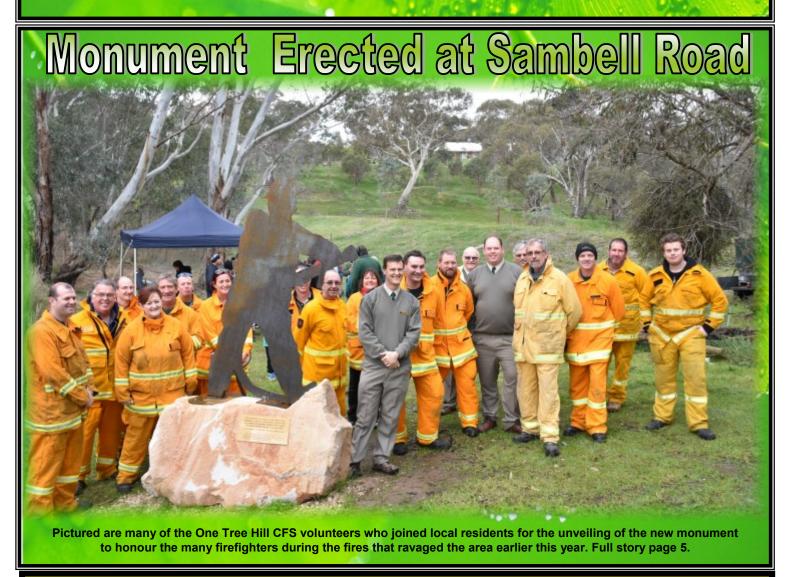

The vehicle accident involved a driver losing control and hitting a stobie pole at relatively low speed, fortunately with no serious injuries.

The members of the OTH Country Fire Service continue to be overwhelmed by the goodwill in the community, most recently attending the unveiling of a statue on the corner of Sambell and Bassnett Roads on 12th July. The statue is a silhouette of a firefighter and was erected by the residents of the local area in recognition of the efforts of firefighters; particularly those involved in saving the "Sambell Island" during the January fires. The brigade sincerely thank the residents for this generous gesture.

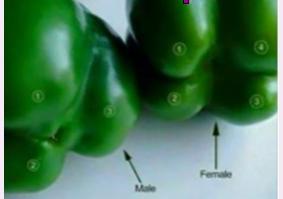

Homemade concrete stepping stones are a practical DIY project as well as an inexpensive, kid-friendly activity. To give each stone a personalised touch, have your child imprint their hand or foot, add decorations and write in the concrete before it sets. In addition to defining your garden walkway, you can use these stones to record and chart your child's growth, simply make a stone each year with an imprint of their hand and foot. Each one of a kind stone not only provides a permanent record of your child's hand or foot, it also makes a welcome gift for grandparents.

Things you'll Need

Tape Measure Large Mixing Bucket Trowel Water **Permanent Marker Utility Knife** Powdered cement colour (optional) **Dust Mask**

Non-stick cooking spray Rubber Gloves

Decorations - Flat sided marbles, mosaic tiles, leaf imprints, shells or beads Bag of pre-mixed quick setting concrete

Wooden stick Plastic garbage bag

Plastic planter saucer, aluminum pie pan, old cake pan or mould from a craft shop (optional)

Step 1: Thoroughly wash your mould, if it's an old plant saucer make sure all the dirt is removed.

Step 2: Wear a dust mask and put on rubber gloves for protection. To determine how much quick setting concrete mix you'll need for the stone, pour the dry concrete mix into your mould, then tip into a large mixing bucket, add water, - small amounts a little at a time. Mix the water and concrete together with a trowel, continue to add water until the mixture has the consistency of thick cookie dough. If you require colour, add powdered cement colour to the mixture.

3: Spray the mould with non-stick cooking spray before filling it with the mixed concrete. It will make it easier to remove the cured concrete from the mould. Pour half of the mixture into the mould, grasp the sides and jiggle for a few seconds to help release any air bubbles and settle the concrete. Pour the remaining concrete into the bowl, jiggle again and smooth the surface with your trowel.

Step 4: Let the concrete set for 30 - 60 minutes, or until it will hold an impression of your finger or thumb, then begin personalizing the stone with a hand or foot imprint. Spray the child's hand or foot with cooking spray before placing in concrete. Tell your child to spread their fingers and rest their hand flat on the concrete and push downward until the concrete is halfway up the sides of their fingers. Use a similar process to imprint their foot. Thoroughly wash skin after imprinting.

Step 5: Complete the project with decorations, such as flat sided marbles, beads, etc. Arrange the items and depress until they are almost flush with the surface of the concrete. If you want to write in the concrete, wait another 20-30 minutes, use a wooden stick to put child's name, age or date

Step 6: Place the mould in a dry, shaded area and cover with plastic garbage bag. Let it sit undisturbed for 24 hours. Grasp the sides of the mould, flip it over and carefully push on the bottom to pop the stone out of the mould. Before using it as a stepping stone, allow it to cure for another seven days.

Horse Care - Horse Care in Cold Weather

Shelter and feed are the key issues.

Shelter from wind, hail, rain and snow. Note it is the wind that is the most important. Wind chill factor is a key. Horses will find shelter from wind before worrying about shelter from rain. A damp horse may be uncomfortable but a damp one in wind will be cold.

Shelter may come in the form of a stable, a solid fence, trees or a rug. If a horse is young and has grown a thick winter coat, a wind break may be adequate. A three sided roofed shelter will give some protection in most weather. It does not have to be enclosed: the shelter described in May's issue (120 degrees around a centre pole) will give shelter from winds and that is the key.

If you want to rug be careful what you use and how. It should be waterproof. A rug which is wet through will make a horse cold. (Surprisingly, good quality woollen rugs can be wet and still leave the horse dry and warm. But canvas ones that leak will not work.) During the recent "Antarctic Blast" I used a woollen rug under the synthetic combo for my old pony. Previous horses would not have needed the extra wool. When putting rugs over other rugs, do not tangle the leg or belly straps. If you have to get them off in a hurry, or straps break and the rug falls off, they should come free without tangling. So do up all straps before putting the second layer on. Then ensure the straps are outside/below the previous rug's straps, not through them

Do not over rug, that is, don't use more rugs than is necessary. Better for the horse to be slightly cool than too hot. Ideally we should be changing rugs at least morning and night, removing for warmer days and replacing for cooler nights. Unless there is severe weather (hail, driving rain, wind) when we may need to leave more rugs on.

Feed is essential in cold weather. The digestion of hay creates internal heat ("heat through fermentation"). While you may think that more grain based feed will help, it is not as important as plenty of good, dry hay due to the fermentation effect. A general rule of thumb is to feed half as much again as you feed in early summer. My feeding regime for my old pony is one in summer, one and a half for most of winter and two on the coldest days. Cold, wet, slow growing grass is not an effective feed. Come spring and it suddenly gains in value, so be careful to drop the extra as soon as the days warm up.

Beware that over indulging in hay may trigger colic. This is because there is less water in the gut to keep things moving (impaction colic). Check the water intake of your horse. Give warmed water, add a dash of molasses to encourage drinking if necessary, if he is not drinking enough. Some people use salt to encourage drinking but this occasionally just makes things worse if the water is very cold. Check the consistency of the droppings. If the main lump does not break into smaller pieces when they hit the ground, get water into the horse somehow. If the droppings are very wet, and do not break open, the horse is possibly eating a weed that may cause other problems: Cape weed, Salvation Jane, Sour Sobs are the most likely culprits in our area.

Needless to say, a great day was had by all!

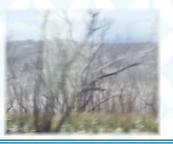

From The Past - Assorted Clippings From The Early Days at Oi

Saturday August 13, 1887

ONE TREE HILL, August 9.

Mr. Drakard of Gawler delivered his lecture on "The comic side of life" here on Monday evening, August 8. The discourse was I listened to with marked attention, and was frequently applauded. Several ladies and gentlemen from Gawler contributed songs and duets. The proceeds were devoted to the circuit fund.

Friday August 16, 1893

Country Correspondence ONE TREE HILL, August 12.

The annual festival in connection with our local band of hope took place on Wednesday the 7th inst. In the afternoon a cricket match between the local team and one of the all-comers, resulted in favour of the home team. At 5 p.m., a large number of people assembled in the church, to do justice to an ample tea, catered for by Mrs. H. Dean, of Gawler, who seems always at her I ONE TREE HILL, March 28. best when catering for One Tree Hill. An entertainment was given in the evening to a crowded audience, who seemed to I thoroughly enjoy the music, etc. Mr. Hambridge sang, Jude's "Better Land" and Sullivan's "Lost Chord", with violin obbligato by Miss Elsie Riggs; Mr. Doley gave "Land Ahead" and "Thee you'll remember me;" the Misses Riggs gave "Music and her sister song" and Miss Riggs "Whisper and I shall hear;" Mr. F. W. Thomas, "The Mighty Deep" and "The River of Years;" Mr. W. Rhodes. "She wore a wreath of roses" and "The Holy City." A pleasant break in the programme were two readings given by the Rev. V. Roberts. At the close of the meeting a very hearty vote of thanks was given to the visitors who came from Adelaide and Gawler, and to all who had helped to make our festival a

Friday August 21, 1896

ONE TREE HILL CLUB, August 18.

The annual meeting of the local cricket club was held at One Tree Hill on Friday evening, August 14th. The meeting was not largely attended and one or two innovations were duly sanctioned. Mr. F. L. Ifould occupied the chair. The secretary (Mr. Geo. Bowman) in presenting the yearly report congratulated the club upon the distinction it had achieved in winning the premiership of the Gawler Association for the first time after a creditable record as "runner-up." The treasurer's (Mr. Rudolph Fiebeg) financial statement which showed a credit balance of £5 4s. 2d elicited laudatory comment, and was unanimously adopted. The officers for the ensuing season were elected as follows: - President, Mr. E.L. Ifould; vice-presidents, Messrs F. Barritt, R. Patterson, Tl. Williams, F and A. Thomas, W. Kelly, A. Kelly, J.S. Harvey, J. H. Elliker, and R. Loftes; captain, Mr. Hermann Bischof; vice-captain, Mr. F. L. Ifould, secretary, Mr. Geo Bowman: treasurer, Mr. R. Fiebig; delegates to the Association, Messrs G. Bowman, Bischof, and Ifould; match committee, Messrs G. Bowman, Ifould, and Loftes. The retiring officers were heartily thanked for their services, and Messrs Bowman and Fiebeg suitably replied. A trophy to be awarded by Mr. H. Bischof to the member of the club who is pronounced by his compeers the most deserving fieldsman was voted to Mr. Geo Bowman after a tie with Messrs F. Ifould. The last business the meeting had to dispose of was the historic dinner in connection with the club. The annual fete has had peculiar local interest, and cricket alone was erat while enshrined by our forbears at the foot of the old gum tree contiguous to the cricket ground with an enthusiasm in keeping with the popularity and importance of the great national pastime. Subsequently the venue of demonstration has been placed to suit the convenience of the locality. It was decided that the festival this year should take place on | Friday next before full moon in October, when no doubt the traditions of the Munno Para East cricket club will be revived.

Saturday 10 October, 1903

AGRICULTURAL BUREAUS

One Tree Hill, August 6. Present Messrs. Bowman (chair), Hogarth, Ifould, Kelly Smith, and Clucas (honorable secretary), and four visitors. Various matters in connection with dairying were discussed. For bulls disposed to get through the fences a short hobble had been found effective, and at the same time it saved trouble in managing the herd. The danger of giving separator milk too freely to calves was referred to by a member who had lost a calf recently from no other reason that he could suggest. Young lucerne should be fed gradually until the cows were used to it. Carbonate of soda was found an effective drench in cases of bloating. The Cape tulip was described by some of the members, but as far as known it did not exist in the district.

Friday March 30, 1917

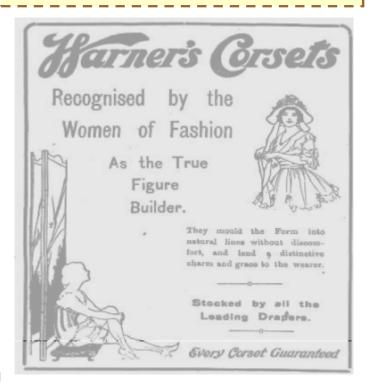
At a meeting held in August 1916, it was decided to form a branch of the Red Cross Society at One Tree Hill, the officers elected were: Mrs. H.H. Blackham (President), Mrs. R. Fiebig (hon. treasurer), Mrs. F.L. Ifould (hon. Secretary). Meetings have been held monthly, and although a small circle they have been able to send a substantial parcel of comforts for the soldiers to the Red Cross depot each month. Mrs. H.H. Blackham gave a good start by presenting a parcel of material (two rolls of flannelette, cotton, tape, etc.) Mrs. Frank Barritt, of Yattalunga, also gave rolls of flannelette and flannel. Other gifts of socks, mittens, scarves etc., have been received from Mr. J. S. Harvey, jur,. Miss D. Stuart, Mrs. Skewes, and Misses D. and E. McBride. Mrs. Frank Bowman presented a sheep-skin to be disposed of in any way the members decided upon.

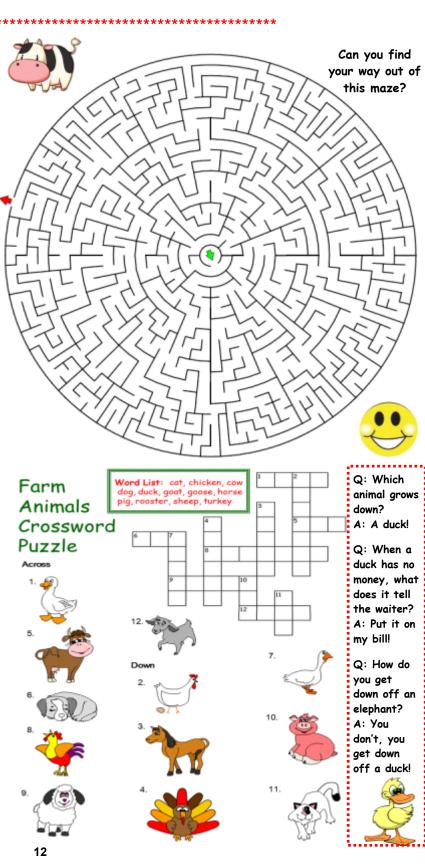
How about writing a story of sending in some jokes to share with other young readers. Sometimes it's hard to know what you like and I sure hope that I am not repeating myself with some of the jokes.

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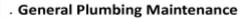
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Momentous Events Throughout Time

AUGUST

August 2nd, 1939: Albert Einstein wrote a letter to President Franklin D. Roosevelt concerning the possibility of atomic weapons. "A single bomb of this type carried by boat and exploded in a port, might very well destroy the whole port together with some of the surrounding territory." Six years later, on August 6, 1945, the first Atomic Bomb,

developed by the U.S., was dropped on the Japanese port of Hiroshima.

August 3rd, 1492: Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain, with three ships, Nina, Pinta and Santa Maria. Seeking a westerly route to the

Far East, he instead landed on October 12th in the Bahamas, thinking it was an outlying Japanese island.

August 4th Birthday: Jazz trumpet player Louis Armstrong (1901-1971) was born in New Orleans, Louisiana. Known as "Satchmo" he appeared in many films and is best known for his renditions of It's a Wonderful World and Hello Dolly.

August 4th Birthday: Barack Obama the 44th U.S. President was born in Honolulu, Hawaii, on August 4, 1961. His father was from Kenya. Upon completing his college education, young Obama moved to Chicago, becoming active in community affairs. He then attended Harvard Law School, becoming the first African-American president of the Harvard Law Review in 1990. He returned to Chicago, worked in a law firm, then entered politics. Elected to the Illinois State Senate in 1996, he went on to become a U.S. Senator in 2004. Four years later, he successfully challenged former First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton for the Democratic presidential nomination and went on to defeat Republican John McCain in the general election on November 4th, 2008, thus becoming the first President of African-American origin.

August 5th, 1962: Film star Marilyn Monroe died at age 36 on August 5th from an overdose of sleeping pills. She made 29 films during her career and came to symbolize Hollywood glamour.

August 6th Birthday: British poet, Alfred Lord Tennyson (1809-1892) was born in Somersby, Lincolnshire, England. He was appointed Poet Laureate in succession to William Wordsworth. Memorable poems by Tennyson include Ode of the Death of the Duke of Wellington and The Charge of the Light Brigade.

August 6th Birthday: Penicillin discoverer Alexander Fleming (1881-1955) was born in Lochfield, Scotland. By accident, he found that mould from soil killed deadly bacteria without injuring human tissue. He received the Nobel Prize in 1954.

August 8th, 1945: Soviet Russia declared war on Japan and sent troops into Japanese-held Manchuria.

August 8th Birthday: African American explorer Matthew Henson (1866-1955) was born in Charles County, Maryland. He accompanied Robert E. Peary on several Arctic expeditions and reached the North Pole on April 6, 1909.

August 13th, 1961: The Berlin Wall came into existence after the East German government closed the border between east and west sectors of Berlin with barbed wire to discourage emigration to the West. The barbed wire was replaced by a 12 foot-high concrete wall eventually extending 103 miles (166km) around the perimeter of West Berlin. The wall included electrified fences, fortifications, and guard posts. It became a notorious symbol of the Cold War. Presidents Kennedy and Reagan made notable appearances at the wall accompanied by speeches denouncing Communism. It was eventually torn down in 1990.

August 13th Birthday: Annie Oakley (1860-1926) was born in Darke County, Ohio. Famous for her shooting ability, she joined Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show in 1885 and was one of the star attractions for 17 years.

August 14, 1945: V-J Day, commemorating President Truman's announcement that Japan had surrendered to the

August 15th, 1969: Woodstock began in a field near Yasgur's Farm at Bethel, New York. The three-day concert featured 24 rock bands and drew a crowd of more than 300,000 young people. The event came to symbolize the counter-culture movement of the 1960s.

August 24th, 79 AD: Vesuvius, an active volcano in southern Italy, erupted and destroyed cities of Pompeii, Stabiae, and Herculaneum.

August 26th, 1883: One of the most catastrophic volcano eruptions in recorded history occurred on the Indonesian island of Krakatoa. Explosions were heard 2,000 miles away. Tidal waves 120ft high killed 36,000 persons on nearby islands, while five cubic miles of earth were blasted in the air up to a height of 50 miles.

August 27th Birthday: Mother Teresa (1910-1997) was born (as Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu) in Skopje, Yugoslavia. She founded a religious order of nuns in Calcutta, India, called the Missionaries of Charity and spent her life working to help the poor and sick of India.

August 29th, 1792: In one of the worst maritime disasters, 900 men drowned on the British battleship Royal George. As the ship was being repaired, a gust of wind allowed water to flood into open gun ports. The ship sank within minutes

August 30th Birthday: Frankenstein author Mary Shelley (1797-1851) was born in London.

August 31st, 1997: Princess Diana died at age 36 from massive internal injuries suffered in a high-speed car crash, reportedly after being pursued by photographers. The crash occurred shortly after midnight in Paris inside a tunnel along the Seine River at the Pont de 1'Alma Bridge, less than a half mile north of the Eiffel Tower. Also killed in the crash were Diana's companion, Dodi Fayed, 42, and chauffeur

Henri Paul. A fourth person in the car, bodyguard Trevor Rees-Jones, was seriously injured.

Uses For Lemons Around The Home

Now that lemons are in plentiful supply it may be the ideal time to start your spring cleaning.

You'll be surprised just how handy lemons are for all purpose cleaning around your home.

- 1: You can bring your tapware and shower heads back to their glistening best with a simple rub.
- 2: Sanitising your cutting boards after use by rubbing down with a lemon. Rinse thoroughly and air dry.
- 3: Soap scum can be a problem but if you cut a lemon in half and rub fruit side of the lemon over soap scum it should come off quite easily. Repeat if there is a build up and rinse.
- 4: Lemon is a natural bleach, squeeze the juice of a lemon (about ½ cup) and add to 2 litres of hot water. Add whites and let soak for 1-2 hours. Wash clothes as usual.
- 5: To make up an all purpose cleanser add together ½ cup white vinegar, juice of 1 lemon, 2 cups water. Mix to combine and pour into a spray bottle. Spray, wipe, clean.
- 6: Grout cleaner, combine 2 teaspoons cream of tartar and lemon juice. Make to a thin paste, apply to grout and scrub with a small cleaning brush. Rinse off.
- 7: Room freshener: Mix together the following: 4 cups water, peel from one lemon, 3 cinnamon sticks, whole nutmeg, 10 whole cloves, dash of vanilla extract. Combine all ingredients in saucepan and let simmer on low for 1-2 hours. Pour into a spray bottle. You can vary some of the ingredients by adding rosemary and lavender combined with lemon, powdered spices are fine to use if you don't have whole spices.

- 8: Window cleaner: Mix together 4 cups water, ½ cup white vinegar, ¼ cup lemon juice. Mix to combine, spray on windows or mirrors and wipe clean with a soft cloth.
- 9: Sink cleaner: Required, lemon juice and salt. Mix the two ingredients together into a paste like consistency. Apply to metal, scrub and rinse clean.
- 10: Clean your microwave: Put a bowl of water and the juice of a lemon along with the two halves of lemon and run the microwave until the water boils (3 minutes approx.) Leave the bowl in the microwave for about 15 minutes. After a wipe down it should look like new and smell divine.
- 11: Furniture polish: Mix ¼ cup of lemon juice, ½ cup oil, (almond, coconut or olive oil), and lemon peels (natural essential oils). Mix until well combined and keep in an air tight container for up to one week.
- 12: Garbage bin deodoriser: These are ideal if you have a stinky bin. Slice up lemon and also a lime if you have some, place at the bottom of cup and cover with water and freeze. When frozen place into a freezer bag. Next time your bin is a bit on the nose use one to eliminate the odour.



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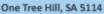
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Goats Need Shelter

Did you know you can be charged with animal cruelty if you do not provide adequate shelter for a goat?

The Australian Code of Practice on keeping goats rules that shelter must always be provided for goats. This means that the RSPCA can prosecute if it is deemed that the goat does

not have adequate shelter.

Always have some shelter for your goat. It might only be a shed with two sides and a roof. The sides should be set so that they stop the worst wind, usually the west and south in South Australia. It is preferable to have a closed shed large enough for her to lay full length on her side, with room for her companion there as well. If you build a full shed, with 4 sides, use a narrow doorway. They seem to prefer to be in a snug hole. Trees can be adequate shelter in mild weather if there are quite a few. Shelter needs to protect a goat from wind, rain, hail, and sun. A little rain never hurt any goat, but if she gets chilled as a result, then you may get a sick goat. Be aware of the chill factor of the

A style of shelter that I have seen work very well is the half rain water tank (corrugated iron, which is getting rare). Cut so it is a half cylinder shape, stood on the cut edges and fastened down, it gives good shelter for one or two goats. Make sure you do fasten it down so it does not blow away.

Another that works is the triangular coop style. As long as the goat can stand up in it with her head at a comfortable level, (a bit above wither height) it is high enough. These can be made so they are easy to move if you are tethering your goat. Be aware that goats (kids in particular) will jump onto the roof if they can. This may give them the height they need to clear the neighbouring fence. Worse, they may fall through the roof and cut themselves. Make sure the roof is high enough that they can't jump on it or steep enough that they slide off rather than fall through.

Goats with thick fleeces do not need as much protection as those with fine coats. We used to find that our Saanens would run for shelter as soon as there was the slightest trace of rain, well before we ran.

Every shed should have a little bedding in it. As goats tend to waste some of their hay, this can be left to become their bedding. If it is cleaned out early in summer it becomes a valuable mulch and fertiliser for the garden, and will accumulate over summer, ready for her to have a warm bed in winter.

For ease of removing accumulated bedding, have the shed either moveable or high enough that a human can stand and work inside it.

INGREDIENTS:

9 Lasagna Noodles
2 cans of Pasta Sauce with beef
250grams Cottage Cheese
1 Egg
3/4 Cup Parmesan Cheese

3 Cups Mozzarella Cheese grated.

METHOD:

In a square oven proof dish spoon in a little of the pasta sauce. Place 3 layers of lasagna noodles on the sauce. Mix cottage cheese, egg and parmesan cheese in a bowl. Spread about a third of this mixture over the noodles, followed by about a third of the sauce. Sprinkle with 1 cup grated mozzarella cheese. Now, add 3 more layers of noodles, a third more cottage cheese mixture and a third more sauce. Add 1 cup more of mozzarella cheese. One more time, do the layers as before.

Easy Lasagna

Bake in a oven on 180 deg. for about one hour. Top should be light brown and bubbly.

Serve with a salad and crusty bread rolls or on its own. Delicious for the whole family. Serves 4–6





How to Clean Your Oven Without Using Chemicals

What you need for non-toxic oven cleaning: Spray Bottle with a mixture of 1 third vinegar and 2 thirds water, Coarse Salt and Baking Soda

Remove the oven racks (you can clean these the same way). Spray the whole of the oven including the inside door with the vinegar/water solution. Get it very wet all over. Sprinkle baking soda all over the oven and in particular anywhere there is a build up of food particles. Sprinkle a thick layer of coarse salt over the baking soda. Spray again with the vinegar/water solution. You'll hear a bubbling sound from the reaction of the vinegar and baking soda. Leave it to sit overnight. With the coarse side of a sponge scrub the oven. You'll see how easily everything comes off.

Spray again with vinegar/water to help remove everything. Wipe with old towels or paper towels. That's it, you should have a nice shiny oven. It doesn't take long and it is much better than breathing in chemical cleaners.









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Do's & Don't of Heartburn

DO'S

DO find out the root cause of your heartburn, many things stress, food allergies, structural problems with your esophageal sphincter - can cause or exacerbate the problem.

DO consider raising the head of your bed. Elevating your head keeps the contents of the stomach from sliding up against the LES (the sphincter that separates the esophagus from the stomach) while you sleep. Put a 4-by-4 inch piece of wood under the top two legs of your bed. A foam wedge under the mattress may also work.

DO chew thoroughly. Chewing aids digestion by breaking down food and mixing it with digestive enzymes and probiotics in the mouth.

DO consider natural chewing gum after each meal. In two recent randomised controlled studies, people prone to heartburn who chewed a piece or tow of gum after a heartburn provoking meal sidestepped the telltale symptoms. Researchers think it's because the gum stimulated saliva production, which is alkaline. The saliva goes down the esophagus and helps protect the food tube and neutralise some of the acid in the stomach. (Avoid peppermint –flavoured gum which can actually increase the odds of reflux.)

DO chew a tablet or two of DGL (deglycyrrhizinated licorice) 15 minutes before a meal. It is the advice of a well known Dr. that licorice contains substances that decrease swelling) a swollen sphincter won't close correctly) and increases the body's ability to heal ulcers and inflammation.

DO eat smaller meals. The greater the volume of your meal, the higher the odds it will give you heartburn simply because of the mechanical pressure the weight of the food puts on the LES.

DO continued:

Do encourage the proliferation of dietary enzymes and good bacteria by eating fermented foods rich in protein, such as yoghurt, raw cheeses, sauerkraut etc.

DO take a cue from ancient culinary traditions and build a digestive boost into the meal. Nibble of shavings of pickled ginger, spoon up some tangy Indian chutney. Somewhere along the way Western cuisine lost those built in digestive aids, so try bringing them back into your diet.

DON'T

DON'T wear your skinny jeans too tight. Constrictive clothing can put pressure on the abdomen. The squeeze can press the stomach's contents up against the sphincter at the base of the esophagus, which can lead to heartburn.

DON'T eat within two hours before vigorous exercise. Too much exercise (like jumping rope or fast paced jogging) can induce acid reflux, even in people who usually don't suffer from the condition. If you are at the gym on a full stomach, choose the cycling class over the hip-hop-yoga.

DON'T lie down within two to three hours of eating. Gravity is your friend. Give the stomach plenty of time to empty its contents before you get horizontal.

DON'T eat foods that may irritate the inflamed lining of the esophagus, such as citrus juice, tomato juice and spicy foods.

DON'T suck on peppermints to combat the sour taste in your mouth. Peppermint can relax the esophageal sphincter muscle, which could exacerbate your problem.

Lemon Delicious Pudding

This will become a family favourite especially at this time of the year when lemons are plentiful.

INGREDIENTS:

Melted butter to grease
4 Eggs separated
1 Tablespoon Finely grated lemon peel
160ml reduced fat milk
150 g (1 cup) Self Raising Flour
215g (1 cup) Castor Sugar
Pure Icing Sugar for Dusting
Extra thick cream (optional)

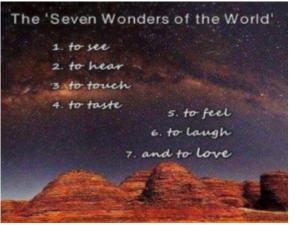


METHOD: Preheat oven to 180°C. Brush six 250ml (1 cup) capacity ovenproof dishes with melted butter.

Whisk the egg yolks, lemon rind, lemon juice, milk, flour and two thirds of a cup of castor sugar in a bowl until smooth and combined. Use an electric beater to beat the egg whites in a clean, dry bowl until soft peaks form. Beat in the remaining caster sugar until egg white is thick and glossy.

Fold one quarter of egg white mixture into lemon mixture.
Fold in remaining egg white mixture. Divide among the pregreased dishes. Place in a roasting pan. Add enough boiling water to the pan to come halfway up the sides of the dishes.
Bake for 35 minutes or until golden. Dust with icing sugar and serve with cream, if desired. (Also lovely served with custard).

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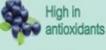
