President's Report February 2015

This report will focus on the major bushfire that the district experienced over the week commencing January 2nd and ran for nearly an entire week.

The One Tree Hill Progress Association responded to community demand and opened the Hall for residents who had either left their properties or were unable to get home and gathered at the township centre. They were very anxious, some not knowing whether their partners, other family members, animals, houses and outbuildings had survived the fire. The lack of information was a most frustrating experience at the time. By late Friday evening a citizen refuge was established with approximately 20+ people along with their pets, located at the Hall, as they waited for news.

The flow of information from the CFS and Police was at times both heartening and disappointing, as various bits of information were received.

Spirits weren't high to begin with and with each new report that emerged, it was very obvious that this was probably the largest fire this district had ever seen.

The demands on food, water and basic toiletries stretched our resources, and the generous donations from the organisations and the public that enabled us to supply much needed support. The response from volunteers, who freely gave their time and energy was amazing. A big thank you must go to both June Owens and Pat Jones, who both spent many hours over several days helping organise and distribute the goods and services to those in need.

Below are the Companies and organisations to whom we say a big thank you to, we will also be sending individual letters of thanks.

ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT FEBRUARY 2015



Incident Report

At 12.33pm on Friday 2nd January, the One Tree Hill Brigade was called to a grass fire on Sampson Flat. The Brigade was on stand by because of the predicted weather conditions and responded in a matter of seconds. What happened next turned out to be the most intense period of fire fighting that the One Tree Hill CFS has known. Nearly 13,000 hectares of land were engulfed in the fire and the name Sampson Flat became known to people all over the world. There are not many locals who were not affected in some way and with the many stories of good luck and near misses; there are many of tragedy and loss.

Unfortunately 27 houses were lost and to those who are suffering our hearts and thoughts are with you.

It was impressive to see the OTH CFS shed turned into a buzzing control centre as the Incident Management Team took over, with staff and volunteers from the CFS along with other agencies including Police, SA Ambulance, DEWNR, MFS and many more working 24 hours a day over the next nine days to combat the fire. Behind the scenes the Operational Support crew worked tirelessly to feed this horde. Meanwhile the OTH oval was transformed into the staging area, managing shift changes for fire fighting units from all over SA, Victoria and New South Wales with the SES and Salvation Army helped by local volunteers rallying to the cause to provide food for the thousand or more fire fighters involved.

More impressive was the response of the community as the township was virtually taken over by the many brigades and agencies responding to the threat. The members of the CFS have been overwhelmed by the public response and the generosity of spirit shown by the local people and businesses, with far too many who have contributed individually to name in the space available. To everyone involved the CFS says a massive THANK YOU.

Those still dealing with fire related issues are reminded of the SA Bushfire recovery website at www.sa.gov.au and the Recovery hotline on 1800 302 787. There has also been a recovery centre set up in Gumeracha at the Torrens Valley Community Centre. For information about remediation in the Sampson Flat Fire region, landowners can also call CFS Region 2's Willaston Headquarters on 8522 6088.

Despite the devastation there is still a significant proportion of unburnt land in the OTH area and we must be vigilant over the coming months. Now more than ever the importance of a good Bushfire Plan is evident and I am sure many of us are reviewing what we had planned in light of lessons learnt over the last month. Please stay safe, be careful and once again, thank you.

Councillor's Report FEBRUARY 2015

Firstly I express my sympathy to everyone and anyone affected by the recent Sampson Flat bushfires. Further I express my sincere gratitude to all the Fire-fighters (CFS, MFS and interstate fireies and support personnel) SES personnel, volunteers, Council Staff and all those who donated time, effort, money and goods to help bring the fires to an end and support those affected by this terrifying tragedy.

Council in December was about to disband the Bushfire Prevention Committee due to a perceived lack of interest in this committee. Fortunately with the unanimous support of my fellow elected members I was able to keep active the committee with its new charter to be presented to Council, now sooner, rather than later. I will be lobbying to have this committee made up of CFS, SAPOL, Council elected member, and Community member representation and to be charged with at least two tasks, one being the development of a local disaster action plan taking into consideration lessons learnt from recent experiences and the second task being to bring a report with recommendations to Council on ways and means of making it easier and affordable for all rural residents to clean and dispose of fire hazardous materials within the prescribed burning periods in order to mitigate the potential for or impact of bushfire. Council has allocated for bushfire prevention \$45,000 for the 14/15 financial year consisting of \$2.5K for education and advertising, \$3K for general expenses, \$5K for tree pruning along fire tracks, \$300 for signage replacement, \$6.08K for brush cutting on roadsides, \$6.6K for VMS board Education (Aug.Oct,Dec), \$17.02K for bushfire mitigation works and \$4.5K for the Uley Road fire track upgrade. It can be seen that \$45K does not go a long way and I will try to have more funds allocated to bushfire prevention within our City.

Congratulations to all those residents who came to the Country Market and expressed their views in relation to the proposed Institute Hall upgrade. Council has taken on board the views expressed by the 21 written responses and made modifications

within the scope of works and allowable budget that met the approval of the participants of the Special Progress meeting held 14 January which will eventuate in a more modern, updated venue, which still retains the character and amenity of the Hall. I might mention that 21 representations were 21 more than were attracted to Council's community consultation on its City Plan, so well done to the community of One Tree Hill for demonstrating a commitment and caring for their local patch.

Unfortunately **Bushfire season** is not over yet and the recent rains will soon evaporate into non-existence so, please be vigilant in protecting your assets, and in reporting any suspicious activities in relation to fire risks and theft.

Institute Refurbishment Plans

On the 14th January, 2015 the President of OTH Progress Association, Mr. Ian Slater welcomed Mr. Jonathon Roberts and Mr. Guy Trace from Playford Council and invited them to present their revised plans for refurbishment of the OTH Institute.

Jon and Guy opened the discussion regarding the final plans drawn up after community consultation. They had attended the OTH Country Market in December to get feedback from members of the public as well as discussions with members of Progress and the Hall Manager.

Display boards and printed sheets of the plans were distributed along with each written presentation Council had received from the community.

The main items addressed were:

The removal of the stud wall in the centre of the bar/supper room.

The fridge (moveable) will have a drop down power access when placed in the centre of the room.

A cupboard on the eastern side that was jutting into the bar room has been removed.

The servery will have a cantilever ledge above either a cupboard 450mm deep or a double shelved unit that is suitable for preparing drinks on the top shelf and room for storing eskies/drink containers on the bottom shelf.

Carpet tiles are a possibility in the 'new hall' at a future date. Light fittings in the 'old hall' to remain with new LED bulbs fitted.

Floor coverings - still investigating the suitable material but will be commercial grade vinyl curing up against the wall to meet current standards.

Rear door to kitchen moved back to allow better access to power board etc.

Front windows - curtains will now drop 100mm below sill instead of full length.

A new stage area will be a permanent fixture below the area

holding the plaques, which will also have a curtain that is able to be drawn back and tied when needed. The stage will be a semi-circle of approximately 175mm—200mm high.

There will be a new reverse cycle air-conditioning fitted to the halls and they will be set on a 3 hour timer.

The overall response was that Playford Council had taken considerable effort to consider and include community requests wherever possible. The point was also made by both Jon Roberts and Guy Trace that over time they would consider and adjust any problems that may arise after the refurbishment.

The refurbishments are due to commence following the Anzac Day Dawn Service in April and it is estimated that it will take approximately 8 weeks to complete the work.

There should be definite dates announced in the April edition of the Grapevine.



Horse Care - Fires and Horses

You will find lots of information about how to prepare yourself and your horse in case of fire. Go to HorseSA website for articles. Or google it. There seem to have been dozens pop up in the last couple of weeks.

I am not going to tell you all of it, just a few thoughts and experiences I had.

Plan to go: You can always decide to stay. Have a place to take them and a way of getting there. Do not leave it until the last minute to start phoning around. The place to go to must be some distance away. It is no good going 5 kilometres up the road and having to move them again when the fire gets there as well. Do not expect people to bring their floats in to move your horses. I know many did but some risked their lives doing so. Unfamiliar drivers on narrow, unfamiliar roads is a recipe for disaster. Add to that urgency and big trucks!

Have a safe paddock at home. It needs to be one they are familiar with, with little or no grass and only 1 or 2 trees. This is where they go EVERY fire danger day if you are not on the property. You may not get back to move them.

Mark your horse: mobile phone number at the least. Grease based ones collect dirt and rub off when the horse rolls. Chalk ones dust off in 24 hours. Some spray markers work, I have been told. Permanent markers or liquid paper mark the hooves. Mark several for a chance of being able to read the whole number somewhere. Large numbers on the side are best as people can read them from a distance.

DO NOT leave any gear on: fly masks, rugs, boots, name tags may all melt onto the horse's skin in a fire, causing severe burns.

Cut the mane and tail short. Blow the shows, they will have to get used to short manes and tails. Twigs caught in them can set fire to the mane/tail and burn the horse.

If you leave your horse, leave enough water for at least a week. Do not rely on automatic waterers; they fail in power outages or melt in fires. That is 280 litres per horse minimum.

Leave wet hay for them to pick at. It will keep them occupied, keep their heads down (reduce smoke inhalation) and might entice them to stay in the safe paddock. Scatter it in the centre of the paddock, so they put their bums to the fire front. Wet hay will not go mouldy in a day.

Do not try to walk your horse out unless you have experience walking this one on roads. If it panics there will be an accident. Fire trucks, sirens, smoke and your anxiety are very likely to combine to trigger a panic from the horse. Try to walk as a group of sensible horses with sensible people. Make sure you are dressed to lead horses: no sandals, thongs, high heels.

After the fire, be aware that horses can show smoke or stress issues 4 or 5 weeks after the event. Colic in particular may be weeks showing up. Horses that seemed to be untouched are the most likely to slip through the net as you are not watching them so closely as those that are burned.

Don't forget: the fire season has just started. The Sampson Flat fire only burned 12,500 Hectares.

There is plenty more to burn.

From The Past - Assorted Clippings

BUSH FIRES

One Tree Hill, November 20th 1926.

Once again One Tree Hill and the district of Munno Para East is faced with the menace of bushfires caused by week-end shooters and picnic parties. On Saturday afternoon shooting was heard in the vicinity of Mr. J. L. Blackham's home, and shortly afterwards a pall of smoke indicated the start of a fire. Fortunately some motor cyclists from the recreation ground were soon on the scene and stopped the fire when it burnt about five acres of feed.

CHRONICLE 24th September, 1936.

APPROACHING MARRIAGES: DOUBLE WEDDING

CHARLSON - HALLETT. CHARLSON - HICKS. The marriage of Dulcie, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Charlson of One Tree Hill to Harold, only son of Mr. and Mrs. G.E. Hallett of Angle Vale and Edith Ray second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Charlson to Leonard, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Hicks of New Hindmarsh, will be solemnised at the Pirie Street, Methodist Church, Adelaide at 7pm on 26th September. All friends cordially invited to ceremony.

CHRONICLE - THURSDAY 26th September 1935

Mr. and Mrs. T. Sampson

Two aged pioneers of South Australia, Mr. and Mrs. T. Sampson, each 84 died within a fortnight at the their home, Harvey Street, Walkerville. Mr. Sampson died on August 21 and Mrs. Sampson on September 6. They formerly resided at One Tree Hill and Wilmington. Both were natives of South Australia. Mr. Sampson was the first traveller to sell superphosphate to the farmers. He used to talk of having to beg farmers to order it, but the year following its use, with results of six and eight bags against the non-users one and two, made his task lighter afterwards.

He was about the best-known farm machinery salesman in South Australia, being one of the first salesmen of Massey Harris machinery. Later the American machinery companies persuaded him to open in South Australia. That was the beginning of the McCormack and later the Deering farm machinery operations. He was subsequently associated with Clutterbucks (machinery distributors) and on retiring from that firm was the guest at a farewell dinner.

Mr. Sampson was said to be the first traveller for the sale of

Mr. Sampson was said to be the first traveller for the sale of farm implements on Eyre Peninsula. In those days all machinery came to South Australia in cases and was delivered on to the farms in cases. The travellers had to assemble and build the machines for their customers. All his travelling was done with a horse and buggy. Everywhere he was known as "Tommy Sampson the binder king".

The father of Mr. Sampson took the first prize for wine in the London exhibition taken by a South Australian maker.

He sent the first truck of wheat from Salisbury to Adelaide and it brought £5 a bag. Mr. Thomas Sampson married and took his bride to Wilmington 65 years ago. Mrs. Sampson was one of the first white women to go to Wilmington. She will be remembered by old residents of Wilmington for her work among the sick, and particularly among mothers.

At One Tree Hill she collected funds for the Methodist Church, and was the first organist.

At One Tree Hill Mr. Sampson was a prominent huntsman. Mr and Mrs. Sampson left a daughter, Mrs. Maitland, of Walkerville, and two sons, Mr. Percival John Sampson, of Lock, Eyre Peninsula, and Mr. Nicholas Sampson, commercial traveler, of Victoria.

January 2nd 1955 - BLACK SUNDAY

The 2nd January 1955 is known in South Australia as 'Black Sunday'. Terrible bushfires swept through the Adelaide Hills, blackening 600 square miles of country from One Tree Hill in the north to Strathalbyn in the south. Forty homes were lost as well as many other buildings, including the Upper Sturt railway station and Marble Hill, the Governor's summer residence on Norton Summit.

On that hot weekend the Governor, Sir Robert George, and his family went to stay at Marble Hill. By Sunday afternoon the smoke and heat showed that the fire was very near and in spite of the efforts of the staff with garden hoses the building suddenly caught alight. The family and staff narrowly escaped by throwing wet blankets over themselves. They huddled near a bank as the elegant old home burnt fiercely and the tower collapsed at the height of the blaze. Since then the impressive ruins have been partly restored by the National Trust but the Governors have never returned.

There was great loss of property and stock in the fires in the hills and in the south east, but only one man died, at Inglewood.



Debriefing After Bushfires

The One Tree Hill Community meeting held on Thursday 22nd January was attended by many members of the community.

Penny Kazla, Community Engagement Officer from the CFS introduced members from the CFS, SAPOL and the Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure.

CFS Regional Commander, John Hutchins opened by saying that he couldn't be more proud of those in the communities affected by the recent bushfire and that the true "Australian Spirit" shone throughout the whole ordeal.

He also commended the local OTH CFS members who literally handed over their station to those 60-100 people involved in the operation during the 6 or so days of the fire. They were very supportive at all times and there was no rivalry here, they all worked together as a team. The Deputy Control Officer from NSW, said the co-ordination between departments was amazing (CFS, Police, Transport and Council).

Within 30 minutes of the fire starting, water bombers were on site. Within the hour they thought it was contained, but it broke out into the Kersbrook Forest area and that is when they lost control of it. On Friday evening the fire was doubling in size approximately every 2 hours.

SAPOL members explained their duties which included road blockages, a fairly contentious and frustrating issue faced by some evacuees and their families.

The representative from DPTI then explained the many and varied tasks that befell this department. Burnt and falling trees were a main concern to the safety of residents and volunteers in the first couple of weeks.

He stressed that there will be speed restriction road signs in place for quite a considerable time to come while they repair and make safe all the roads in the affected areas.

The fire destroyed the reflective coating on many road signs and they have replaced over 1300 roadside posts to date.

After the guest speakers had finished, an open forum was held. This allowed those present to put questions and concerns forward.

Members of the community firstly voiced their gratitude to the CFS, SAPOL and Emergency Services, then proceeded with their comments and points of view.

The main issue seemed to be the restrictions at the road blocks faced by residents either trying to get to their properties or being allowed to return if they left for any reason. Another point discussed was the need for officials to take heed of "local knowledge".

All guest speakers expressed their intention to take on board the issues discussed on this evening and endeavour to find solutions that are not only safe and practical but also take into consideration the concerns voiced by the people involved should another incident of this magnitude occur again.

The DPTI (roads department) rep is very embarrassed that he missed Playford Council in his thank you's. He extends his apologies and says that Playford have been very helpful.

How A Bushfire Spreads

Bushfires spread along the surface of the ground in three ways: direct flame contact, radiant heat and burning embers.

Direct Flame Contact: Flames touch unburnt fuels and raise their temperature to ignition. This process is hastened by wind blowing the flames deeper into the fuel ahead or an upward slope presenting fuel to the flames sooner.


Radiant Heat: Radiant heat from the fire raises adjacent fuel to ignition temperature, often before the flames reach it.

Burning Embers: When embers land on fine fuels they can start small fires. If left unchecked, these fires smoulder, grow and spread. Embers are carried by winds ahead of the actual fire - sometimes several hundred metres ahead - and can land on flammable material, causing small fires to start.

Having a Plan: Know what you can do to protect your home from ember attack or direct impact by a fire. Simple things such as clearing gutters and removing fine fuels including leaves and sticks/ twigs from your yard will reduce the chance of an ember thrown into your property from starting a fire.

Filling your gutters with water is one thing you need to do if there is a bushfire near your property. You can get blockers to fit into your





gutters without much bother. The OTH Fodder Store has them in stock or most hardware shops sell them. Several varieties are available, they are really worth considering

Know what your plan is in the event of a fire - when you will leave and where you will go.

Know how to stay informed during a nearby fire - keep a battery powered radio with you in case you lose power.

Know what you will do for any dependent family and friends that may be elderly or vulnerable.

Know what you will do with your pets and animals.

Keep important documents and valuables ready and in one place so you can take them quickly in the event you are going to leave your property.

KEEP YOUR FAMILY SAFE THIS BUSHFIRE SEASON

<u> Momentous Events Throughout Time</u>

FEBRUARY:

1st February: (12 years ago) This was the day the Space Shuttle Columbia broke apart in flight over West Texas, killing all seven crew members, just sixteen minutes before it was due to land. They believe the accident was the result from damage caused during liftoff. A piece of insulating foam from the external fuel tank broke off, this pierced a hole in the shuttle's left wing and allowed hot gases to penetrate the wing upon re-entry into the Earth's atmosphere. This was the second Space Shuttle lost in flight.

6th February: Today was the day the most popular and most played board game, Monopoly went on sale for the first time. It was invented by Charles Darrow. You can play with up to 8 players and can be playing for more than 3 hours. 1680 hours or 70 days straight is the current record for the longest game of Monopoly ever played. Over 250 million copies of Monopoly have been produced since it was first released. The game originated in the early 1900s and was eventually sold to Parker Brothers who produced the first boxed version in 1935.

11th February 1979: On this day, Margaret Thatcher became leader of the UK Conservative Party. Four years later she went on to become the first woman British Prime Minister. She was born in Grantham, Lincolnshire on 13th October, 1925. She was the longest serving Prime Minister since Lord Liverpool from the 19th Century. She served from May 1979 until November 1990.

11th February, 1990: In South Africa, Nelson Mandela, at age 71, was released from prison after serving 27 years of a life sentence on charges of attempting to overthrow the apartheid government. In April 1994, he was elected President in the first all-race elections.

15th February: Astronomer and physicist Galileo Galilei (1564-1642) was born in Pisa, Italy. He was the first astronomer to use a telescope and advanced the theory that the sun, not the earth, was the centre of the solar system.

20th February, 1962: Astronaut John Glenn became the first American launched into orbit. Travelling aboard the "Friendship 7" spacecraft, Glenn reached an altitude of 260 kilometers and completed three orbits in a flight lasting just under five hours. Glenn was the third American in space, preceded by Alan Shepard and Virgil "Gus" Grissom who had each completed short sub-orbital flights. All of them had been preceded by Russian cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin who was the first human in space, completing one orbit on April 12th, 1961 - a feat that intensified the already ongoing Space Race between the Russians and Americans. Glenn's successful flight showed the Americans had caught up and was followed in September 1962 by President John F. Kennedy's open call to land an American on the moon before the decade's end.

The most important thing is to enjoy your time together, have fun!



legal Dumping

Illegal Dumping is a serious problem in Australia. The environment is harmed because waste pollutes waterways and land. Communities are then affected by this and it puts our health and safety at risk especially when hazardous chemicals and asbestos are dumped.

Landowners can be impacted even if they unknowingly accept waste onto their property, illegal dumping can cost thousands of dollars to clean up and leave the land contaminated, reducing its value. Neither EPA nor councils are responsible for cleaning up private property where illegal dumping has occurred. The cost of cleaning up is the responsibility of the landowner.

Legitimate businesses are disadvantaged as illegal waste receivers rort the system by avoiding licence fees and the cost of constructing an appropriate landfill or depot. This undermines the viability of legitimate operators and the investments they make in proper waste management.

The EPA encourages everyone to make sure the operators they engage to handle their waste are legitimate, have the appropriate license and dispose of the waste legally.

The EPA takes a zero-tolerance approach to illegal dumping. Offenders will be required to pay full clean up costs as well as penalties imposed through the court system. Profits from illegal activities will be confiscated and apologies published.

Landowners will be penalized if they knowingly allow waste to be dumped on their land without an appropriate license.

Anyone who produces or transports waste and illegally disposes of that waste can be fined up to \$120K and faces up to 2 years imprisonment. Corporations can be fined up to \$250K.

The EPA is working with local government to combat illegal dumping. Small scale roadside dumping and the illegal disposal of household and domestic waste remain the responsibility of the local government. However, the EPA will share intelligence and provide support and training in surveillance, investigation and evidence collection techniques to help councils identify and successfully prosecute offenders.

Consumers expect industries and business to operate responsibly for the benefit of the community, the environment, and future generations by legally disposing of the waste.

Always dispose of your waste in an appropriate way and be sure that when you accept waste or fill on your property you know what you are getting and are sure that it is legal.
