Twice a year, Humbug Scrub Wildlife Sanctuary Inc. holds a major fund raising day: the public holiday Mondays of Easter and October. For the last 3 events we have had poor weather (wind, rain or heat) and therefore poor turnout. Even so, those who came say they enjoyed their day out.

ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT OCTOBER 2015



Incident Report

A reasonably busy month with 12 incidents including several call outs for "bon fires". Remember if you are burning off there are regulations that must be met and the onus is on you to be aware of and meet the requirements.

The most significant event saw the Tea Tree Gully Road closed for several hours as a result of a serious accident involving a station wagon into a tree early in the month. The sole occupant was fortunate that the driver of one of the cars following was doctor from the RAH who was able to administer first aid until the SA Ambulance arrived. With the car on its side the process of extracting the patient from the car took more than two hours and involved crews from the Elizabeth and Adelaide MPS, OTH and Tea Tree Gully CFS as well as paramedics and a helicopter crew from the SA Ambulance.

As mentioned last month, the local CFS Group hosted the Region 2 Field Day on Sunday 18th of October. The day was a success with around 30 trucks from all around the Mid North and Yorke Peninsular participating. One Tree Hill CFS, operating as Para Base, was the command centre and the Incident Management Team were given a variety of challenges, both real and simulated. Local residents around the exercises and visiting dignitaries were treated to some spectacular sights with the "mad rabbit" and "gas prop" exercises proving popular.

The station will be open with a number of static displays as well as crews on hand who will be able to provide you with information. Come up and have a chat or look over our equipment including the new 34 appliance that was commissioned earlier this year.

With summer just around the corner your preparations should be well under way, there is a lot of dry grass and crops around already, so please be careful if you are using slashers or ride on mowers.

While making your preparations, it is good to remember to keep your kids involved and informed.

Do they know what to do if the house is threatened by fire or full of smoke?

Do they know two safe escape routes out of your house or off your property in case of fire?

At the time of publication the Fire Danger season for the Mount Lofty Ranges is 17th November to 1st April 2016.

Councillor's Report October 2015

Preliminary site works to remove trees and relocate services in preparation for the installation of the Roundabout at the Kersbrook Road and Gawler Scenic Route Intersection will commence November 2015. Major Road works will commence in January 2016 and be completed by June 2016. Should you require further information please email DPTI at dpti.communityrelations@sa.gov.au or telephone 1300 794 880. The proposed improvements include the installation of the roundabout, new road lighting, advance signage on all approaches with a reduced speed to 80km/h when approaching the roundabout. Lets hope road users will be safer and appreciate the efforts made over a long period of time to reach this milestone by driving safely and staying alive.

At the CDAP meeting, Council approved subject to DAC concurrence an 832 allotment subdivision at McDonald Park to be completed in 20 stages with stages 1- 4 ready to go once concurrence has been granted.

HUMBUG SCRUB WILD LIFE SANCTUARY

A Day in the Sanctuary continued:

The October event started for the organisers in July, with letters to potential sponsors. By the morning of October 5th, gazebos were up, food organised, stalls manned and the wait for visitors begins.

Volunteers didn't have long to wait as the first visitors arrived before official "gates open" time. It seems many people overestimate how long it takes to drive to the sanctuary. Three kilometers past the main gates of Para Wirra Park and ten kilometers from One Tree Hill, it is a pleasant drive in the country. But you don't need a picnic lunch because on Fund Raising days there is a barbecue and hot potato lunch available.

On arriving inside the gates, drivers are guided to where to park by volunteers. Leaving their car, they pass the table where donations are asked for entry. Here, the children can also get entry forms for games, and raffle tickets are sold. Two raffles were run, with one being a bag of goodies donated by She's Apples of Gawler, Joe Federico (OTH) and Laucke stock feeds. The second raffle was for a \$100 meat pack, kindly provided by Kamcheyenne Limousin of OTH.

A short walk past a face painter and craft stalls brings the visitor to Jan's Pottery, where she is selling, besides her pottery, bags of pellets for hand feeding the animals. Jan was kept busy all day filling more bags with pellets, until visitors reported the animals were full. At that point, no more feed was sold.

By the time visitors have fed emus and swamp wallabies, walked into an aviary with a variety of birds, inspected other rehomed birds, including magpies, rosellas, cockatoos, galahs, corellas, a kestrel and maybe seen potoroos and possums (depending on whether they are taking their daytime nap), they are ready for lunch. Back to "Lingalonga" picnic shelter where a crew have been busy cooking sausages (thanks again Kamcheyenne Limousin), steaks, and stuffed baked potatoes. Tea and coffee are available, or they can get cold drinks at the cake stall, just across the walkway.

At some point, most visitors caught up with Coralie, Dianne and helpers who brought hand raised joey kangaroos (still in pouches) to be seen and gently petted. Visitors also went across the creek to see Annabelle the koala (some got to pat her but she got sick of visitors after a time). A short walk to Duck Lake showed wild kangaroos, at least two varieties of ducks and possibly lbis. A longer walk may have taken some visitors to Chowilla Lake, built for the gold mining community before 1900 and still used by many wild birds and animals.

A browse through stalls selling everything from bric-a-brac through cakes to tattoo stickers and T-Shirts and, because the day was so hot (37° on the verandah) it is time to head home. But you are walking past the ice cream van so may as well get dessert for the trip home.

If this tempts you as an interesting day out, the next Fund Raising Day will be Easter Monday, March 28th, 2016. Or go along any day except Christmas for a quieter day. No stalls or food but plenty of animals eager to see you.

The sanctuary is always grateful for any volunteering.

There are many tasks the trustees would like to implement but lack of funds and labour make it difficult.

The sanctuary was one of the first in the world, and it is right on your doorstep.



Bacon, Egg & Cheese Wreath

Ingredients: 4 Slices bacon cut in half crosswise

2 Sheets of puff pastry

5 Large eggs

1 Cup shredded Mozzarella cheese (you can also use cheddar)

Salt and Pepper, if desired

Caraway Seeds or Sesame Seeds

1 Tablespoon Olive Oil

Method: Heat oven to 190°. Line a tray with baking paper. In a large pan cook bacon over medium heat for about 4 minutes or until cooked but not crisp. Scramble your eggs in a skillet with salt and pepper to taste. Cut the puff pastry into 8 triangles about the same size. Arrange the triangles on the baking tray to form a star (as pictured). Place cooked bacon on each of the triangles. Sprinkle ½ cup of cheese onto the widest part of the dough. Carefully spoon eggs over cheese and follow with the remaining cheese. Pull points of triangles over eggs and cheese, tuck under dough to form a ring. Carefully brush dough with 1 tablespoon Olive Oil. Sprinkle on Caraway seeds or Sesame seeds. Place in oven and bake for


17-20 minutes or until golden brown. Cool for 2 minutes. Slice in between each piece to make 8 individual pieces.

This makes a yummy snack for the kids or unexpected guests.









Horse Care - Lunging or Something Else

Many times I have been to events and heard people say "I will just lunge him for a few minutes first". But do they actually lunge?

I divide these exercises into three types, each with a specific purpose.

"Running circles" is often used to "get the kinks out" or to allow the horse to burn off some energy before being saddled and mounted. This is a very useful exercise if the horse is excited when out. If a horse has been stabled or in a small yard overnight, then floated to an event, he is probably feeling like having a good run. He then gets presented with a strange environment and becomes a little difficult to manage. By allowing him to run, he can burn off some energy, have a look around and generally get himself under control. He may pig root (buck) and leap around. But he should not be allowed to run too crazy, or dash into the circle and back out again. He should not run the handler over! If he goes too crazy there is a very good chance he will injure himself, pulling a muscle, stepping on his own legs or even slipping over. Ask for a walk to warm up, then a trot. He will probably want to canter and pig root. Allow this without encouraging it. Steady him whenever you feel he is getting a bit too much. Bring him back to a halt, turn him and send him off in the other direction. Don't allow this to become a pulling match and remember that too much circling will injure tendons. Get the kinks out and stop. We really don't care how he carries himself, just that he calms down.

The handler usually tries to stand more or less in the centre, but may move about as they try to control the horse. They may or may not carry a whip.

This is what we tend to see: a horse running around in circles on the end of a lunge line, sometimes called a lunge rein. He is usually in a halter or a bridle with the reins tied up. This is a useful exercise if we know what we are doing and why we are doing it. We are allowing the horse to burn off energy without risking ourselves in the saddle. We are allowing the horse to take a long look at his surrounds without having to concentrate on obeying us as well.

Lunging is the organised use of the circle as an exercise and conditioning tool. It should be done using a cavesson halter (not a regular halter or a cavesson noseband on a bridle) with a lunge rein. When being lunged the horse is expected to work to the frame you designate. That is, he should work at the pace, speed and rhythm you ask for, carrying himself in the manner you expect. This possibly includes being Forward (capital F) in self carriage. It will include correct bend on the circle. It is for increasing balance, fitness and to assist in training. It is very useful if there is no-one able to ride him, to keep him fit or if he has an injury which may prevent the use of a saddle. It is not something that should be undertaken without the handler being trained in the method.

The handler should try to stay within a circle of about one metre diameter in the centre of the circle made by the horse. They should always carry and use a lunge whip, for pointing out direction and speed, never hitting the horse.

As long as the horse changes direction, pace and speed fairly frequently, and the horse has been conditioned to working on the lunge (over several months) we can lunge for about an hour.

Circling is the third style, and is that which many of the "natural horsemanship" trainers use. It is usually done on a long rope (4 to 7 metres long, but not the 10 metres of a lunge rein). In the early days of training, circle work is used to train. If used at a competition, it is used to check the horse is actually listening to you, and obedient. You are asking for a particular direction and pace but rarely asking for speed, length of stride, cadence, bend or carriage. In general, not more that 2 circles are done in one direction without a change. (Lunging may be four or five circles). The horse that resists may be asked for more work, repeated until he becomes soft and responsive, but we are looking for a change of attitude, not way of going. Note: this should not be done on a very short rope, such as the 1.8 to 2.1 metre ones we often see being used to lead horses.

The handler may move about freely, sometimes travelling. That is they actually ask the horse to move their circle to a different place, by walking along and allowing the horse slack in the rope (the horse picks up the slack and in doing so, moves in the direction you walk). They rarely carry a whip, preferring to use the end of the rope when necessary.

Next time you say you are going to lunge your horse, please think about exactly what outcome you are expecting as all three are useful.

From The Past - Assorted Clippings From The Early Days

Saturday 27th November, 1926

BUSH FIRES. One Tree Hill, November 20.
Once again One Tree Hill and the district of Munno Para East is faced with the menace of bush fires, caused by weekend shooters and picnic parties. On Saturday afternoon shooting was heard in the vicinity of the Mr. J. L. Blackham's home, and shortly afterwards a ball of smoke indicated the start of a fire. Fortunately some motor cyclists from the recreation ground were soon on the scene and stopped the fire when it had burnt about five acres of feed.

Country Correspondence Friday 23rd November, 1888

ONE TREE HILL, November 21. On Tuesday, November 20, our usual Band of Hope meeting was held. The chapel was full and the audience as usual kept waiting for a half hour in their seats, the meeting commencing at 8.30pm. Something like punctuality would be a gain to scores of the audience to whom time is of some value. The programme was not as good as ordinarily, the chief items being songs by Misses Hosking, Higgins and Marsh, a recitation by Miss Marsh (the younger), and a special to the ladies on "Love Letters" by our old friend Mr. Marsh, who gave some timely advice to ladies seeking a husband. We have started a tennis club, but have not yet made much proficiency in the art, but are, of course, open to play the world, even if we don't win a game. To get practice is not so easy as with your city folks. Hay cutting is, of course general and I don't hear much complaint, and a few crops left for wheat appear in fair condition.

DISTRICT COUNCILS Friday 7th November, 1919

ONE TREE HILL, November 3. Present - Crs. Geo Bowman (Chairman), P.D. Taylor, E.A. Thomas, and W. Willison. Apology from Cr. A.H. Riggs. The Chairman reported having conveyed the Illuminated Address to their late Chairman (Mr. John Hogarth), at Smithfield, and the recipient had asked him to thank the Council and residents for the memorial. The Clerk reported that the District had gained the quota in the Peace Loan. One Tree Hill Institute applied to have a tennis court and tree holes sunk by returned soldiers. Resolved that the tree holes be sunk, but the other request deferred. The Overseer was instructed to employ returned soldiers to do various works under the Repatriation Scheme. Bee licenses were granted to Messrs F. Bowman and H.E. Leaney. The Clerk was instructed to take action against persons keeping bees without a licence. Resolved that the Overseer clear back roads of timber and that same be offered for sale by tender. Tenders to be called for main road metal. Overseer to have holes in road near Beach's filled in. Tree projecting on the road at the Little Para to be removed. Bank Balances: District, debit, £359; Main Roads, credit, £91. Payments – District, £74: Repatriation Fund, £76: Main Roads,

AGRICULTURAL BUREAUS Saturday 10th October, 1903

ONE TREE HILL August 6 - Present Messrs. Bowman (Chair), Hogarth, Ifould, Kelly, Smith, and Clucas (Hon Secretary), and four visitors. Various matters in connection with dairying were discussed. For bulls disposed to get through the fences a short hobble had been found effective, and at the same time it saved trouble in managing a herd. The danger of giving separator milk too freely to calves was referred to by a member who had lost a calf recently from no other reason that he could suggest. Young lucerne should be fed gradually until the cows were used to it, otherwise cases of bloat or hoven would occur. Carbonate of soda was found an effective drench in cases of bloat. The Cape Tulip was described by some of the members, but as far as known it did not exist in the district.

One Tree Hill FFCF Friday 27th November, 1942

Since the local unit was formed more than 3 years ago it has been the custom to hold a Paddy's market in November. This year owing to war restrictions it was decided to arrange something less elaborate and as a result of the decision a Jumble Day was arranged for November 21st in the afternoon. The hall was gay with bunting including a panel with hammer and sickle as a compliment to our ally, Russia. Mrs. Harvey Kelly in a happy speech declared the Jumble Fair open and afterwards gave two vocal solos. Brisk trading was done at the various stalls and afternoon tea, cool drinks and ice cream were all well patronised. Members are grateful at the success of the function, which returned the sum of £10 15/0. Mrs. F.L. Ifould is President, Mrs. H.J. Hender, Secretary and Treasurer. Occasion was taken to make presentation from the district to Privates Max Horgan and John Kaiser.

ONE TREE HILL, November 14 1881

On Friday, November 11, a concert was given in the Precolumb School, One Tree Hill in aid of the bazaar fund for the Wesleyan Church by a company of ladies and gentlemen from Gawler. There was a good attendance, and an excellent programme was well carried out. The school was nicely decorated with flowers and evergreens. The chair was taken by Mr. W. Bowman, who in a pleasing address introduced the company; he also adverted to the bazaar which is shortly to be held to try and raise sufficient funds to clear the debt of the church. The concert opened with a piano duet thoroughly well rendered by Misses Laycock and F. Bright given in place of the "Goldfinch Quadrilles," in which duet Miss A. Hones was to have taken part, but was prevented from attending through illness. "Dearest Image of my Heart" was nicely sung by Miss Sheriff, as was also "The Sweet Lttle Jersey" the second part of the programme. Miss Knight sang very fairly "Remember or Forget," and "Maggie's Secret." the former being her best performance. A comic song "I shall tell my Mamma" was next sung by Mr. J. Thompson, who in the second part of the programme delighted lovers of the comic by graphically rendering "Matilda Gorger," and was encored. Miss Laycock sang very sweetly "Thy Voice," and "Through the Fire" by the same lady was undoubtedly the gem of the evening. Mr. Drakard next gave a comic reading, entitled "Goin' for Census," which seemed to delight the audience, as did also his recitation "The Wondering Bachelor." Much amusement was caused during this recitation by a heartrendering sigh emanating probably from some sympathizing bachelor in the audience, coming in very appropriately. Mr. R. Thomson sang in capital style "The Four Jolly Smiths," and for his song "Over the Garden Wall" received an imperative encore. Miss A. Bright sang very nicely "The Wishing Cap." The glee "Away, Away" by the company was exceedingly well rendered, as was "May Day." The "Christmas Quadrilles" by Misses Laycock and Sheriff were quite a treat, and were deservedly applauded. A comic duet "Money Matters" was given by Miss Laycock and Mr. R. Thompson, and took immensely. The "Convent Bells" was very sweetly sung by Misses Sheriff and Knight. A glee composed of "Nursery Rhymes" sung by the company brought the programme to a close. Miss F. Bright was a proficient pianist, whilst Mr. G.F. Barnet rendered good service on the violin. A vote of thanks to the visitors proposed by Mr. Sampson, and seconded by Mr. Shillabeer brought a most enjoyable evening to a close. After the concert, supper was provided for the visitors by the ladies connected with the bazaar, and a hearty vote of thanks was passed by the visitors to the ladies for so kindly entertaining them. The committee are indebted to Mrs. Kekwick for kindly lending the piano.



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
Momentous Events Throughout Time

November 1st: 'All Hallows Day', also known as 'All Saints Day' among Roman Catholics, commemorating those who have no special feast day.



November 1st, 1848: The first medical school for women opened in Boston. The Boston Female Medical School was founded by Samuel Gregory with just twelve students. In 1874, the school merged with the Boston University School of Medicine, becoming one of the first co-ed medical schools.

November 1st. 1995: The first all-race local government elections took place in South Africa, marking the end of the apartheid system.



Harbour, California. It flew about a mile at an altitude of 70 feet. Costing \$25 Million, the 200-ton plywood eight-engine Hercules was the world's largest airplane, designed, built and flown by Hughes. It later became

a tourist attraction alongside the Queen Mary ship at Long Beach and has since been moved to Oregon.

November 2nd Birthday: American frontiersman Daniel Boone (1734-1820) was born in Berks County, near Reading, Pennsylvania.

November 3rd, 1534: King Henry VIII became Supreme Head of the Church of England following the passage of the Act of Supremacy by Parliament.

November 3rd, 1957: Soviet Russia launched the worlds' first inhabited space capsule, Sputnik II, which carried a dog named Laika.

November 4th, 1922: King Tut's tomb was discovered at Luxor, Egypt, by British archaeologist Howard Carter after several years of searching. The child-King Tutankhamen became pharaoh at age nine and died around 1352 B.C. at age 19. The tomb was found mostly intact, containing

numerous priceless items now exhibited in Egypt's National Museum in Cairo.

November 5th: Remembered as Guy Fawkes Day in Britain, for the anniversary of the failed "Gunpowder Plot " to blow up the Houses of Parliament and King James I in 1605.

November 6th, 1860: Abraham Lincoln was elected as the 16th U.S. President and the first Republican. He received 180 of 303 possible electoral votes and 40 percent of the popular vote.

November 8th, 1895: X-Rays (electromagnetic rays) were discovered by Wilhelm Roentgen at the University of Wuerzberg in Germany.

November 8th, 1939: An assassination attempt on Hitler failed at the Buergerbraukeller in Munich. A bomb exploded soon after Hitler had exited following a speech commemorating the 1923 Beer Hall Putsch. Seven others were killed.

November 8th Birthday: Astronomer and mathematician Edmond Halley (1655-1742) was born in London. He sighted the Great Comet of 1682 (now named Halley's Comet) and foretold its reappearance in 1758. Halley's Comet appears once each generation with the average time between appearances being 76 years. It is expected to be visible again in 2061.

November 8th Birthday: Pioneering heart surgeon Christiaan Barnard (1922-2001) was born in Beaufort West, Cape of Good Hope Province, South Africa. He headed the surgical team that achieved the first-ever human heart transplant in 1967.

November 9th, 1965: At 5.16pm, the Great Blackout of the Northeast began as a tripped circuit breaker at a power plant on the Niagara River caused a chain reaction

sending power surges knocking out interconnected power companies down the East Coast of the U.S. A. the blackout affected over 30 million people, one-sixth of the entire American population. Electricity also failed in Ontario and Quebec, Canada.

November 9th, 1989: The Berlin Wall was opened up after standing for 28 years as a symbol of the Cold War. The 27.9 mile wall had been constructed in 1961.

November 10th Birthday: Actor Richard Burton (1925-1984) was born in Pontrhydyfen, South Wales (as Richard Jenkins). The son of a coal miner, he came to be regarded as one of the greatest acting talents of his day, although he

never received an Oscar and was never knighted. He led a tempestuous personal life, highlighted twice marrying actress Elizabeth Taylor. He died at age 58 of a cerebral haemorrhage.

November 14th, 1666: The first experimental blood transfusion took place in Britain utilizing two dogs.

November 14th, 1994: The first paying passengers travelled on the new rail service through the Channel Tunnel linking England and France.

November 17, 1869: The Suez Canal was formally opened after more than 10 years of construction.

November 19th, 1978: The biggest mass suicide in history occurred as Reverend Jim Jones led over 900 followers to their deaths at Jonestown, Guyana.

Members of his "Peoples Temple" religious cult were ordered to drink a cyanide-laced fruit drink. Those who refused were forcibly injected.

Precipitating the tragedy a day earlier, California Congressman Leo J. Ryan, along with four associates and several reporters, had been shot to death during an ambush at a nearby airstrip. They were attempting to return home after investigating the cult's remote jungle location. Jones and his mistress killed themselves after watching his entire membership die. Only a few cult members managed to escape.

November 19th Birthday: Charles I, King of Scotland and England (1600-1649) was born. He ruled from 1625-49. He maintained the Divine Right of Kings to rule and opposed Parliament's challenges to his authoritarian style. This resulted in civil war and his eventual execution, followed by the establishment of a Commonwealth with Oliver Cromwell as Lord Protector.

November 22nd, 1990: British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher announced she would resign after 11 years in office, the longest term of any British Prime Minister in the 20th century.

November 22nd Birthday: Charles De Gaulle (1890-1970) was born in Lille, France. He led the Free French against the Nazis during World War II and later became President of France, serving from 1958-69.

November 29th Birthday: British author C.S. Lewis (1898-1963)

was born in Belfast, Ireland (as Clive Staples Lewis). He wrote books on Christian teachings including Pilgrim's Regress, The Problem of Pain, Miracles, and the Screwtape Letters.

Chilean Needle Grass trial a success!

Since Chilean Needle Grass was identified on properties and roadsides in One Tree Hill, much effort has gone into researching and trialling techniques to bring it under control. An approach using cover cropping, fertiliser and grazing has proven to be successful. The trial was initiated by the One Tree Hill Chilean Needle Grass Community Group with a Caring for Our Country grant. This was supported and funded for a further four years through Natural Resources, Adelaide & Mt Lofty Ranges, through their Land Management Program.

The trial was set up in a three hectare paddock that was severely infested with Chilean needle grass. The aim was to find a suitable control method that would work for both grazing and lifestyle properties in the area. The idea was to demonstrate an approach that local landowners could easily put into practice on their own properties.

This year – the fifth year of the trial, the paddock monitoring has shown a zero return of Chilean Needle Grass. The very definition of success!

The paddock is now ready to be sown with a permanent pasture. While it will require monitoring and spot spraying over the next few seasons, it is a great example of what can be achieved with a bit of persistence.

So, the steps to control Chilean needle grass are:

- 1. Soil testing
- 2. Knock down spray of all growth in the paddock with glyphosate, soon after seasonal opening rains.
- 3. Treating with lime and fertilizers according to soil test results.
- 4. Sowing of a cover crop such as oats.
- 5. Repeat this process for at least 3 years.
- 6. Finally, when Chilean needle grass levels are very low, sowing the paddock to permanent pasture.

The number of stock run in the trial paddock has greatly increased during the trial – helping to pay for the control.

The key to managing Chilean Needle Grass is having a plan and carrying out the actions at the right times. Chilean Needle Grass is flowering now, so if you would like advice on controlling this or other weeds on your property, please contact the Gawler Natural Resources Centre, 08 8523 7700.



Goat's - Buying a Goat

The first question has to be "why?" What is your purpose in having a goat? Have you thought of all the problems as well as the benefits? Do you want it for milk, weed control, companionship, pet, fleece, meat or something I haven't thought about? Your answer will decide what breed and type of goat you get. Please remember that the cute little thing you bought at a market may grow into a huge buck. One of mine was 94 cm at the shoulder and weighed over 150 kg. He was bigger than the Shetland stallions at the country show. It also may come with a burden of worms, virus and other disease issues, or that it may not have received a good start in life and therefore is likely to bring heart break in a week or two.

Check out the rest of the herd before taking a goat home. Talk to the owner.

Has it been tested for CAE? This is particularly important in milk goats. The practise of pooling milk and feeding to the kids has spread the disease through most dairy goats. The Dairy Goat Society of South Australia has been working to eradicate CAE and all good breeders are testing at frequent intervals. If you are looking at a kid, when was the mother tested?

How old is the goat? Remember, kids need milk for at least the first 6 weeks of life (preferably 12 weeks) and this will increase the cost of the kid.

When was it (or mother) last wormed?

If you are buying a milker, how much is the mother producing, or how much is this goat producing?

The udder is likely to look fairly full if the production is high.

If they say they have just milked her, ask to come back and watch "to learn how to milk" that evening. If she is really giving plenty of milk they will be able to show a full udder then.

Handle the fleece if you are after a fleece goat. Check the quality of the fibres (hairy or soft?).

Is the kid going to grow horns? Do you want them? They can be dangerous in some breeds. Fleece goats tend to grow horns that curl backward whereas dairy goats horns spread outward and are more likely to catch you.

If you are buying a registered goat, ask for the paperwork. Check tattoos or brands as appropriate. If you can't see a tattoo on a dairy goat, it is probably not registered. They do fade, so a reputable breeder will show you how to see it, using a torch behind the ear.

Are your fences up to having goats? They can be difficult to contain as they are thinkers. We found electric fences soon stopped them. Do you have shelter? What will you do if you go away? How will you manage your goats in cases of fire?

If you have seriously thought about all these things and still think you want goats, go for it. I loved mine and they repaid me manyfold.


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ADOPT A VERGE Does yours or a nearby verge look something like this?

This dry summer fuel load could be between 16-30 tonnes per Hectare! Many roadsides contain non-native, exotic grass species that have these high fuel loads.






It could look something like this. This is one of 7 Roadside Fuel Reduction Initiative demonstration plots around the Adelaide Hills Council area. This site at Forreston has had a composition change from the high fuel load, non-native grasses to lower fuel load, summer green, native grasses. The small amount of dry material on this site has fuel loads of lower than 5 tonnes per Hectare.

A species rich, native grassland - with daisies, lilies, small flowering groundcovers providing habitat for butterflies, birds, insects and lizards.
