemisphere.

Rose loved her sport playing basketball and table tennis for One Tree Hill.

Rose married Melville Taylor, a local bee keeper at the age of 20 and at 21 she gave birth to their daughter Margaret Rose. Tragically 6 months after Margaret's birth Melville fell out of an apricot tree and was fatally wounded. One can only think of the devastating effect that Melville's death had on Rose as she now had to look after her baby by herself as well as be the bread winner. There were no modern conveniences and no hand outs in those days, so she tended her bee hives and had a dairy farm which she would milk by hand, hail or shine, hot summer or cold frosty winter mornings and nights. She would have to load the full milk can onto the wheel barrow and take it down the hill and then haul it onto the milk stand for pick up. This was all done to ensure they could pay for food and the mortgage. Rose was a very hard worker all her life.

In 1941 Rose went to Victor Harbor with Margaret as a housekeeper for 2 years and when the war broke out she worked in a munitions factory making bullets. After the war she helped Mrs. Harvey at One Tree Hill in a domestic capacity.

On the 12th June, 1948 at the age of 33 she married a local, Russell Shillabeer in the Methodist Church in Adelaide. Russell and Rose were married for some 42 years.

Rose especially loved her garden which she tended to every day. She loved cooking and baking. She was known for her roasts, scones and rock buns, just to name a few. Her specialty was cream puffs. Nothing gave her greater joy than to have a cuppa and chat with friends or family and she would always bring something out to eat.

Rose loved her time with the One Tree Hill Senior Citizens Club which she was a long time member. She loved a game of cards, especially canasta. Later in life she took up playing 10 pin bowling with her daughter Margaret and was playing right up to a week before her 101st birthday. That's got to be a record for sure.

Right up until her passing Rose was as sharp as a tack. She had a great memory and could remember birthdays and other significant dates. The day of her passing she spent with her daughter Margaret going through some old photos and she knew all their names and where the photo was taken and told a relevant story.

Rose was a wonderful person who never spoke a bad word about anyone and was a no fuss sort of person and seldom complained.



The great love of her life was her family. She is survived by her brother Alf Bonds, her daughter Margaret Tilley, her grandchildren, Karen Moore, Craig, Trevor and Neil Tilley, her great grandchildren, Courtney Moore, Matthew, Jordan and Nicole Tilley and her great, great, grandchild Parker Tilley.

In August last year she contracted pneumonia and went into hospital for a week but recovered and went to live with Margaret. In November she had a fall and fractured 8 ribs and was back in hospital for 3 weeks in December. Leaving hospital on Christmas Eve, Rose went to stay at Karen's in her care and passed away peacefully on the 3rd February, 2016 at the wonderful age of 101.

Rose lived a long and fruitful life and brought so much joy and happiness to those around her. She will be sadly missed.

Still Having Ant Problems?

It appears that most of us are still having problems with ant coming inside. It must be the crazy weather we have been having that is bringing them indoors! We have published quite a few solutions in the past but it seems they are becoming immune to our home made recipes. We recently had someone suggesting that peppermint is a great repellant. Try this and let us know how you went with it.

PEPPERMINT ANT REPELLENT SPRAY

15 drops of Peppermint Essential Oil
5 Drops of Citronella Essential Oil
5 Drops of Lavender Essential Oil
45ml of distilled water and 45 high proof alcohol (e.g. vodka).
If you don't want to use alcohol then use 90ml of water.
The alcohol simply helps to disperse the oils more.

DIRECTIONS

Fill a fine mist spray bottle with the water and alcohol, add essential oils, secure cap and shake well.

TO USE

Shake the bottle before each use. Test a small amount on kitchen surface to ensure the spray will not cause any damage. If no damage is caused then spray around kitchen surfaces and in places where ants enter. Be careful to avoid food and drink.

You may also like to add one drop of peppermint oil to a cotton ball and place where ants appear to be entering, this should deter them from entering indoors.

Spiders apparently do not like spearmint, peppermint, garlic and citronella oils as well. Use the spray liberally around your doors and window sills to deter them from entering your home.

Growing Peppermint

The herb peppermint is distinguished by a square, reddish bitter stem. Red overtones are also visible in the leaves (which are darker green, larger, less crinkly, and more potent than those of spearmint), and the wide spreading branches that curve outward instead of growing straight up. Attractive rose-lavender flowers appear on cylindrical spikes and it then produces small, round, dark seeds. These however don't always reproduce true to the parent plant, so it is best to cultivate the herb from cuttings which will generally root easily when placed in water or in autumn plant small pieces of root.

Peppermint will grow almost anywhere that is out of the hot sun, it does prefer rich soil and at least partial shade.

Because it spreads quite vigorously by underground runners it's probably best to grow in pots. If you place a few pots around your veggie patch it will deter white cabbage butterflies and other insects.

Make sure you water it at least once a week and to promote a bushier growth, snip off the tender budding tips. If you want to assure a lengthy harvest, you should also keep the flowers pinched back but don't pick any leaves before the herb is around 30cm high or you will weaken the plant.

To dry peppermint, gather the foliage in the early morning before the dew has evaporated. The leaves will be at their best prior to flowering when the level of essential oils is at its peak. Hang the bunches upside down in a warm spot or dry them in a warm oven. Strip the leaves from the stems and store them in airtight jars.

Mint tea is a refreshing drink that is said to aide indigestion, alleviate motion and morning sickness calm nerves and induce sleep. Now who wouldn't want to grow this wonderful plant.

Create A Herb Garden For the Kids

Teach the kids about growing and cooking at the same time by creating a potted garden. Herbs are fun to grow and your kids will love having their own garden to tend. Herbs are easy to grow from seed, requiring little patience as some herbs like cress and rocket, should start to sprout in as little as two days.

What you will need: Pots, troughs or window boxes. Potting mix, blood and bone or other fertiliser. Seed or seedlings, water and of course sunshine.

Find a sunny position in the garden, most herbs need lots of sunshine. Fill your pots almost full of potting mix, add a sprinkle of compost or blood and bone and mix in well. To sow seeds, follow packet instructions as to what depth the seeds should be planted. Water immediately after planting.

To plant seedlings, make a well in the pot that is as deep as your seedling. Gently take the seedling from its container (you may need to tap on the bottom to loosen the roots). Give the roots a little room by carefully loosening the soil around them. Plant into your pot, making sure the new soil level stays level with the soil the seedling is planted in. Press down firmly around the plant to compact the soil a

little. Once your herbs are in, give them a good watering to help them settle into their new soil.

Place paddle pop sticks in the pots with the names of each plant written on them. Have fun.



Ears

Cotton buds are kryptonite to earwax, and have been used to de-clog ears for many years. However these wonderful cotton buds can also be extremely dangerous to those who do not use them properly.

We all know earwax isn't as bad as it is annoying to deal with, it protects your eardrums from dirt, dust, bacteria and water.... however, when using a cotton bud it can push the earwax even deeper into your eardrum.

As your cotton bud moves bacteria and fungus to the inner parts of your eardrum, extremely dangerous infections can begin to form. As most of us know, ear infections are really painful.

Be sure you are only using the cotton buds to clean the outside area of your ear and around the canal, as this will prevent any bacteria from reaching further into your ear.

If you are now afraid to stick anything into your ear, mix water, white vinegar and rubbing alcohol together and add a couple of drops into your ear.

Olive oil is also extremely effective at softening earwax, making it much easier to fall out of your ear. Be sure you don't put too much in, use an eye dropper and put just a couple of drops in. Too much and it could clog up your eardrum even more.





ANZAC POPPIES TO CROCHET

Last year so many people were wanting to know how to crochet the poppies that several people were wearing at the Anzac Dawn Service. I have made up two patterns which are quick and easy to do. All you need is some red and black wool and a 3.5crochet hook.

Poppy 1: Using Black Chain 4, join with a slip stitch to form a ring. Round 1: 10 Double Crochet into ring, join with sl and fasten off.

Round 2: Join red wool and *chain 5, skip two stitches and slip into next stitch*, repeat until you have 5 sets of chain 5.

Round 3: * Dc into first space and then Tr 8 in the 5 chain space,

1dc*, repeat on all of the 5 chain spaces. Fasten off.

Poppy 2: 4 Chain, sl into first chain to form ring.

Row1: 8 Double Crochet into ring, sI into 1st dc. Row 2: * 3 chain, 3 Tr in first st, 3 Tr into next, 3 chain, sc into same

space*. Repeat around. Fasten off.



Snake Safety

Summer is not quite over but we can still expect some really warm days and nights so please be alert for snakes on your property. Snakes are attracted by potential food and good places to hide. Waterways are home to frogs, whilst sheds, compost and covered woodpiles attract rats and mice. If you have frogs and/or rodents, you may have snakes.

Contrary to popular belief, snakes are shy and timid. They do not like to cross open ground where they are exposed to birds of prey. They travel through long grass, amongst leaf-litter or under shrubbery or debris.

When they are not hunting, they are working on maintaining their body temperature. Snakes are ectothermic (from the Greek 'ectos' meaning 'outside' and 'therme' meaning heat'). In other words, they use the sun, instead of their metabolism, to keep warm. Diurnal (day active) snakes do this by basking in direct sunlight, whilst nocturnal (night active) snakes tend to cuddle up to warm surfaces, such as rocks, which have been heated by the sun earlier in the day.

The common phrase 'cold blooded' is in fact incorrect, as their blood is just the same temperature as ours. And, like us - if it is cold, they are cold, and if it's hot, they too are hot, so they seek their hiding places accordingly.

On cool days, snakes enter warm, insulated hideouts like rabbit burrows, wood piles or compost heaps whilst in hot weather, they are more likely to slip under houses or into sheds with nice, cold concrete floors.

It's never too late to make your garden less appealing:

- 1: Remove any debris lying around like corrugated iron or timber.
- 2: Stack firewood neatly and away from the house in an exposed, stand alone pile.
- 3: Put your compost in a bin with a tight-fitting floor and sides.
- 4: Keep bird aviaries and chicken coops clean and tidy to reduce rodents.
- 5: If your house is on stumps, do not enclose the sides. Keep the space underneath completely clear and open, so you can see right through to the other side.
- 6: Keep your grass short and your garden tidy.
- 7: Keep your sheds tidy and store everything on shelves at least 10cm up off the floor.
- 8: Try to control rodents, but do not lay traps or baits where they may harm native wildlife like possums or lizards.
- 9: Never leave your doors open.

Under no circumstances should you ever attempt to catch or kill a snake. Snakes are protected by law, and it is a criminal offence to harm one.

The vast majority of snake-bites occur when people are trying to catch or kill snakes. If you see a snake, walk quietly away and leave it well alone. It will leave of its own accord, or if you would like it removed from your property call your local snake catcher.

Be snake conscious, and remember some simple rules:

- 1: Never put your hands where you can't see them.
- 2: Wear boots and trousers when walking through long grass or leaf litter, and watch where you walk.
- 3: Take a torch if you are out on warm nights.
- 4: Keep cats indoors or in a cat run. Even a well fed domestic moggy will kill hundreds of native birds, lizards and small marsupials each year, without your knowledge.

Likewise, they will attempt to kill snakes, and are very likely to get bitten.

5: Last, but not least, it is true that if you drive over a snake, it may become caught up under your car.
ALWAYS AVOID RUNNING OVER A SNAKE.

Pet owners should be aware that they need to monitor their dogs, cats or other pets on warm days particularly if you are close to bushland. It is often difficult to tell when a dog has been bitten, while some dogs (and cats) show symptoms known as pre-paraletic signs such as wobbliness, collapsing, inappropriate urination, defecation or vomiting, others will not show any signs - and a bite site can be extremely hard to find amongst their hair. Your pet may not feel any pain, there may not be any swelling and they may not yelp or cry. Some pets show no initial symptoms, but can stop breathing within an hour of being bitten. If you see your pet come into contact with a snake, take it to your vet immediately for assessment. Animals can die from paralysis caused by the venom so it is important for owners to act immediately to treat their animal with anti-venom. If you can identify the snake it will help the vet but normally they can run a few tests to learn what kind of snake has bitten your pet.

Unlike first aid training for people, pressure bandages are not recommended for pets with suspected snake bites. Animals are most commonly bitten around their head, neck, shoulders and chest, so a pressure bandage in any of these areas would interfere with the animals breathing.

Generally the survival rate is high (around 90%) if the animal receives the correct treatment.



Keep your property tidy throughout the year to avoid attracting snakes, it's never too late in the season to start having a clean up.

From The Past-Assorted Clippings From The Early Days

ANNIVERSARY OF WESLEYAN SUNDAY SCHOOL - April 2nd, 1887

The anniversary of the Wesleyan Sunday school was celebrated on March 27 and 28. On Sunday Mr. Derrington preached in the morning and evening, and in the afternoon addressed the scholars. On Monday a tea provided by friends, and attended to by Mesdames Skewes and Blackham, and Misses Loftus and Skewes - was given to the scholars when the jubilee medals, with ribbon attached, were distributed by the superintendent (Mr. Kelly). Trays for the public tea were given by Mesdames Harvey, Kelly, and Keckwick. At the evening meeting, at which Mr. Kelly presided, an address was given by Rev. R. S. Casely. The superintendent read his report, which showed the following results: Scholars, 69; officers and teachers, 7. Mr. Derrington gave an illustrated lecture on "Phrenology" and several ladies and gentlemen had their characters and mental capacities described. The lecturer then caused much surprise and interest by stating that he had that afternoon, through the agency of the divining-rod, found an hitherto unknown spring of water under the church, and proceeded to test the correctness of the statement, many of the audience doing so for themselves. A little mesmerism concluded an instructive entertainment. During the evening several hymns were sung by the scholars. Miss Skewes acted as organist. On behalf of the Sunday school Mrs. Blackham presented each scholar with a prize. Votes of thanks were tendered to the ladies giving trays, to Miss Skewes for her vocal tuition of the children, to the decorators, and to the numerous friends who had worked for and aided in making so successful and anniversary.

ONE TREE HILL, April 1, 1889

On Sunday, March 24, the local Sunday school anniversary was held. Two sermons were preached by Mr. Shepherd, of Gawler. On Tuesday a picnic was held on Sampson's Flat, a dinner and tea being provided by ladies of the church. During the day a large number of visitors were on the ground. To the Sunday school children prizes were given for tilting, footraces, and other games. A cricket match was also played between the Salisbury and One Tree Hill clubs. On Sunday March 30, Mr. Kelly (the superintendent) distributed the annual prizes, each scholar receiving a gift. The scholars number 69 and the officers and teachers 5.

AGRICULTURAL BUREAUS Saturday October 10, 1903

Meeting held - present: Messrs. Bowman (chair), Hogarth, Ifould, Kelly, Smith, and Clucas (hon secretary), and four visitors. Various matters in connection with dairying were discussed. For bulls disposed to get through the fences a short hobble had been found effective, and at the same time saved trouble in managing the herd. The danger of giving separator milk too freely to calves was referred to by a member who had lost a calf recently from no other reason that he could suggest. Young lucerne should be fed gradually until the cows were used to it, otherwise cases of bloat or hoven would occur. Carbonate of soda was found an effective drench in cases of bloat. The Cape tulip was described by some of the members, but as far as known it did not exist in the district.

RED CROSS Friday March 30, 1917

At a meeting held in August 1916, it was decided to form a branch of the Red Cross Society at One Tree Hill, the officers were:- Mrs. H.H. Blackham (President), Mrs. R. Fiebig (hon. Treasurer), Mrs. F. L. Ifould (hon secretary). Meetings have been held monthly, and although a small circle they have been able to send a substantial parcel of comforts for the soldiers to the Red Cross depot each month. Mrs. H.H. Blackham gave a good start by presenting a parcel of material (two rolls of flannelette, cotton, tape, etc.), Mrs. Frank Barritt, of Yattalunga, also gave rolls of flannelette and flannel. Other gifts of socks, mittens, scarves, etc. have been received from Mr. J. S. Harvey, jnr., Miss D. Stuart, Mrs. Skewes, and Misses D. and E. McBride. Mrs. Frank Bowman presented a sheep-skin to be disposed of in any way the members decided upon.

This ad for a film was advertised in the Bunyip newspaper in 1920. Apparently it is an American silent comedy film based on a novel of the same name by Maurice Leblanc. The movie was released November 2, 1919.

ADVERSE WEATHER March 26, 1920

Adverse weather somewhat marred the success of the fourteenth annul Rechabite Festival which was held at Sampson's Flat last Saturday. Nevertheless a pleasurable time was spent by those who attended. The following are the results of the various sports: Sheaf tossing: A. Willison, Stepping the Distance: K. Moss, Putting the Weight: C. Fiebig, Tug-a-war: Willison's team, Bowling at Stump: C. Curtis, Sheffield Handicap: T. Guerin.

In the evening a concert was held, the Adelaide artists present were Misses Thelma Martin, A.M.U.A., Hilda Gill, A.M.U.A., and Linda Blake, Mr. and Mrs. James Anderson, and Master Val Anderson and Bro. H. Evans (District Superintendent of Juvenile Tents) presided.

A SOLDIERS LOSS March 29, 1922

Mr. Victor Bellchambers (a returned soldier) was burning stubble yesterday when the fire got away and burnt his haystack and 24 swarms of bees.

ONE TREE HILL FFCF Friday 26 March, 1943

Part of the programme of the monthly meeting of the One Tree Hill unit, held on March 18th, was a Cake and Biscuit competition amongst members. The judges, Mrs. Jack Harvey and Mrs. Modystack, awarded prizes to the following: Mrs. J. L. Blackham, Mrs. L. Crocker, Mrs. H. Hender, Mrs. A. V. Kirk and Mrs. Lang. Most of the entries were later sold and the proceeds, together with those for afternoon tea, trading table and minor competitions brought the total for the afternoon's effort to £10.

At the instance of Mrs. H. W. Kelly, Corporal H. Pratt, a returned soldier, gave an interesting address on his experiences in the army in the Middle East.

On view was a gift from the members to one of their number lately married, Mrs. J. Wythin nee Miss Lilian Tamblyn. The gift consisted of a wicker tray with cloth to match worked by Mrs. Hender, and a glass compote was included.

A parcel of knitted goods and face washers was handed in and packed ready for headquarters.

DANCE AT ONE TREE HILL Saturday March 30, 1928

On March 24 a plain and fancy dress dance was held in the One Tree Hill Institute, in aid of Minda. It was organised by Mrs. J. Richardson and Miss Dulcie Charlson. The Green and Grey Orchestra supplied the music. Judges of the fancy dress costumes were Miss Lorna Docherty and Mrs. Steer. Prizes were awarded for best dressed lady (Harem Girl), Mrs. J. Vockins jun. and most original (Old Dutch Cleaner), Mr. M. Richardson. Supper was provided by the ladies. A monologue was rendered by Mr. Hicks.



Horse Care - Floating Preparation

Floating the horse

They do not require buoyancy vests, they float quite well.

Check your equipment:

The Float

Solid float that will not fall apart if he kicks the walls or jumps on the floor.

Stable and balanced so it does not rock unduly.

Good brakes. Electric brakes if you are at all doubtful about the towing vehicle or the horse/s are heavy.

Rump bar or door to close the horse in without lifting the ramp.

Easy lift ramp so you are not at risk while lifting it.

Good lights. Let traffic know you are there and where you are turning.

Secure floor. Not slippery even when wet (urine) and rubber matting well fastened down so it does not roll up under the horse's feet.

The Vehicle

Able to tow the float and horse with comfort. Don't get stuck on a hill.

Able to stop the float and horse. This is where many people get caught. Light cars can be pushed sideways by the float and get involved in an accident. It's not about the power of the engine.

Tie up rope with panic snap attached. Put the panic snap on the float end of the rope, not near his head. If he does panic you need to be able to pull the clip. If he is throwing his head around, it will be very difficult to undo a clip close to his head.

Tie up point. This is one time we do not want our horse breaking away so don't use binding twine. Far better to have him in the float than jumping out at 80 kph. Yes, it happens. Tie rope should be long enough that he can swing his head for balance but not bite the neighbour nor turn around.

Horse gear

Halter: I prefer a rope halter to load although many prefer a webbing one to tie up.

Long Lead rope: to keep control of your horse without having to run or let go of the rope if he takes off. I like 12 foot. You can allow mistakes and get corrections without having to move off the ramp (sometimes).

Whip: To reinforce the "go forward": cue, not to beat the horse up. It should comfortably reach his girth while you are standing just in front of his head. I like a training whip, although a long dressage whip may work for you.

Hydrangeas

Did you know that you can strike your own hydrangeas? You can even change the colour by altering the PH level of the soil.

Most of us love the look of Hydrangeas, they add a wonderful splash of colour to your garden or in pots on the patio. You can grow your own from cuttings quickly and easily.

Hydrangeas belong to the deciduous group of plants, they can range in size from smaller style bushes to the larger tree-like varieties.

Firstly you will have to select your cutting, you will need to brush away mulch and soil from the base of the back or side of a mature hydrangea plant. The stems should have 2 or 3 pairs of leaves, you should also be looking for a cutting that is at the base of the plant. Remember the woodier the cutting the more roots they will produce.

Your cuttings should be about 12-15cm long, another good tip is to take the cuttings in the morning and definitely do not take cuttings when the leaves are wilted.

Use good quality potting mix and fill the pots or trays to the top. Soak the prepared tray or pots with water for at least a half hour before planting your cuttings.

After taking your cuttings, trim the leaves with scissors or shears. Be careful not to cut the buds or nodes. The idea with trimming is to reduce the demand for water while the plant is rooting.

Before you know it you will have some new hydrangeas.







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All you need is a good imagination to come up with some original ideas. You may like to get the kids involved too. It promises to be lots of fun.

Below there are some ideas to get you started. Plants that would be ideal are perennials or perhaps some cacti or succulent plants which will not take a lot of water and trimming.

Maybe you can get everyone involved in this project over Easter!

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Well, it's that time of the year again, St Patrick's Day. It is an annual observance that is very popular here in Australia on March 17. This event serves as a tribute to Ireland and one of its patron saints, St Patrick.

What do people do? Many Australians come together on St Patrick's Day to celebrate Irish culture and remember St Patrick's life and achievements. Some businesses and organisations hold St Patrick's Day breakfasts and lunches where lucky door prizes are given and Irish food and drinks are served. Many of our hotels hold St Patrick's Day parties in the evenings, where local bands play Irish music and green drinks are served.

Some of the traditional food that you can be served with are Irish Soda Bread, Corned Beef and Cabbage, Beef and Guiness Pie, Irish Cream Chocolate Mousse Cakes, Irish Coffee, Irish Potato Champ (also known as poundies, call or pandy) and of course good old Irish Potato Soup.

Background: Many Australians remember the Irish settlement and culture on St Patrick's Day. The Irish were among the first Europeans to settle in Australia. They comprised a portion of the convict settlement population in the late 1700s. More than 300,000 other Irish settlers (not convicts) migrated to Australia between 1840 and 1914. Many Irish immigrants came to Australia to escape famine in the homeland. About 30% of Australians are believed to have some Irish ancestry today.

One way of preserving Irish traditions and customs in Australia is celebrating St Patrick's Day each year. St Patrick died on March 17 in or around the year 493. He worked as a missionary in Ireland and it is believed that he banished 'snakes' from the country although the term may have referred to druids or pagan worshippers.

Many people wear the colour green on St Patrick's Day. They may also wear a symbol of Ireland, such as a brooch in the shape of a shamrock or a harp. Images of leprechauns or a pot of gold are seen in promotional material for St Patrick's Day. The Irish flag and balloons in flag's colours (green, white and orange) are also visible during events and activities on the day.

Ingredients:

- 2 Tablespoons of Butter
- 2 Medium sized onions
- * 3 Large potatoes, washed and peeled
- * 2 Cups Chicken stock
- 2 Cups of milk
- 1 Clove garlic, crushed
- * 1 Teaspoon dried parsley
- * 3 Sticks of celery, chopped
- 1 Pinch salt & pepper
- * 1½ Cups grated cheese.



Method: Thinly slice the onions and potatoes and add to a pan with melted butter. Add the chicken stock, celery, dried parsley, garlic and season with salt and pepper. Cover the pan allowing the vegetables to soften under a low heat, do not let them brown. Add milk and mix until soup becomes thick, then stir in cheese until fully melted. You may also like to add some bacon for extra flavour.

- 2 Tablespoons plain flour
- 800g Chuck steak, trimmed and cut into 3cm pieces
- 1/4 Cup olive oil
- 2 Sticks celery, chopped
- 1 Brown onion
- 1 Carrot, peeled and chopped
- 200g Brown mushrooms, chopped
- 2 Tablespoons tomato paste
- 1 Cup Guiness beer
- 2 Cups beef stock
- 2 Bay leaves
- 1/2 Cup flat leaf parsley leaves, finely chopped

Method: Place flour and salt & pepper in a snap lock bag. Add steak and shake to coat. Heat 2 tablespoons oil in a saucepan over medium heat. Cook steak, in batches, for 3 minutes or until brown. Transfer to plate. Heat remaining oil in saucepan over medium heat, add celery, onion, carrot and mushrooms. Cook, stirring for 5 minutes or until tender. Add tomato paste. Cook, stirring for 2 minutes. Gradually stir in Guiness. Add stock and bay leaves. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to medium low. Return steak and any juices to pan. Cover and simmer for 1 hour. Remove lid, simmer uncovered for 30 minutes or until steak is tender. Remove bay leaves. Stir in parsley, season with salt and pepper. Ideally served with champs (mashed potato) and soda bread. Champs recipe page 22.

(It helps to place a clean cloth over them to absorb any moisture. Heat milk and onions in saucepan until warm. Mash potatoes, stir in milk
