# Incident Report

A large fire threatening houses south of Toolunga Road was the only major incident for this month although the Brigade attended vehicle accidents, small fires and was involved in a Strike Team that helped with the Kyeema fire near Willunga Hill. We also had two standby days where the station was manned in anticipation of bad weather conditions.

The Toolunga Road fire started near the end of Hughes Court and burnt through to the end of MacKenzie Court aided by swirling wind, steep terrain and some high grass and took about an hour to contain. The fire came within metres of several houses and sheds. All of the One Tree Hill trucks responded quickly and along with other local brigades, water bombers and a Strike Team from Gumeracha Group helped control the fire.

# Summer is Here!

By the time you read this, we will be into summer proper and all of your preparations should be complete. Comparing a fire that started early in November and only burnt 10 square metres and one that started at the end of the month and burnt many hectares, both in similar country and weather conditions shows the difference a couple of weeks can make. If you are not ready now, then choose your days carefully and be vigilant. Make sure you have checked the CFS website for guidelines on any outdoor activities you may be undertaking. Remember, the Police will attend all incidents over the Fire Season and will lay charges if they suspect negligence.

The Brigade thank all who attended the Station Open Day especially the kids from Ingle Farm East Primary School who did up the garden for us. Heaps of displays and information were available from the SES, CFS Media unit, the boys from NCPS pumps and the weed control people helped make the day a success. Not forgetting the Scouts who put on a display of dangers around the house and Stuie Cawthorne's demonstration farm unit.

As we go to print: Everybody will be aware of the Catastrophic fire which started near Pinery in the Mid North on the 25th. Our hearts go out to the people lost and their families who are grieving. As more information comes to hand, the economic loss and hardship will be very severe. The brigade has been fully committed since day one, with all resources and available members putting in a major effort. That commitment will continue until at least the end of November.

# Councillor's Report November 2015

ello I am able to get this report in this month due to not being at work today. Why am I not at work today you may well ask. Well on Wednesday a grass/bushfire started in Mallala and I work in Freeling. By 2.30pm the decision was made to evacuate Freeling which was choked with smoke and turning as black as the Ace of Spades, so off we went to Kapunda. By the time we got to Kapunda that too was being evacuated to Eudunda, to cut a long story short eventually late in the evening we made it back to Freeling, I picked up my car and came home via Templers as the Thiele Highway was closed. My condolences go out to the families of those who perished as a result of this fire and my heartfelt sorrow goes out to those who lost homes and millions of dollars of income. This fire was an insatiable monster. Many thanks to the communities that gave us shelter and supported the fire fighters. So what is my point? Clearly, we all need to be vigilant this and every bushfire season and coming home after the fire front had passed at night, it was clear to see that burning trees on the side of the road and in paddocks that would eventually fall over and block the roads cutting people off and forcing road closures. It is very important to the preservation of human life and ability for fire fighters to get to the fire that our roads are safe. It is equally important to have safe roads and intersections in ordinary times so if the felling of a few trees at the about to be constructed Kersbrook roundabout upsets some people then !!! my opinion is that human life always takes precedence and should be protected at all costs if within our capabilities.

On another note Council in a split decision saw fit to form an Aboriginal Community Reference Group, mind you the Aboriginal people did not ask for it, nor were they consulted about it, and now Council is going out encouraging them to participate in the group according to the membership determined by Council.

My argument was that we should have first consulted with the Indigenous communities and sought a need and commitment by that community to be part of a reference group and have them decide on the membership of such a group but hey maybe I am just different.

Last month I made comment on the hiring of a new CEO, Dr Mal Hemmerling, well I received an interesting email accusing me of hiring Mr Hemmerling in order to further my political career by using his contacts and that Playford was a great city up until three years ago when dumping fees made it unviable to use the dump. The new CEO has been in charge for approximately 3 months so can't attribute the dumping fees which are pretty well determined by the state government, nor the state of the city to him. Can I just say that I am flattered that someone thinks I have a political career however, not a member of any political party though, and if Mr Hemmerling has all these contacts then isn't he the right person for the job? As for hiring the CEO, flattered, but I wasn't even on the selection committee let alone have the power to hire or fire any Council employee, has been an interesting month though.

At the CDAP meeting, Council approved a 400+ allotment subdivision in Virginia by the Lanser Corporation.

# A Fond Farewell To a Much Respected Gentleman

Albert Baggs passed away on the 21st November, aged 94. He had been a long time resident of One Tree Hill since 1967 after emigrating from Farnborough, UK. With Joyce and their 3 sons they set about building their home on Precolumb Road. At that time it was the last house on the road. It was a time of great excitement and achievement. There was a slight hitch along the way. After a particularly wet and windy weekend, two of the newly constructed walls collapsed in a heap of rubble.

Joyce and Albert became involved in the One Tree Hill community with Albert joining the then named EFS. One of the fires he attended resulted in him being flipped through the air by a hose causing several broken ribs. During a time of unemployment he took the job of the One Tree Hill mail delivery. This gave him a chance to connect with others further out from the township.

**During these early days Joyce and Albert had a lovely surprise.** At the age of 47 Albert became a dad to a baby girl. Great joy after 3 boys.

Albert enjoyed helping others around the township. He had many great skills, all learnt from his father. He could turn his hand to anything. If you have ever had to sort out the chairs in the Institute, thank Albert. He made the chair stacker out of a sacktruck, some "it will come in handy" bits and lots of ingenuity. It definitely makes a heavy job a lot easier.

He was a great help to many of the older residents of the town.

Mrs Hicks, owner of the General Store called on his kindness often. She repaid him by allowing Albert the opportunity to pick mulberries from her tree in the back paddock. On one occasion, after managing

to gather about 5 buckets full, a noise could be heard under the ladder. A flock of sheep had their heads buried in the buckets enjoying the fruits of Albert and Joyce's hours of labour. You can imagine the colour of the sheep's heads. Looked like a new breed had been developed!

He became involved in the early establishment of the Progress Association. Joyce and Albert were founding members of the One Tree Hill Senior Citizens Club. Joyce still enjoys going every Tuesday.

You may remember Albert from his time at the One Tree Hill Anzac Day Services. He looked very smart in his Normandy Veteran's Beret, wearing his medals on his chest. He really appreciated, on behalf of himself and others that served, the respect the One Tree Hill community afforded him. One touching moment was when a young boy saluted him as he walked by. That was a very special tribute.

He will be missed by his family and friends. His influence and kindness will always be remembered.

The Uniting Church Choir will keep us entertained with **Christmas Carols throughout the event.** 


Stall holders have donated goodies so there will be a raffle to win several prizes. The tickets will be given out when you purchase over \$5.00 from any of the stall holders.

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


# Blacksmith's Inn Golf Da

# **Horse Care - Bolt or Run?**

# **BOLT, SHY OR DISOBEDIENCE?**

One of the first things to consider before taking action is: how dangerous is the situation? To help determine that, you need to understand the differences in the terms and what they really mean.

## THE BOLT

The most dangerous is the bolt. People often talk about a bolting horse "he bolted with me" but it rarely happens in real life. A truly bolting horse will risk life and limb to escape the situation. I say he has "lost his brain". He may gallop over a cliff, jump into a river, crash through trees, cross a highway, with no regard for his safety. His one thought is to escape the thing that frightened him. If you are on a bolting horse, do not try to reason with him. He is beyond listening. He may even decide you are the predator and run faster. Get Off! Kick free of the stirrups, jump and roll. (Take a judo class to learn to roll on landing). Your safety may mean that you have to risk the injury of the fall as he will probably not stop for some time and may even kill himself.

## THE SHY

A shy is a small movement to one side, possibly including a spin. He takes a few quick steps away from something that startles him. If we can stay on for those steps he will usually calm down and go back to his normal self. Some horses shy a lot. All horses will shy in some circumstances. My Renegade used to jump sideways, then, because he had left me hanging off his side and therefore applying leg, he would step back under me. Disconcerting but I only came off him twice (and I blame a slippery saddle both times).

## **THE RUN**

When this sidestep escalates to a sustained run, many people call it a bolt. But he is usually still thinking. He will steer around trees and cliff edges, pick a safe path and if he is used to stopping at roads to check for traffic (as we do when riding) he may even stop or slow there. In this situation, we can reassure him that the scary thing is no longer chasing him and take control again. No cuddles please, firm "Oi what do you think you're doing" and strong aids. This does not mean harsh; allow him a moment to respond. His heart rate is up and he really does not want to slow. Stay with him. Your presence may settle him and getting off at speed is more dangerous. Remember, he is still thinking. The run is often a series of shies. He gets a fright and runs a few strides. Now he is full of adrenaline and any minor scare is blown out of proportion. So he shies again. And again. We see it as a sustained run but to the fast thinking horse, he is constantly being chased by something. Maybe the first thing was a branch falling (fair call - don't want to get hit by it) then a bush moves (there might be a predator in there). Someone shouts that there is a horse loose, but he simply hears sudden noise. He has now had 3 shies and travelled a dozen strides. But now he is anxious and more things continue to frighten him until he has travelled out of the danger zone. However, if he is now away from places he knows and with no human he knows then he is very vulnerable and will continue to shy at things he would ignore if in his safe yard at home. He is thinking like a prey animal and has to worry about his safety for he has no-one else to help him do it. But he is still thinking, just not like we do.

We usually see this type of run as a series of short gallops with slower periods between them. If we can call to our horse, and he usually comes to us, we have a good chance of stopping it quickly. He wants to be safe and we have to tell him that he is safe with us. Talk to him "steady, settle down" use a calm voice and project an attitude of "nothing wrong" even if your heart is racing. This often works if riding or on the ground.

## **HAD ENOUGH**

Occasionally we find the horse just does his own thing. This often happens when we have been pushing him for awhile and he has had enough, particularly on an arena. He will simply head back towards his float or yard. In general, he gets to a corner and refuses to turn so as to stay on the arena. So he leaves the arena when he is facing his comfort area. Use a doubling technique or a back leg crossover to get him facing back onto the arena. It does not have to be pretty, just so he is not facing comfort. Once you get him turned around he will usually give in. However, take it as a hint that he is getting sour. Stop as soon as you have some nice work so you can reward that. It does not even have to be what you wanted to work on. If he is good at something, use that as your finish point. Be flexible, change your plans. He is saying "I've had enough. I'm going home". Collette is particularly good at this but leaves the arena at a walk so the rider is in no more danger than in any riding.

# **MISUNDERSTAND**ING

We may have a running horse from lack of understanding if our body language is telling him to keep going. The horse jumps forwards, we get left behind, then panic and pull ourselves forward. But we overshoot, end up in a semi-foetal position. By leaning forward we are encouraging the gallop (you ride a gallop by leaning forward). If we have had a fright we are probably yelling too, which encourages him more. Sit up, speak calmly.

### SUMMARY

A bolt is dangerous and could kill you. Get off. But think about whether the horse is thinking and if you are getting through to him before risking the jump which will probably injure you.

A shy will be over so quickly you had no time to react. A run is a series of shies. Help him realise he is now safe and you are in charge.

Disobedience by leaving an arena is usually because he is tired (mental even if not physical). Use a back leg crossover, turn on the forehand or doubling (all very similar when used in this situation) to face him back into the arena, then give him a short easy job to do and quit before souring him.

Misunderstanding is usually our fault. Is he properly trained, solid in his response, or is our body language inconsistent? Don't lean forward when galloping if you want to stop.

Keep in mind that you have to leave fireworks to the experts over this festive season. The state's fire services are urging people to see in the new year without setting off fireworks. If you want to see some fireworks attend the many community functions throughout the state to see them.

The MFS and CFS warn us that fireworks are illegal, and you could face a hefty fine of up to \$5,000 if you are caught with any. The use of paper lanterns that are set alight is also illegal and are banned from use in South Australia due to the

risk of starting a bushfire. On days of
Total Fire Bans, the lighting of fires in the
open and use of Weber style BBQ's, camp fires and sparklers
is banned also.

Stay alert and do the right thing for everyone, let's help keep it safe.

# From The Past - Assorted Clippings From The Early Days

Country Correspondence Friday December 31, 1875

On Sunday, the 19th, a fire broke out on Mr. Norris's sections, Tenefeate, and but for the prompt exertions of Mr. Norris and family, ably assisted by Mr. S. Buttfield (who happened to be at the house at the time) the consequences would have been very serious to the whole neighbourhood, as the grass is both high and dry, the crops also ripe enough to burn. As to the cause of the fire, it is supposed that three men from the Humbug diggings, who were seen passing along the track where the fire broke out at the time it commenced. There is not the slightest doubt but that the fire was caused by them. It is hoped this will be a caution to them, and make them more careful in future.

# Bunyip Friday 27 December, 1901

Agricultural Bureau

Present: Messrs. J. Bowman (chairman), Adams, F. Bowman, A. Thomas, and H. Clucas (hon, secretary).

Correspondence: Correspondence was received from Central Bureau considered, and extracted; members to answer questions and forward the replies. Take-all causes little trouble in the hills, no doubt, attributable to uniform rainfall. It was found that late spring ploughing and summer fallowing did not act as a preventative like winter fallow, which received a maximum of rainfall.

Attendance: It was difficult to devise means to promote better attendance at Bureau meetings. A social yearly when a resume of the year's deliberations could be presented and opinions freely exchanged, was suggested. Members were undecided as to the advisableness of increasing the number of members of the branches. These matters will receive further consideration.

| <u>Wool Classing:</u> This district being almost more a wool | producing district than anything else it was thought advisable | to invite the instructor in wool-classing to the neighbourhood.

The Crops: Red rust had, fortunately, done less harm than had been feared. Early sown and early varieties suffered most - King's Karly particularly. Majestic appeared to have had immunity and was the most successful crop grown but it is a slow growing wheat that is excellent for hay.

Uley, December 29: Workmen are renovating the school house and residence, putting in new windows and ceilings, cleaning up round about and putting the well in good order. Miss Barritt, of Yattalunga, kindly taught the V11 grade.

# Bunyip Friday 26 November, 1943 FIELD DAY AT ONE TREE HILL

Under the auspices of the Agricultural Bureau and in association with the Department of Agriculture, a field day will be held at Dr. A.L. Tostevin's Farm, One Tree Hill, on Friday December 3rd at 1.40p.m.

The Hon. A.P. Blesing, MLC., (Minister of Agriculture) will open the proceedings and visitors will be afforded the opportunity of inspecting the "Wattles" herd of stud Jersey cattle which has recently been imported from Victoria: Stud Large White and commercial pigs and piggery; the layout of which has been constructed on up-to-date lines. At opportune intervals during the inspection, addresses will be given by technical officers of the Department of Agriculture.

Lunch and afternoon tea will be available, the proceeds from which are to be devoted to the Fighting Forces Comforts Fund.

## Bunyip Friday 22 December, 1922

City entertainers gave a concert in the One Tree Hill Institute on December 15th, the proceeds going part to the Memorial Hospital and the local cricket club. Items were contributed by Mrs. Barritt, Miss Lilian Wilkinson (Mrs. W.H. Kelly), Miss Rendall and Miss Joyce White, Messrs. Harry Tovey and Jarrett. The visitors were afterwards motored to the city by the local residents. Mr. H. H. Blackham arranged the concert.

The rain of the past week, although beneficial in various ways, did damage to the fruit crop, causing the apricots to split badly. Hay-carting was hindered, as stacks have to be opened up to prevent mould.

Telephone communications with Adelaide was opened on Tuesday last. There are several private subscribers, and eventually the line is to go on to a point near the Barossa weir. It will fill a long-felt want and make up, to some extent, for the absence of a daily mail service.

# The Advertiser Tuesday 19 December, 1922 HURT BY FALLING TREE

On December 16, Colin Jenkins (10) second son of Mr. R.A. Jenkins, of Glenburnie, was chopping down a tree when he got caught as the tree fell and was badly injured. Ribs, both collarbones, one arm and one leg were broken. He now lies in the Hutchison Hospital in a critical condition. The tree was so large that Mr. Jenkins was unable to extricate the boy until he got help from a neighbour.



# Chronicle Thursday 5 January, 1933 Three Hurt, One Badly, At One Tree Hill

Three men were injured, one seriously, when a motor lorry fell from a small bridge into a creek approximately half a mile from One Tree Hill on the One Tree Hill Road, about 10 p.m. on December 29. They were Leslie Mack (33) of One Tree Hill, abdominal injuries, admitted to the Adelaide Hospital. Condition critical. Arthur Thomas (24) of Fisher Terrace, Mile End, facial abrasions, treated. Edward Parker (31) of One Tree Hill, driver of the lorry, bruised neck, treated. Another occupant of the lorry, William Ratliff (33) of Angas Street was unhurt. The men were going to Humbug Scrub on a gold prospecting trip. It is stated that as the lorry approached the bridge the driver was dazzled by the headlights of a car approaching an intersection of a cross road about 50 yards from the bridge. He lost control of the vehicle, which plunged through railing, fell 15 feet into the creek, and overturned. Mack was thrown out of the lorry, Parker and Ratliff had to strip off the hood to extricate Thomas, who was pinned underneath.

## **Bunyip Friday 11 December, 1936**



# **Goats - Well Mannered Goats**

Teach your kid to behave on a collar and lead.

If you are going to tether the goat, use a wide collar. As goats have small necks, you will probably find you need whippet or greyhound collars as they are wide but short. Animals are less likely to strangle with a wide collar as it does not twist easily.

Put a collar on the kid while it is very young. 2 weeks old is not too early. (You can use a puppy collar at this stage as long as you never leave the kid alone while wearing it. Be there if it gets into trouble.) If you collar and tie to a fence each time you feed, the kid learns to obey the pull and to stand while tied up. It is too small to resist and learns that good things come when tied up. Begin with a few moments, and gradually make each lesson longer. You should soon be able to lead for a few metres. Make a habit of putting collar on and leading to the feeding area. Do not accept any disobedience, like leaping up at you. That may be cute for a small kid but having a 100 kg wether jump up at you is not pleasant. If the kid puts its feet on you, push them down. If it persists, use a little force on the collar to hold it down, feet on the ground, not lying on the ground.

If a goat butts you, do not strike it on the head. This encourages a fight. Tap it on the nose, spray it with water from a trigger bottle (single pull only) or if it persists, tip it over.



To tip over, timing is important. Wait until it attempts to butt you. Grab the furthest front foot and pull as the goat's feet come down. As it has the foot pulled from under it, it will fall. Reinforce this by pushing down on its shoulder and holding it on the ground. This indicates dominance and you will probably never have to do it again. Only do this for an older goat, not a young kid. Train the kid not to jump and you will not have to do this to it. It is usually bucks that need this level of force.

The photo shows a fully grown buck being handled with ease. He is wearing a thin collar as he only has it on when being led. Note there is no problem catching him to put the collar on.

# Can you help?

LITTLE CORELLA RESEARCH PROJE

White many people enjoy seeing these native cockatoos, large flocks can cause considerable problems. We need your help to understand what makes particular sites problematic. 
