Incident Report

Keeping with the pattern of previous years, the month of June has been a very quiet month for incidents, but the Brigade has been busy preparing for the upcoming fire season. We have recently taken on a number of new recruits and welcome them on board. They are currently undergoing training and will be ready for next fire season.

As the cycle goes, having new recruits also means that we have had some members leave and we sincerely thank them for their time and effort.

Keeping things real, members were treated to a great training night at the start of June with a mock structure fire held at the OTH Soccer Clubrooms. This involved filling the building with 'smoke' (using a smoke machine) and planting 'casualties' throughout the building. The exercise simulated a structure fire turn-out from start to finish and gave us an opportunity to practice a number of skills. The billowing smoke set the scene and having set the smoke alarms off, it provided a very realistic scenario for the BA (Breathing Apparatus) team who conducted the Search and Rescue. One Tree Hill CFS thank the OTH Soccer Club for the use of their facilities.

On Sunday 21st June, the Premier hosted a 'Thank You BBQ' for volunteers and others who were involved in the Sampson Flat fire. It was an impressive reminder of the number of people who were involved in fighting the fire in January. In addition to the Premier, a number of dignitaries attended including the Governor and other politicians from the affected areas.

If you haven't already got a Bushfire Plan, Winter is the ideal time to prepare one. As we now know, this is not just for people in rural areas but also those in the township and the urban fringes.

There has been movement at the station (Council) for by now the word has got around that Tim Jackson, Playford Council CEO, has pulled up stumps and left for greener grounds. Mal Hemmerling is the current acting CEO and recruitment for a new CEO is in progress. Tim has been with Playford Council for 18 years, ever since amalgamation and has achieved some impressive and some not so impressive milestones depending on which side of the fence you may be on at the time, has made some friends and inevitably some not so friends. Whatever the case, Tim has always strived to do the best he could within his limitations and as such we should wish Tim good luck and the all the best for his future endeavours.

Some people on McGilp road have been experiencing issues with the rural numbering system. I am pleased to report that these issues have now been addressed (pardon the pun).

Congratulations to the people on Gould's Creek Road, after what has been a long and arduous exercise, and for me a twelve year on, off, battle of negotiation, this month's Ordinary Council meeting has agreed to, thanks to the generous gifting of the right of way land to Council, take ownership of the right of way and make it a public road. I congratulate all the players in this saga on keeping their nerve, being polite and good-natured to Council and staff even under difficult circumstances and achieving a remarkable outcome guaranteeing a safer and more accessible road for all residents on an ongoing basis, albeit that they are now on the bottom of the re-sealing list, at least they will have a road that will be regularly maintained according to Council's maintenance programme. I also thank Cr Andrew Craig for coming on board and lending his voice to the debate and all my fellow Councillors on the night for their unanimous support in achieving this outcome.

It has been a while now since the Sampson Flat Bushfires and the green grass has softened people's memories of the devastating

impact of the fires, so I am pleased to report that the State government and the CFS have established a Bushfire Prevention Planning Committee to meet with district bushfire prevention committees to gather information and develop strategies. Playford Council is one of the few Councils that still have a bushfire prevention committee and we are inviting the new planning committee to attend one of our meetings. This is a new initiative so I cannot give much information on content but will keep our community and Council informed as to what we can do and how we can get involved in contributing to positive outcomes.

Congratulations to the One Tree Hill Soccer Club who were successful in their application for a Council Community Event Grant.

The speed limit on the Gawler One Tree Hill Road will be reduced to 80kph, signage is going up in July.

Council has approved its Budget, Assets Management, and Long Term Financial Plan so we can now, despite only one person making a submission at the public hearing, look forward (not) to our Council Rate notices in the mail early in the new financial year. The Minister for Communities and Social Inclusion, Hon. Zoe Bettison and her adviser, Mr. Jeremy Makin, made an impromptu visit to the OTH Hall on the Thursday afternoon (8th January) and experienced first hand the very busy and emotional scenes. They immediately saw the need and were able to make direct contact with Housing SA to request that Connie and Sue, who were taking registrations from residents, extend their time at One Tree Hill to assist the residents to complete their applications for assistance that day. This is one example of the many ways various MPs assisted volunteers and evacuees at the hall.

During his speech on Sunday, the Premier made mention of his personal insights into events, gained by flying over the area, meeting many involved in the bushfire effort as well as a memorable discussion with the OTH CFS Captain, Tom Walsh.

"The second time I visited, it was towards the end of the fire-fighting effort. I talked at length with a CFS volunteer named Thomas Walsh - a young man who spoke with great pride about what his brigade had achieved. As we spoke, the heavens opened and so began the drenching that meant we had turned the corner." the Premier said.

The Premier added that the tone of his conversation with Tom changed midstream, due to the intense downpour, from deep concern and urgency to an element of relief and hope.

Tzu Chi Group Included in Thank You at Gumeracha

The Tzu Chi group is a Buddhist Charity Organisation. The Tzu Chi Foundation was founded by Dharma Master Cheng Yen in Taiwan.

The group were there when help was needed during the Sampson Flat Bushfires but it has only recently been noted how much they contributed to people in need. The moment they learnt that the bushfire was classed as a National Disaster, they started making contact with Politicians and staff members in the State Recovery Office explaining their intentions. On the 8th February they went to the Kersbrook Community Hall to begin their first Emergency Cash Card and eco-blankets distributions to the victims of the bush fire. Cash card is like an EFTPOS card, with \$1,500 or \$750 per household for totally destroyed houses or damaged houses respectively. Eco-blankets were handed out to everyone. Two of the most basic but important necessities in anyone's life is not to suffer from hunger and to be kept warm, so their actions were greatly appreciated. The group realised that there were still quite a number of families who did not receive their newsletter about the first cash card distribution, so they set up a second distribution event on 1st March, 2015 inviting those who had missed out the first time round.

Tzu Chi Australia has recently started a new program where they can provide both short and long term care for mental illness and financial assistance to any families with low income to pay for their children's education.

Donations are greatly appreciated by anyone, so that they can help everyone in times of need.

The One Tree Hill Institute is scheduled to re-open as we go to print. From what we have heard the hall is looking quite smart with new curtains, stage and a fresh coat of paint. The kitchen and supper room now comply with health and safety regulations and look very modern and well equipped. Year round comfort is ensured now with new reverse cycle air conditioning installed through the main halls.

Community groups such as Senior Citizens, Play Group etc. are scheduled to recommence soon so get in touch with the organisations to make sure of the date.

The One Tree Hill Country Market is on the 4th July after the big break. If you come along to the market it will be an ideal time for you to see what changes have been made at the Institute, after all, it was many members of the public who had a significant input into the renovations. The market is proving to be very popular with many new stalls in the outside area as well as the usual stall holders.



How to Grow a Straw Garden

Did you know that you can grow a garden in a bale of straw? Yes, truly, you can grow fresh fruit and vegetables directly in straw bales.

Most of us know that the soil around One Tree Hill is not that good and needs a lot of work to get the ground ready for planting. This is a really simple solution and so easy to

The straw is an ideal container for growing vegetables as the hollow tubes are designed by Mother Nature to suck up and hold moisture. As the insides of the bales decompose, they provide a rich medium for vegetable growth.

Source your straw from the local Fodder Store or direct from a farmer. The best time to purchase is now so that you have time to arrange it for Spring planting.

Find a spot in your garden that receives at least 6-8 hours sunshine. Before you set up your bales, lay down landscape fabric to prevent weeds from growing up through the bales. Arrange the bales side by side in twos, with their cut side up. The strings that bind the bales should run across the sides, not across the planting surface. The strings will help keep the shape of the bales as they start to soften and decompose.

Two weeks before you plant, you have to get the bales cooking. This means wetting and fertilizing the bales for roughly 10 days to start composting the inner straw. For the first six days, put down 3 cups of organic fertilizer per bale every other day, and water the bales to push the fertilizer down and thoroughly saturate the straw. On the off days, simply water the bales. Days 7 through to 9, lay down ½ cup of organic fertilizer each day and water. Day 10 put down 3 cups with phosphorus and potassium (bone or fish meal mixed with 50% wood ash, works like a charm).

If you stick your finger into the bales, they'll be hot and moist. You'll start to see some 'peppering' black soil like clumps that signal the beginning of the composting that will continue through the growing season. If mushrooms sprout up, rejoice - they won't harm your plants, it means the straw is decomposing as it should.

Build a trellis and greenhouse in one. One of the coolest things about straw bale gardening is that it combines the best of container gardening with vertical gardening. If you erect 2 posts at the end of each row of bales and run wire between them at intervals of about 25cm from the tops of bales it will create a trellis.

As your seeds sprout, you can use the bottom wire to drape a plastic tarp to create an instant greenhouse for those chilly early season nights. As the plants begin to grow, the wire works like a vertical trellis, supporting your cucumbers, squash and assorted viney vegetables.

Time to plant: If you are planting seedlings, use your trowel to separate the straw in the shape of a hole and add some potting mix to help cover the exposed roots. If you are planting seeds, then cover the bales with about 5cm layer of potting mix and sow into the seedbed. As the seeds germinate, they'll grow roots down into the bale itself. While you are at it, plant some annual flowers into the sides of the bales, or some herbs, it's otherwise underutilized growing space and besides, it will make your garden a lot prettier.

If you lay a soaker hose over your bales, you have pretty much eliminated all your work until harvest. That's because your soil doesn't contain weed seeds. If your bales start to sprout what looks like weeds, it's probably because you have been sold hay instead of straw. Weeds can be kept under control by washing the sprouts in diluted vinegar. If you don't mind the look though, grass shouldn't harm your plants, they will most likely die off from the heat produced by the bale's decomposition.

When the harvest season ends, the bales will be soft, saggy and grey, but that's exactly what you want. Because when you pile the straw together and leave it to compost over winter, you'll have a mound of beautiful compost to fill all your pots and planters in spring.

This would be a great project for kids to help you with and so rewarding with your very own fresh vegies from the straw garden.

Lilies Can Harm Your Cat

Having read an article recently about the dangers of lilies around cats we thought this information may be an eye opener to you too.

Although lilies are flowers commonly used in floral arrangements, and cats often have access to them, most cat owners and florists, are unaware of lily intoxication as a potential cause of kidney (renal) failure in cats.

Lilies are becoming especially popular as a gift in Australia, and the flowers that are sold are exceedingly toxic to cats.

The key to successful treatment is early recognition of possible ingestion, and immediate treatment to prevent complete kidney failure.


Indoor cats and especially kittens, may be drawn to floral arrangements as they are a novel feature in an otherwise very familiar environment that often lacks other forms of vegetation. In the course of investigating the flowers, the cats may play with and sometimes chew parts of the plant. This could easily go unnoticed by their owners as it may occur whilst the cat is alone. Similarly, cats with access to the lilies growing outdoors in domestic gardens may not be observed chewing the lily.

The toxic substance in lilies that injures the kidneys has not been identified, but all parts of the lily are poisonous - flowers, stamen, stem, leaves and roots. The toxic dose is unknown but thought to be reached by ingestion of, or mouthing, very small amounts of the plant.

Cats seem to be unique amongst domestic pets in their susceptibility to this intoxication, possibly due to differences in their metabolism. For the same sort of reason, cats also can be easily poisoned by human medications such as paracetamol, ibuprofen and aspirin, and these too are lethal for cats in doses that would be safe for humans. Interestingly, dogs that consume large amounts of the plant develop only mild gastrointestinal signs, while rats and rabbits show no signs of toxicity at all.

SIGNS OF LILY POISONING:

The first signs of toxicity are vomiting, depression and loss of



DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT: Your vet can diagnose the presence of acute renal failure using blood tests, urine tests, an ultrasound examination and possibly a needle biopsy of the kidneys. Although there is no specific test than can identify lily toxification as the cause with certainty, there are characteristic laboratory findings that make the diagnosis likely if supported by evidence of lily ingestion. The treatment for lily poisoning is intensive, typically involving intravenous fluid therapy and hospitalisation for several days.

Lily toxicity should always be considered in any case of acute renal failure in cats. Ingestion of small amounts of plants or flowers of the Liliaceae family can cause severe, irreversible kidney failure and death in cats therefore never let your cats have access to flowers or plants in this family.

There are many types of Lilies including, Asian, Day, Easter, Glory, Japanese Show, Peace, Rubrum, Stargazer, Tiger and Wood Lilies that are toxic to cats. Even if they ingest the smallest part of the lily plant it may cause death.









Horse Care - FIRST TACK

Frequently, purchase of a horse includes the tack, or saddlery, that has been used on him. There are several reasons. These are the most common:

- The previous owner probably has no use for the tack, so it is an easy way to sell it.
- ◆ The previous owner may want the best fit of tack for their much loved animal.
- The buyer gets a good combined price so is more likely to pay the asking price (this often ties up with the first, though, "selling the saddle easily").

Be aware that previous use of tack does not mean it actually fits. Past articles have covered the fitting of tack (also known as gear) and I won't elaborate here. Suffice to say that changes to the horse may mean they no longer fit, or they may not have fitted correctly in the first place.

Extra hair in winter may mean the bridle browband is too tight, even if it fits in summer or when clipped. This will cause rubbing on the backs of the ears (pain) which leads to head tossing and possibly reluctance to be bridled. Changing shape of back muscles will mean the saddle no longer fits. These changes come about because of weight loss or gain (summer, winter, changes of diet) or change of use (less fast riding because you are inexperienced, more/less jumping etc). Even changing from dressage to western styles of riding (or vice versa) will change the shape of the horse as he uses the muscles in different ways.

Occasionally poor fit is because the previous owner simply did not know any better.

Whatever the reason, give the horse the benefit of the doubt. If you think there are signs of discomfort, have the fit checked by an experienced horse person, or even better, by a professional saddle fitter (available through saddlery shops at a small charge). Remember, it was an experienced horse person that you bought the gear from and told you it fitted.

A few points to remember:

- Too big is as bad as too small, in all things: every strap & the bit of the bridle, saddle, girth, saddle cloth, rugs (including shoulder holes) and their straps.
- Saddles need to fit the horse (priority) and the rider (who can accept less than perfect but will ride less easily if the saddle does not fit them)
- Woolly/hairy/furry horses are bigger than those in their summer coat.
- Exercise changes the shape of horses; even the type of exercise will do so.
- ♦ Some unscrupulous people will sell tack as "fitting" just to move it on, even when knowing it does not fit.

I am not a professional saddle fitter. I have attended several saddle fitting clinics and think I have a general idea of the issues. I am willing to come and give you a second opinion on your tack if you would like but will defer to a specialist if there are ongoing issues.

One last word: horses put up with an amazing amount of discomfort without complaint, so if yours is complaining, however quietly, check it out.

ONE TREE HILL— Friday July 30th, 1920

Thursday evening of last week saw a Farewell Social in the One Tree Hill Institute, Miss M. Turner, School Mistress, being the guest of the residents prior to her transfer to a larger school. The attendance was good, and the evening was very enjoyable, musical items being supplied by Misses Twelftree, Smith, Blackham, and Fiebig. Miss Turner was the recipient of a solid leather travelling bag, and eulogistic speeches were made by Messrs F. G. Dawson (Chairman) H.H. Blackham, F.L. Ifould, J.H. Groth and E.A. Kelly.

Country Correspondence - One Tree Hill, August 2, 1887

Another fire at One Tree Hill. The following are the particulars: A tramp (or swagman) called at Uley School, on Sunday evening July 31st, and enquired who owned an unoccupied house situated in a paddock opposite the school, saying he was going there to camp as it was too cold to camp out. In the early morning the house was seen to be on fire and nearly burnt to the ground.

There was some chaff in one of the rooms, and it is supposed this must have caught fire, whether accidentally or not it is hard to say. Country people appear to be entirely at the mercy of those prowling travellers. Can nothing be done to lesson the evil?

The Police have been communicated with, but up to the present time no efforts have been made to arrest the perpetrator of the mischief. The house belongs to Mr. John Dookett.

FOOTBALL AT ONE TREE HILL- August 1902

I for the third time this season on Saturday, One Tree Hill
I putting their strongest team into the field on this occasion,
whilst the Gully were minus four of their players.

| One Tree Hill scoring 1 goal and 8 behinds to F. T. Gully 1
| goal 3 behinds. The second half, however, saw the One Tree
| Hill boys playing a better game, and they eventually ran out
| winners by 13 points, the final score being One Tree Hill 3
| goals 14 behinds, Fern Tree Gully 2 goals 7 behinds.

The game throughout was fast, but the kicking of the One Tree Hill team was by no means excellent, and had the Gully players the same opportunities as those which OTH failed to accomplish, the issue would have been serious for OTH.

Mr. W. Breen, president of the One Tree Hill club, kindly invited the members of the Gully team to refreshments at half time after which both teams were photographed by Mr. Block.







Momentous Events Throughout Time

July 1st, 1862: President Abraham Lincoln "The best signed the first income tax bill, levving a 3% income tax on annual incomes of \$600-\$10,000 and a 5% tax on incomes over \$10,000. Also on this day, the Bureau of Internal Revenue was established by an Act of Congress.



July 2nd, 1917: A race riot occurred in St. Louis, Missouri, resulting in an estimated 75 African Americans killed and hundreds injured. To protest the violence against blacks, W.E. B. DuBois and James



Weldon Johnson later led a silent march down Fifth Avenue,

New York.

July 2nd, 1964: President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1964, prohibiting discrimination on the basis or race in public accommodations, publicly owned or operated facilities, employment and union membership and in voter registration. The Act followed for cutoff of Federal funds in places where discrimination remained.

July 3rd, 1976: The raid on Entebbe Airport in Uganda occurred as an Israeli commando unit rescued 103 hostages on a hijacked Air France airliner. The jet had been en route from Tel Aviv to Paris when it was hijacked by pro-Palestinian guerrillas. Three hostages, seven hijackers and twenty Ugandan soldiers were killed during the rescue.

July 4th, 1882: The 'Last Great Buffalo Hunt' began on Indian reservation lands near Hettinger, North Dakota as 2,000 Teton

Sioux Indians in full hunting regalia killed about 5,000 buffalo. By this time, most of the estimated 60-70 million buffalo in America had been killed by white hunters who usually took the



hides and left the meat to rot. By 1883, the last of the free-range buffalo were gone.


July 4th Birthday: Song writer Stephen Foster (1826-1884) was born in Lawrenceville, Pennsylvania. Among his nearly 200 songs were; Oh! Susanna, Camptown Races, Swanee River, Jeanie with the Light Brown Hair, and Beautiful Dreamer. He died in poverty at Bellevue Hospital in New York.

July 5th Birthday: Cecil J. Rhodes (1853-1902) was born at Bishop's Stortford, Hertfordshire, England. As a South African millionaire and politician, he was said to have once controlled 90% of the world's diamond production. His will established the Rhodes Scholarships at Oxford University for young scholars aged 18-25. Rhodesia was also named for him.

July 6th, 1885: Louis Pasteur gave the first successful anti-rables inoculation to a boy who had been bitten by an infected dog.

July 8th, 1776: The first public reading of the Declaration of Independence occurred as Colonel John Nixon read it to an assembled crowd in Philadelphia.

July 8th, 1943: During the Nazi occupation of France, Resistance leader Jean Moulin died following his arrest and subsequent torture by the Gestapo. He had been sent by the Allies into France in 1942 to unite the fledging Underground movement. In June of 1943, he was arrested in Lyon, tortured for eleven days but betrayed no one He died aboard a train while being transferred to a concentration camp.



July 10th, 1973: The Bahamas gained their independence after 250 years as a British Crown Colony.

July 10th, 1991: Boris Yeltsin took the oath of office, becoming the first popularly elected president in Russia's 1,000 year history.

July 12th, 1994: Germany's Constitutional Court ended the ban on sending German troops to fight outside the country. The ban had been in effect since the end of World War II. The ruling allowed German troops to join in United Nations and NATO peace-keeping missions. On July 14th, German military units marched in Bastille Day celebrations in Paris, the first appearance of German troops there since World War II.

July 12th Birthday: British pottery designer Josiah Wedgewood (1730-1795) was born in Burslem, Staffordshire, England.



July 14th, 1791: In England, the Birmingham riot occurred on the second anniversary of the fall of the Bastille. Mob rule lasted for three days, targeting controversial scientist and theologian Joseph Priestly's home and laboratory as well as the homes of his friends. Priestly, who had expressed support

for the American and French revolutions, fled to London with his family and later moved to America.

July 16th Birthday: Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen (1872-1928) was born near Oslo. He was the first to sail from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean via the Northwest Passage. He discovered the South Pole in 1911 and flew over the North Pole in a dirigible in 1926.



In June 1928, he flew from Norway to rescue survivors of an Italian Arctic expedition but his plane vanished.

July 17th, 1996: TWA Flight 800 departed Kennedy International Airport in New York bound for Paris but exploded in mid-air 12 minutes after take-off, apparently the result of a mechanical failure. The Boeing 747 jet crashed into the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Long Island about 8.45pm. All 212 passengers and 17 crew members on board were killed.

July 20th, 1969: A global audience watched on television as Apollo 11 Astronaut Neil Armstrong took his first step onto the moon. As he stepped on to the moon's surface he proclaimed, "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind',



inadvertently omitting an 'a' before 'man' and slightly changing the meaning.

July 24th, 1945: At the conclusion of the Potsdam Conference in

Germany, Winston Churchill, Harry Truman and China's representatives issued a demand for unconditional Japanese surrender. The Japanese, unaware the demand was backed up by an Atomic bomb, rejected the Potsdam Declaration on the 26th July.



July 25th, 1956: The Italian luxury liner Andrea Doria sank after colliding with the Swedish liner Stockholm on its way to New

York. Nearby ships came to the rescue, saving 1,634 people, including the captain and the crew, before the ship went down.

Goats - Production Requires Feed

If you intend to milk your goat, first make sure its a doe (female). Yes, this is an "oops" of mine. I had a doe produce two kids. Thought they were two females, but a week later discovered one was a buck. Unfortunately I had to tell people: I had sold both doe kids! It really is not that hard to tell: I was just too casual when I looked. Buck kids are usually born with both testes descended – pretty hard to miss.

All does will produce milk after kidding. The amount they produce will depend on several things.

- ◆ Type: Dairy goats have been bred to produce lots of milk. "Hairy" goats (Cashmere, Angora) will produce enough to raise a kid, maybe two if you are lucky. Same with Boer goats. Feral types barely raise one kid.
- Breeding: the genetics the animal carries. While there is not much difference between the different dairy breeds, there are good and bad lines within the breeds.
- Individual animal genetics: the luck of the draw if everything else is right. Sometimes even the best bred animals will not milk well. Occasionally it will skip a generation and their kids milk well.
- Feed: There is an old saying in the dairy industry.
 "Breeding puts it in, feeding gets it out". Without good feed and plenty of it, no animal will milk well. It has been calculated that well bred dairy goats are the most efficient animal in converting feed into milk. However, the cow takes less labour to get it out again (due to the number of animals to be handled to milk the same quantity of milk out). A big dairy doe in full production will happily churn through 3 biscuits of good hay plus up to 10 kg of hard feed. And reward you with 6 to 8 litres of milk per day.

These big producers rarely leave commercial breeders or dairies (due to demand), so your average producer may be closer to 2 biscuits of hay, 4 kg of feed and 4 litres of milk at her peak (summer) with a drop off over winter to 2 litres. If she kids in the spring, her production will go back to 4 to 5 litres before the next drop. But if she does not kid, she will still increase over the spring, possibly to 3 litres again. Mouldy hay will not produce milk. The doe will reject most of it, picking through for the decent bits and trampling the rest. You bemoan the waste, she gets upset at the low amount of feed, no one benefits.

- ♦ Comfort: a cold doe requires more feed to keep warm. So in winter make sure she has a warm, dry place to sleep. In summer, she needs shade and plenty of water (cool and clean). Feed spent keeping warm is feed wasted from the milk production cycle. One winter I rugged several of my best does, simple hessian sacks as rugs. Their production went up by ½ litre per goat with no other changes.
- Micro nutrients: here I go again, my old favourite Lick Blocks. Goats nutrient needs are different from other animals. They have a much higher need for copper, cobalt and potassium. Due to their milk production, dairy goats also need large quantities of calcium and phosphorus. Several different blocks put out where they can help themselves are consumed as they are needed. Keep the blocks clean (on a shelf and off the floor) and accept that if they are being used they are needed. Animals stop eating the blocks when they no longer need them and will return to them as their body reserves get low. An animal short of micro nutrients will be less efficient in their use of all feed so it is economical sense to use lick blocks.
- Water: a doe needs 3 to 4 litres of water for every litre of milk she produces, and that is above the amount needed for "dry" animals (bucks or non milking does).

USES FOR VINEGAR AROUND THE HOME : Continued

More handy hints for good old white vinegar around the home:

- 1: Let your dog shine. Spray your dog with one cup of white distilled vinegar mixed with 1 litre of water. The solution is a cheap alternative to expensive pet-care products, plus the vinegar will help repel pests like fleas and ticks.
- 2: Battle litter box odour. Cat litter can leave behind an unwelcome smell. Eliminate it by pouring a layer of vinegar into the empty litter box (About 1.5cm deep). Let it stand for 20 minutes, then rinse with cold water.
- 3: Unclog drains. For a natural, nontoxic way to clean clogged pipes, pour 1 cup of baking soda, followed by 1 cup of vinegar down the drain. Let the products bubble and foam, then flush the pipes with a pot of boiling water.
- 4: Steam away a mess in the microwave. Fill a small bowl with equal parts hot water and vinegar, place in microwave on high for 5 minutes. This will loosen the mess and make cleaning a breeze.
- 5: Repair DVD's. If you have a worn DVD that skips or freezes, wipe it down with white distilled vinegar applied to a soft cloth. Make sure the DVD is completely dry before reinserting into the player.
- 6: Loosen a rusted screw. Pour vinegar on to screw and it will easily unstick.

- 7: Remove chewing gum from fabric or hair by heating a small bowl of vinegar in the microwave. Pour the warm vinegar over the gum, saturating the area. The gum should dissolve.
- 8: Remove wax. If you get melted candle wax on your furniture or floors, gently wipe it away with a cloth soaked in a solution of equal parts white vinegar and water.
- 9: Erase crayon marks from walls or floor by dipping a toothbrush into white vinegar and gently scrubbing. The vinegar breaks down the wax, making for an inexpensive, nontoxic way to clean up after children.
- 10: Sticky stickers. Don't scratch away at the residue left by stickers or price tags. Instead apply vinegar to the gunk, let it stand for a few minutes, then wipe glue away.
- 11: Clean the dishwasher. Reduce soap build up and food reside by pouring a cup of vinegar into your empty dishwasher once a month and let it run a full cycle.
- 12: Restore showerhead pressure. If your showerhead gets clogged with mineral deposits, soak it for 15 minutes in a mixture of $\frac{1}{2}$ cup vinegar and a litre of water.
- 13: Clean your scissors. When your scissor blades get sticky, wipe them down with a cloth dipped in vinegar, unlike soap and water, vinegar will not rust the blades.



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

The One Tree Hill Scout Group is hosting "Magic Mike XXL" at the Gawler Cinemas on Wednesday 22nd July at 8.00pm.




