

PLAYFORD COUNCIL - LOCAL COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

I hope this edition of the Grapevine finds everyone well and the much needed rain is filling the tanks.

Illegal Dumping & Rural Roadside Amenity - Illegal roadside dumping continues to impact community amenity and cost ratepayers. Many dumped items could be managed via existing services such as red bins, green organics, and hard waste collection. At the June Council meeting, I will move a motion calling for a proactive review of current systems, stronger public education, service gap identification, and collaboration with NAWMA and the State Government. This includes exploring targeted initiatives like a tyre deposit scheme.

Why Are Rates Increasing? - A key driver is *cost-shifting*, where State responsibilities are transferred to councils without funding. The LGA reports councils face \$253.9M annually in compliance costs—averaging \$3.7M per council, or \$271 per property.

The Essential Services Commission of SA (ESCOSA) Advice on Financial Sustainability - ESCOSA's advice in Council's 2025/26 Annual Business Plan finds City of Playford financially sustainable amid projected growth. However, it cautions against overestimating future rateable properties, as this could shift debt burden onto existing ratepayers. ESCOSA, as SA's independent regulator, helps ensure councils make financially sound, long-term decisions.

Curtis Road Infrastructure - While the State Government has committed \$250M to remove the Curtis Road level crossing, duplication of the full road remains unaddressed. With 21,000+ daily vehicle movements, Curtis Road now functions as vital east-west State infrastructure. Yet the Government expects Council—and ratepayers—to fund the additional upgrades required, with cost estimates near \$250M. This is unsustainable and seemingly goes against the advice given by ESCOSA, South Australia's independent economic regulator and advisory board, a role it was given by Parliament. It says the City of Playford needs to continue managing borrowing risk, reducing level of net financial liabilities as well as monitor average rate rises to help reduce cost of living pressure on the community.

Annual Business Plan (ABP) 2025/26 - The adoption of the ABP 2025/26 will go before Council at the Ordinary Council Meeting on the 24^{th of} June 2025, with a proposed rate increase of 4.54%. The City of Playford received 27 feedback submissions from its 113,000 residents. Our ward that covers the One Tree Hill areas, Hillbank and Craigmore had three responses from Craigmore residents.

The feedback on the 2025/26 ABP reflected a neutral to positive sentiment. Just over half of the survey respondents had engaged with the draft plan, indicating a moderate level of community awareness. While 50% expresses a neutral stance, the remaining respondents were in support of the draft plan.

I will continue to advocate for our rural communities and Ward 3 seeking the right balance between infrastructure and community needs across Playford, while being focused for downwards pressure on rates, debt management strategies and improving transparency.

CFS INCIDENT REPORT MAY 2025



OTH CFS Brigade has enjoyed some recent respite over this past month, allowing some well earned down time for brigade members as well as them being able to refresh skillsets other than fire fighting.

This past month has seen a Vehicle fire on the 18th of May on the corner of Uley Rd and Gawler One Tree Hill Rd. A Grass fire closer to the township on the 22nd Of May on Harvey Rd, requiring the assistance of trucks and crews from Hermitage CFS Brigade and locals alike. Another Grass fire occurred on the 23rd of May in Elizabeth East, with crews being placed on a stop on call. The 31st of May saw a OTH crew called out to investigate a fire on FrankBarker Rd, however nothing was found. A Vehicle accident occurred on June 1st at Humbug scrub when a vehicle hit a tree while performing a u-turn. Another vehicle fire occurred on the 3rd of June, with the owner noticing smoke from their bonnet. The final call out this month was for a spill clean up within the township on Blacktop rd on the 12th of June.


Brigade members have attended CFS courses improving the overall skill levels within the brigade. Brigade trucks have been serviced with the rectification of mechanical and operational issues. All OTH CFS trucks are back at the station ready to go. All chainsaw qualified firefighters completed their annual Skill Maintenance Drill, thanks to a local member allowing the brigade to use their property.

The Brigade attended an End of Fire Season Para group BBQ on 26th of May. The Group Officer thanked the members for their excellent work over that period. The Minister for Emergency Services and

Corrections, Emily Bourke, MLC also attended and passed on her personal thanks to all our volunteers.

MENTAL HEALTH - NATASHA STEEN

When I ask — What do you need to do to take better care of your physical health?.... What might you say? Maybe you would say something like ... "well I know the sort of things that need to happen, but I just don't put the time into it". Or you might say... "well clearly it starts with the time I spend on exercise ... or the colour of my diet is really important". My guess is you would have some idea of the steps that may assist to improve your physical health, whether you had the motivation, interest or particular knowledge to act is another thing!

But, what if I said... What would it look like if you were taking good care of your mental health?... What might you say?... I often ask this question of people I chat with and they usually stumble for words. Or, if they find some they speak of things they might do that sound less purposeful and clear.

What I am noticing is that people are more inclined to be "intentional" around the nurturing their physical wellbeing but far less focused on what might be needed to take care of their mental health.

Just to recap... Mental Health is typically defined as ... a state of well-being where an individual can cope with life's normal stresses, realise their abilities, and contributes to their community. It is about your thinking, your emotions and behaviour being reasonably stable to get on with daily functioning. I like to think of Mental Health as on a spectrum.. where we all sit somewhere on this and can slide up and down from time to time. The key is knowing how to take care of you if you are sliding a bit.. what picks you up again etc.

Just like any aspect of health.. your Mental Health does take intentional effort to nurture and build. To illustrate this we can break down the components of how it is defined – you can consider how you are functioning in each of these spaces and what you might do to be more intentional...

Thoughts? – Consider looking at your thinking patterns... do you often take a pessimistic path.. do you spend a lot of time thinking about things you can not control? It is clever to practice tuning into your thoughts and shifting anything that is not healthy and consumes a lot of energy. Yes.. thinking can be very draining! You can really work to build you mindset muscles – seek some guidance from a counsellor if you are having particularly difficult thoughts, unhealthy cycles or lots of worrying thoughts.

Feelings? – Consider what emotions you commonly experience.. do you know how to take yourself down the scale when you are getting too grumpy or if you are feeling too sad etc. You will be the best version of you if you are

clear on how to tune into emotions, name them and know what helps you manage them as needed. Sometimes people need more professional support when a particular emotion is more dominant – for example fear, grief or doubt. Emotional regulation is a learnt skill and we all can be more intentional with investing effort in it.

Behaviour? – What goes on with your behaviour... consider any patterns that may be unhealthy for you or wasting your time. Perhaps there are behaviours that are impacting on you having strong interpersonal relationships or functioning at your best with day to day activities. You can take time to be a bit of bystander – step back and take a look at yourself or maybe get brave and ask family, friends or colleagues for feedback. Professional support can also assist people address unhealthy patterns of behaviour.

Overall it is important to consider the benefits of self-care and how this will nurture your mental health. Self Care is not selfish! You can not give to others from an empty bucket.

To take care of your mind:

- Get regular exercise. Just 30 minutes of walking every day can boost your mood and improve your health.
- Eat healthy, regular meals and stay hydrated.
- Make sleep a priority ask questions of your doctor if this is not going well.
- Try a relaxing activity something like stretching, yoga or tai chi have been found to reduce symptoms of stress
- Set goals and priorities your mind will be a little clearer when you have a little direction.
- Practice gratitude so much research shows us that being thankful enhances wellbeing.
- Focus on positivity remember how draining negative thoughts can be!
- Stay connected we don't need a lot of people in our life but some positive human connection is essential for our mental health too.

What does it mean to live in One Tree Hill and be a part of the community that we are?

I was born and raised in One Tree Hill, then later Humbug Scrub once the localities became gazetted suburbs. I remember Kersbrook road when it was the new alignment but still a dirt road and while properties had been sub divided, they hadn't been opened up and were still held as grazing farm enterprises. Milluna stud was full of horses, Trevilla had sheep and Tregoodwill had cattle. I think Nyroca was still one land holding, owned by Elders at the time as quarantine yard for export sheep out of Port Adelaide.

One Tree Hill had a real sense of community where just about everyone knew everyone and if you didn't know someone, your neighbour probably did.

I have one life-long friendship that started at Playgroup followed through Primary School, High School and onto University! It's a bond that was nurtured in the spirit of the One Tree Hill families and today we both still describe the friendship as 'we've been friends for life'.

However, I'm worried that One Tree Hill might not have the same feeling of community these days. Of course, things change as society evolves and develops but if our community spirit has gone, what can we do to get it back? Wasn't it good to see some rain falling after the drought conditions? Did you clean out your roof gutters before that 10mm of rain at the end of May or just let the wind blow everything out?

The next weather system early June gave us around 35mm of rain, but some cold air came in with it. Even the sunny Sunday afternoon was just 9 degrees outside.

Now that we've had some rain and the grass is growing, it's a great time to start your fire season preparations. If there's a few days suitable, spray the weeds while they are small, especially along fence lines and clean up fallen tree debris around the place. Of course, follow the directions on the label for spraying and for those of us who do have burning restrictions, make sure you follow those rules too!

Pastures are starting to offer some nutrients for our grazing animals now so hopefully the grazing pressure from the kangaroos subsides.

Let's talk roads. I think there's only one left in the district at 100km per hour now that Uley rd has been reduced to 80. Cue the social media outcry about drivers who need to learn how to drive etc etc. Perhaps a blanket 90 km per hour across the district is needed with reducing to 70 on the approaches to the township and 50 through? I get it that reducing speed limits is annoying, leads to frustration, takes more travel time and the other plethora of reasons, but I've been told of more than one property that are silently grateful for the reduced speed limit on Black Top road now. They're staying silent about it for fear of the likely backlash spewed by people who disagree with the new limit.

I've seen some impatient driving behaviour the last few months and certainly can sympathise with the people who do have to enter and exit their property along the busier roads.

Yes, we're all capable of safely enjoying driving the road end to end at 100kph plus all day every day, myself included. But living on one of the high-speed roads I can certainly see why speed limits are being reduced. Cheers.

WHAT'S FLOWERING IN MY GARDEN - Heather Fischer, Humbug Scrub

Winter has arrived. We have had rain. Finally we have received enough rain to put some water in the tanks and because we had some very heavy showers, there has been some run off into dams. More rain is needed to fill tanks and dams. We can hope that our weather forecasters' predictions for a wet Winter and Spring do come to fruition. The drought has not ended yet and I do feel for those communities that are still struggling through this drought.

Many plants died during the dry Summer and Autumn months and these need to be removed to make way for new plantings. Many cuttings that I took last Spring have struck and will be planted soon. Every plant will be given a tree/plant guard as the hungry kangaroos and rabbits will just devour any new plantings.

Flowering at the moment is a most beautiful Grevillea. Grevillea Winpara Apricot is a hybrid of Grevillea olivacea and will grow into a small rounded shape 1.2m

> -2.0m wide and 1.2m-2.00m high. This very hardy plant bears very attractive light green fine leafed foliage and produced masses of golden apricot spider shaped flowers during Winter and Spring. Many nectar loving birds such as the New Holland Honeyeaters and the Lesser Honeyeaters are attracted to this delightful shrub. This shrub can become quite dense as a rounded shrub and can offer a protective space for nests for small birds. Once established this shrub can be pruned to a desired shape and many can be planted to create a hedge.

> Grevillea Winpara Apricot will grow in full sun to part shade in a variety of well drained soils and it's beautiful apricot flowers at this time of the year are really welcomed when not many plants are in flower.

This Grevillea is available from all good nurseries and will give any gardener many years of enjoyment.

BIRDS IN MY BACKYARD - Julie Buttery, Humbug Scrub

Babbler. What a wonderful word to describe the sounds of this group of birds.

I have been hearing an unusual sound outside my window and this morning saw a group of Babblers. "Ah! That's what I heard." They are usually much further from the house but maybe our bird baths brought them closer this dry autumn.

The family make continuous contact calls while foraging in the underbrush. It has been described variously as "babbling" "chattering" and "miaaow" and varies depending on their locations and safety. Alarm calls are much louder, sounding more like "chuck chuck".

There are four species of Babblers, only one of which is common in our area. With his white supercilium (haven't we used that word a lot?) and brown crown, the White-browed Babbler may appear to be a plain bird. Closer examination shows colour variations within his overall brown and white plumage, being fawns through to almost black in some cases. With a pale belly and dark wings and crown, there is plenty of variation. The juvenile has an all black beak which becomes white underneath in maturity.

The White-browed babbler is a small to medium bird, about half way between a Willie Wagtail and a Magpie-lark in size.

Babblers build several nests, usually in the tops of shrubs and tends to be spherical, with a side entrance. Unusually, they build nests for communal roosting, for

escaping bad weather and only some are used for housing their eggs and growing chicks.

They forage on the ground, making short jumps to their next likely feeding area. They travel in family groups of about 10 to 20 individuals. Their preferred food is insects and small invertebrates.

While in NSW last spring I was excited to hear Babblers and managed to get photos. Then I realised they were Grey-crowned Babblers, so a different species. The joys of bird watching.

A Tick found on a South Australian Koala.

While ticks, particularly the paralysis tick (Ixodes holocyclus), are found on koalas in Queensland (QLD), they are not typically found on koalas in South Australia (SA). fore he was released after removing the only one tick

Yes, ticks are present in South Australia. While the paralysis tick (Ixodes holocyclus), which causes tick paralysis, is not found in SA, other tick species, like the brown dog tick, are present throughout the state. Brown dog ticks do not cause tick paralysis, though they can cause skin irritation and heavy infestations which may result in anaemia from excessive blood loss.

Ticks typically get on koalas when koalas brush against vegetation where ticks are waiting to attach themselves. Adult ticks, particularly the paralysis tick, often wait on the tips of grasses and shrubs, and then cling to passing animals. Koalas, like other animals, are susceptible to tick infestation when they venture onto the ground or through areas with vegetation. These types

of paralysis Ticks are found in QLD and NSW not SA.




